FOOTBALL AT LA GRANDE

PENDLETON HIGH SCHOOL WON WITH 8-5E.

Visitors Were Treated Royally—La Grande Expected to Come to Pendleton Christmas.

The Pendleton High School team returned to their homes on Sunday morning's train, elated over their victory of the preceding day at La Grande, where they played football with the school team of that city. They speak in high terms of their treatment while there. They were guests of the Foley House and through the generosity of the Commercial Club had the free use of the quarters of that organization, including parlors, reading rooms and bathrooms. Their hosts made their stay there a continual picnic and they now wish to have the La Grande team play a return game in Pendleton. Arrangements are being made to have the game take place here on Christmas.

The La Grande boys averaged 140 pounds in weight while Pendleton only averaged 148. That slight difference in weight was more than made up in science and skill and Pendleton won in a canter.

The First Half.

Game opened at 2 o'clock sharp. La Grande kicking off; Wyrick made a touchdown on first down in less than a minute after play commenced; by center kicking of Gard and Cronin Pendleton pushed ball over the line for another touchdown; crisscross play by Hession and Wyrick made another; La Grande kicked off and McCarthy made a touchdown from the field; Stephens backed center for 15 yards; Hession made a 30-yard end run. Hawks made an end run of 15 yards; by force line bucking of Cronin and Taylor the ball was carried to La Grande's 14-yard line; Cronin bucked the line for 5 yards; then Gard by bucking between left guard and left tackle forced the ball across the goal. La Grande kicked to Larone, who carried it to center; Moorhouse made an end run, gaining 10 yards; Taylor bucked center for 10 yards more; Stephens made end run of 15 yards; McCarthy made 4 yards by bucking center; Stephens made a touchdown by an end run, but it was not allowed; umpire deciding he had run out of bounds; then by center bucking by Cronin Pendleton scored again. Mud and slush were against accurate punting, so that Pendleton only kicked one goal from the six touchdowns. Score at first half, 31 to 0 in favor of Pendleton.

The Second Half.

Jim Wyrick was substituted for Mark Moorhouse, the game being secure; in order to give the first-named a little practice in a real game. Pendleton kicked off to Hughes, who made 10 yards, and then tackled by Larone; La Grande lost ball on down; Jim Wyrick made end run and touchdown for Pendleton; Gard kicked goal; La Grande kicked to Pendleton; Gard and Taylor gained 25 yards by bucking; Wyrick made another end run; Stephens made end run and touchdown; by force line bucking Gard made touchdown; La Grande kicked off, and Pendleton lost ball on fumble; and lost 18 yards on the down; Pendleton made end run by force bucking made another touchdown; Gard kicked goal; by long end run Pendleton got ball on La Grande's 35-yard line; Hawks made

big end run, when time was called. Score: Pendleton, 63; La Grande, 0. The features of Pendleton play were the bucking of Taylor, Cronin, Gard and McCarthy; the tackling of Larone, Stephens, Borie and Moorhouse; end runs of Jim Wyrick, Will Wierick and Hession. The best playing for La Grande was done by Laughlin, Hughes, Ray and Hopper. La Grande boys made yardage but twice and were clearly overmatched. The weather was cold, ground muddy and attendance 300.

Pendleton substitutes—Jim Wyrick, Carl Christian and Arthur Kern.

In the evening a reception was tendered the visitors at the school home. An elegant banquet was prepared by the ladies of the High School, at which all did justice. The affair was a pleasant success.

In addition to the football team, the following made the trip to La Grande and joined in the festivities: E. R. Conklin, principal of the public schools, and his little daughter Jean, who was named by unanimous consent; Roy Conklin, Ralph Com, Guy Wyrick, Oliver Kelsey, Charlie Cameron, Tom Minkley and Harley Rothrock.

REGARDING GAME LAWS.

INDIANS KILLING DEER: ODD FELLOWS PROVIDE A CHILDREN'S HOME.

The Russians Vice Consul's Idea as to Russia's Tax on American Flour Shipments to Siberia.

Portland, Nov. 24.—Game Warden Quimby, received a call yesterday from S. B. Ormsby, of Salem, superintendent of the different forest reserves throughout this state. Mr. Ormsby was in Portland on business and made this friendly call upon Mr. Quimby, during the course of which the question of securing an appropriation from the next state legislature for the purpose of paying deputy game and fire wardens throughout the state for their services, was thoroughly discussed. For several days past, in fact ever since the limit of the period for shooting deer passed, Mr. Quimby has been receiving, from day to day, letters from different localities of the state in which complaints are made that the law regulating the killing of deer is in no way being obeyed. A letter was received only a short time ago by Game Warden Quimby from one of his deputies, M. E. Lagore, of Walla Walla county, and the letter states that warden slaughter is in progress in districts in his locality, and that the Indians from the reservations are the hunters who are paying no attention to the law. Mr. Lagore is of the opinion that fully four hundred deer have been illicitly killed in that region.

The greater part of the blame for this condition of affairs is not altogether due to the Indians, but to the agents of the reservations, who are looked upon as being the parties responsible. They give permission to the men under their care to hunt in districts remote from the reservation and as a result this wholesale slaughter goes on. The deputy game wardens in the different localities do not feel that they can devote their time to following up the law-breaking Indians without some remuneration. But at the present time the state grants but \$500 per year for the enforcement of the game laws. The need of a larger appropriation for this matter is very apparent, and an effort will be made next January by sportsmen in different parts of the state to get an additional amount. Game Warden Quimby estimates that the appropriation should be at least \$5000 to be effective. Both Mr. Quimby and Mr. Ormsby have pledged themselves to be present at the opening of the legislature and give the bill their heartiest support.

Odd Fellows' Good Work.

For a number of years past the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., of the state of Oregon, have been desirous of establishing a home for the children of Odd Fellows who either are not in position to give them personal care for a period, or are dead. Such a home was established near Troutdale, a small village some fifteen miles from Portland, but owing to the long distance that separated the home from any city, and the great expense incurred in procuring teachers, the project was abandoned and the building that had been erected upon the small farm was left to crumble in ruin. Since the failure of that first endeavor, however, the desire to establish and maintain such a school has never been absent from the minds of the chief officers of the order. A year ago last August, when the Grand Lodge convened, an appropriation was made for such a purpose. A committee began work to raise additional funds and was successful in getting a goodly sum pledged from members of the order here in Portland. All appropriations were made with the understanding that the home should be located at Portland, and a short time ago bids were called for.

Russia's Tax on Flour.

Gustaf Wilson, the Russian vice consul, located in this city, was seen today and an expression was secured from him relative to the recent enactment of his government to the effect that a tax of eighty cents a barrel will after January 1, be placed on all flour imported into Siberia. Mr. Wilson said that he believed the duty was nothing more than shippers here have expected and he also thought that it was a just duty in every way. Russia no longer needs the wheat of this country. In different parts of Siberia there are vast wheat fields that more than supply the Siberian trade and it would be an unjust thing to the producers of that country to permit the foreign flour to come into the country without duty. Mr. Wilson thinks the move is a good one on the part of his government and one that American flour shippers and shippers in other parts of the world, should in no way complain against.
