A CRISTIAN SCIENCE CASE.

CAME UP AT OREGON CITY AND HAS ATTRACTED MUCH ATTENTION.

The First Trial Resulted in a Disagreement and There Will Have to Be Another One.

Portland, Nov. 18.—The case of the state vs. Abraham W. Hertzka that has attracted so much attention for several months past, came up in the circuit court at Oregon City, last week. The cardinal facts in the case, though perhaps well known, are here recounted: For some time previous to last January a lady, Mrs. Quint by name, was confined to her home at Oregon City by sickness and the ministrations of the physicians whom she employed did not appear to cause her to improve in health. She expressed herself as believing that the efforts of a Christian Science practitioner might have good result upon the condition of her health and in accordance with that belief she caused Abraham W. Hertzka, of this city to be summoned. Hertzka has been practicing Christian Science treatments in this place for the past two years. He treated Mrs. Quint and on the 7th of last February she died. Upon Mrs. Quint's death the coroner held an inquest and it was decided that the woman met death from a disease of the liver. Shortly after the inquest charges were preferred against Hertzka for having violated the Oregon state laws in practicing without a license issued by the state board of medical examiners. Hertzka was arrested and released on bond. The case came up for trial in justice's court a few days later and at that time Hertzka was fined \$100, having been found guilty of the charge as read.

The defendant's attorney put in no defense, but an appeal was made and the case carried to the circuit court. There it was tried last week. The trial consumed about three days of the court's time. The case, as mentioned, was heard in Judge McBride's court. The defense held that Hertzka did not profess to heal, that the defendant employed the same processes as did Jesus Christ when he walked upon earth healing diseases. It was the emphatic assertion of the defense that at no time did Christ himself claim to heal disease, but that in all instances it was God who healed through Christ, the Nazarene being only the instrument through which God worked, brought about the cure. Hertzka, the defense argued, like the Man of Galilee, claimed to heal no disease of himself, but rather that God was the power. Therefore, if the defendant claimed no powers as a healer, the attorneys held he could not be prosecuted for violation of the state law.

The prosecution argued that Christ did employ material agencies in working the cures. The instance of the use of the clay and spittle was cited. The facts remain that no modern personage is divine, that there is only one third member of the Trinity who is the Christ. The physicians of the state and of the country are arrayed against Christian Scientists not because they have fears that the practitioners will win from them patients, but because the general welfare of the individuals in the communities where the Christian Scientists are working is at stake. The so-called religion is neither Christian nor science. It is a fact beyond dispute that there is a certain influence of mind over matter, that if employed by individuals properly works wonders in way of curing diseases. It has, however, at no time been known to cure the contagious diseases and on that account the Christian Science advocates who advance it are to be feared in any locality.

The jury after having been charged by the court, retired and soon returned for further reading of the evidence. The first ballot stood ten for acquittal and two for conviction. The second ballot stood seven for acquittal and five for conviction, and this result was given to the court. The case will have a retrial.

Hertzka made the following statement to a representative of the East Oregonian: "Christian Scientists cannot be included in this law that regulating practice and the exercise of license as they do not prescribe, direct or use drugs of any kind. Christian Science is a religion and the religion heals the sick. The Science does not heal the sick, but God is the healer, acting on the human mind."

Dr. Byron E. Miller, president of the state medical association and secretary of the state board of examiners, said to this paper's representative: "I feel that it is people want to employ such individuals as Christian Science practitioners it is their privilege. But those individuals, calling themselves physicians will treat most serious diseases, before those diseases are recognized. On this account the practice should be prohibited. The practitioners know absolutely nothing of disease. They are called into a family where there is diphtheria or smallpox. They say, 'The Lord will care for you, take steps towards medical cure,' and by their advice not only endanger the individual but all who come in contact with him. The law regarding the practice of medicine should be the first and most rigid law in the state for it means the protection of the people of the country."

BICYCLE TAX.
Thirty-Three Licenses Were Granted During First Month.
The new bicycle ordinance which went into effect on Thursday, October 11, is meeting with great favor on all sides. Up to date 33 permits have been granted to persons to ride their bicycles on the sidewalks of Pendleton under certain restrictions. The sidewalks of Court and Main streets do not come within the limits in which the ordinance may be used by bicyclists, even though they have paid the tax. Each person desiring to avail himself of the privilege of riding a bicycle upon the sidewalks must tenderly deposit with the city recorder the sum of \$5. He must also secure a brass tag and attach it to his bicycle in a conspicuous place. The ordinance is a godsend to those who live in the suburbs, as without the privilege of using the sidewalks they would have to establish an electric street car line or purchase automobiles in order to be able to attend to their daily professional, commercial and academic duties.
