PORTLAND NEWS.

AN OPEN RIVER AND THE PORTLAND CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The Robbery of Obyle, a Pendleton Man, by Highwaymen in Portland.

Portland, Nov. 15.—Mr. George Taylor, president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, was seen this afternoon by a representative of the East Oregonian regarding the aid the chamber will give the effort to secure an appropriation from congress for the building of a canal around The Dalles to afford means of passage for vessels coming from the upper Columbia and the Snake rivers. Mr. Taylor is of the opinion that the chamber will do much to make the claim of Oregonians for this waterway emphatic. A meeting of the members of the chamber was held yesterday, but the attendance was not sufficiently large for the transaction of business of the nature of the proposed canal, advantageously. It is believed that a decisive step will be taken at the next meeting, the date of the convening of the national congress is so near at hand.

As is well known, it was the original intention to build a boat railway around The Dalles and an appropriation was secured from congress for that purpose. That scheme having been abandoned the desire is to ask for an appropriation of a million dollars which sum, plus the boat railway appropriation, it is believed will be sufficient for the work. No difficulty will be experienced in changing the reading of the original appropriation so that it would permit of the use of the money as now suggested. Some time ago the local Chamber of Commerce secured \$500 with which to make a preliminary survey of the proposed canal region. Captain William Harte, of the United States engineers, has the procuring of the data in charge and hopes to send a complete report to its department by the first of December. The compilation of the material has been delayed on account of difficulty in getting reliable statistics as to the amount of traffic that the proposed artificial water course would be called upon to handle.

The Robbery of Obyle.

J. W. Brown, who was arrested last night by Patrolman Bailey was arraigned in police court this afternoon charged with having robbed Obyle, a railroad employee of Pendleton, while that gentleman was on his way to the Union depot last evening shortly after 8 o'clock. The robbery took place at the north end of Sixth street and Obyle says that there were three men who took part in it. They deprived him of \$70 in money and the silver watch which he carried. The case was laid over until tomorrow, at which time the defendant Brown, will appear with attorney. He desired a postponement of the trial on the ground that he had had no opportunity of securing an attorney.

Watched for the Meteors.

Many Portlanders were out last night with telescopes endeavoring to catch sight of some of the meteors that were due to pass across the heavens. The watchers, however, in this part of the country at least, experienced disappointment, for the earth was enveloped in a thick cloud-bank that even if the meteoric shower took place, rendered seeing it impossible.

Epworth Leaguers in Portland.

It is expected that a large number of Epworth Leaguers will be in the city tomorrow to attend the League convention that is scheduled to be held at the Grace Methodist Episcopal church. The delegates will come from all parts of the Portland district of the church. A program of papers and discussions pertaining to league work has been arranged and will be given. Dr. E. M. Randall, Jr., of Seattle, Wash., will speak at the afternoon session and in the evening Dr. J. K. T. Lathrop will deliver a lecture.

West Market Firmer.

The wheat market this afternoon is somewhat firmer than it was yesterday, although the local figure still continues at 54 1/2. The eastern market is 1/4 cent better and it is owing to this fact that the firmer shade characterizes the local market.

Addressed the Chamber.

Hon. John Barrett, ex-United States minister to China, addressed the members of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and a number of the business men of the city, in the chamber rooms this afternoon. The subject upon which he spoke was, "The Oriental Trade." Mr. Barrett said in the course of his remarks that he has always been an ardent believer in the Pacific coast development and of the aid she will secure in that development through her trade with the eastern countries. He said that he did not wish to make a political assertion, but from his travel in the Far East would give a few facts regarding the country there as beneficial to the United States.

In the first part of the lecture he gave consideration to the peoples of the countries in the Orient. He said that the peoples in those nations were fast coming into a certain knowledge of what it means to buy and sell. At the present time the trade of China and the other eastern nations is great, but American merchants get but a meagre share of it. English merchants have finely organized systems of mercantile trade in the east, but despite that fact the American merchants should be in no way intimidated. "I am satisfied," he said, "that two-thirds of the products demanded by those eastern nations could readily be furnished by the Pacific coast states."

NOVEL EXPERIMENT.

Oregon Short Line Trying Electricity for Roadlight.

Passengers on Oregon Short Line No. 9, for Seattle and Portland, could have seen something interesting had they walked up to engine 405 hissing and snorting at the head of the train, says the Salt Lake Tribune. No. 405 is lighted by electricity, which is something new in the west, but the Oregon Short Line has decided to try the experiment, and No. 405 is the first one to run out of Salt Lake behind a half-mile streak of white light gliding from the headlight.

A dynamo is placed on top of the boiler, set between the steam dome and the smokestack. It is fed by a small steam pipe connected directly with the current for the headlight, which is of 3000

candle power and casts a reflection for half a mile. There are also 10 incandescent lights, three under each side running board and two in among the eccentrics to light "the eagle eye with the grouse pot" at his work. The lights are in the cab, one over the engine and one above the engineer's seat. These lights are worked by a switch inside the cab.

It is still in the experimental stage, but so far the Oregon Short Line has been well pleased with the results and all the engines will likely be so equipped.

A passing locomotive is not very brilliant at night except when the fireman opens his furnace door, but when 405 comes along the 3000 candlepower headlight looms up like a searchlight, and as she passes, the underlights are flashing stars amid the steel machinery. The innovation is one that naturally causes great interest.

Mr. Coe is an ardent republican and was specially desirous that his life might be prolonged until he could put in another vote for McKinley.
