FRED HYDE DIED.

Injuries Received in Accident at Nolin Sunday Afternoon Were Fatal.

Fred Hyde, the victim of the accident at Nolin Sunday afternoon, died at the county hospital a few minutes past 10 o'clock Monday evening. Alvin Hyde, of Northport, Wash., father of the young man, arrived on the train from Spokane and got to the hospital less than an hour before death came.

M. M. Butts, sub-contractor for Jones, Moran & Co., for whom Mr. Hyde was working at the time of the accident, remained with him and did everything that man could do to show his regard and if possible to bring about his recovery. H. S. Scott, general bookkeeper for Jones, Moran & Co., came up to Pendleton on the train Monday evening and returned to Nolin this morning.

Arrangements have been completed for shipment of the remains to Tacoma for interment. The body was embalmed by Joseph J. Jones, the undertaker, and will be taken west on the train tonight.

Fred Hyde was a fine young man and his death is deplored by his associates. He may be said to be a victim to interest in amateur photography, for had he gone away with the rest of the men, when warning was given, instead of remaining to obtain a kodak photograph of the explosion, at the flash, he would not have met with the accident.

Funeral at Tacoma.

Alvin Hyde will accompany the remains of his son to Tacoma, leaving this evening over the W. & C. R. railway. The funeral will be held there Thursday. The young man's relatives, who live at Northport, 130 miles north of Spokane, 10 miles from the northern boundary of the state of Washington, will leave there at 12 o'clock land will go directly to Tacoma to attend the funeral.

Deceased was aged 31 years and was unmarried.

WOMEN IN THE PENITENTIARY.

Those Who Have Been Sent to the Oregon Institution Have Become Insane.

The arrival of Mrs. Minnie Crockett at the penitentiary at Salem, convicted at Pendleton for shooting her husband at their home near Milton, has again forcibly forward again the conditions existing at the state prison which make it a living death for a woman to be incarcerated there. The fate of every female prisoner confined in the penitentiary for any length of time has been a transfer to the asylum for insane either on account of a real derangement of the mental faculties, or official policy which assumes that they are insane, and transfers them to where there are surroundings which make fresh air and exercise possible for them.

When the legislature of 1899 was in session the Catholic Ladies' Social and Relief Society, of Salem, recognizing the awful condition of solitary confinement and lack of exercise or work to which the two female convicts were doomed, and the terrible effect upon the minds and bodies of the poor creatures, petitioned the legislature to provide some means whereby they could have air, outdoor exercise and some kind of work, and the petition received due consideration, though no definite arrangements were furnished to adequately cover the case. The two women remaining under such conditions until the arrival of Mrs. Crockett are in the asylum.

It is likely the coming legislature will be called upon to make some provisions to meet the periodical emergency of properly handling Oregon's female convicts.

IRRIGATION CONGRESS.

Will Be in Session in Chicago Four Days This Month.

Chicago, Nov. 13.—The ninth annual session of the National Irrigation Congress which this year meets in Chicago on November 21, 22, 23, 24, promises to be of exceptional interest and importance to the west. This is the first session of the congress which has been held in any city east of the Missouri river, and it should be well represented by western men familiar with the subjects to be discussed.

The Irrigation Congress has assumed a truly national character and the program which has been prepared for this reason will attract wide attention. Some of the most prominent men of the country will speak—senators and members of congress, government officials and some of the heaviest business men of Chicago, who see the chance for the development of trade through the opening of the west by irrigation.

The National Irrigation Association has the matter in hand and is striving hard to bring the subject forward as the one greatest and most important question now before the country. A good representative western attendance is hoped for, as the occasion presents an opportunity for exceptional benefit to that half of the United States.

THINK WORLD TO SOON END.

Lazarettes Going to Scotland to Take Flight From a Mountain.

The members of the unique religious sect known as the Lazarettes are arranging to take passage for Scotland, says a LaPorte (Ind.) dispatch. The prophets of the sect have fixed a near date for the end of time and the revocation of all terrestrial things. The sect originated in Scotland and the flight of the faithful will be taken from some mountain there. Small communities of these zealots have been established in northern Indiana and southern Michigan counties. The men and women are disposing of their earthly possessions and the money accumulated will be expended in reaching Scotland, from whence they believe they are to be transported heavenward.

Russia's Record in Railway Work.

The first portion of the great Trans-Siberian railroad, from Chelyabinsk to Omsk, 492 miles, was opened for traffic in December, 1896; the second from Omsk to Ob, 388 miles, in 1899; the third, from Ob to Krasnoyarsk, 476 miles, later in the same year; the fourth, from Krasnoyarsk to Irkutsk, 672 miles, in August, 1898, says Scribner's Monthly. Thus the rail-head reached a point 3371 1/4 miles east of Moscow, and as the train had also reached Khabarovsk, on the Amur, from Vladivostok, the eastern terminus, distance of 475 miles, in the same month and year, a total of 2903 miles of railway had been laid and opened for traffic in seven years.

Germany's Large Cement Trade.

During the last few years Germany's cement industry has assumed large proportions. In 1899 the German exports of cement amounted to about 600,000 tons, as against 300,000 tons in 1894. The value of the cement exports last year was close to 22,000,000 marks. The best customers of German cement were Great Britain, the United States, Australia, Norway, Portugal, China, Brazil, Chile and South Africa.
