FIRE AT SUMPTER.

Henry Finzer, formerly of Pendleton, suffers loss.

The building on the corner of Granite and Center streets, Sumpter, burned early Wednesday morning. The owners of Henry Finzer and J. N. Cox were on the ground floor. Most of the stock and some of the fixtures of these places were saved, but the lodging house above was gutted. The losses are given as follows: P. D. Healey, building, loss \$1000; insurance, \$1500. Cox & Co., saloon, loss about \$300; no insurance. Henry Finzer, saloon, \$250 loss on fixtures insured for \$300, and a loss on uninsured property. T. O. Law, lodging-house, loss \$500; insurance, \$500; Louis Harris, cigar store, insurance, \$250 loss \$250. In adjoining buildings, the tobacco saloon, with \$250 insurance, lost \$100, and Wheeler's stationery stand, insured for \$300, was damaged about \$10. The losses aggregated about \$3000, of which the insurance companies will have \$2110 to pay. A heavy cover of snow prevented the fire from spreading.

JACK-RABBIT DRIVE

At Mouth of Butter Creek, Saturday December 1.

H. C. Rogers is in the city from Butter creek and announces that he is making arrangements for a big jack-rabbit drive to take place at the mouth of Butter creek on Saturday, December 1. The date is subject to change, due notice of which will be given. The scene of the drive is 11 miles south of Echo, and is an open space of country admirably fitted for the purpose. Barbed wire fence, with strands so close together that rabbits cannot get through, has been built, in V shape, the arms being a quarter of a mile long. At the point where the fences come together is a corral 100 feet in diameter. Mr. Rogers says there are thousands of jack-rabbits there awaiting to be driven. He thinks that four or five thousand can be rounded up by this drive. Those participating will be on horseback and lots of sport is in sight.
