## CATTLE RUSTLERS.

### James Boddy and Charles Dunn Arrested Friday.

As a result of the visit of District Attorney T. G. Hailey to Athena Friday James Boddy and Charles Dunn were arrested for cattle rustling. When Mr. Hailey arrived here on the morning train he learned that James Boddy had started in the morning on horseback, riding rapidly. Charles Dunn was out somewhere in the mountains and it was thought Boddy intended to communicate with him. Warrants were issued by Justice of the Peace J. W. Smith for both men. Boddy returned shortly afterward, was arrested, went with Mr. Hailey to the slaughter house and related the story which involved him in the transaction. Officer Jimmy Stamper arrested Dunn when he came back in the afternoon from the mountains. Boddy's bail was fixed at \$300, which he furnished. Dunn was bound over to appear before Justice Smith at 10 o'clock next Tuesday forenoon to answer to the charge of grand larceny. His bond was placed at \$1000, which he could not furnish and was brought to Pendleton and placed in jail. The charge against Boddy is buying and receiving property believing it to have been stolen.

Following is an account of the affair: On Wednesday evening, October 31, Dunn brought a cow to Boddy's slaughter house a mile southeast of Athena and sold it to Jim Boddy for \$30, reserving the hide. Dunn cut the hide in two down the center, and the pieces in sacks, threw them across his horse and rode out to Louis La Brasche's place, placed them on top of a strawstack and set it afire. The straw and hides being damp, did not burn up, and Mr. La Brasche discovered the pieces of the hide in the morning after he had stamped out the fire. He took them to Athena and turned them over to Officer Stamper.
