SHOOTING AT ANTELOPE.

Bert Rogers shoots. Murderer Finlayson to talking to Mrs. Rogers.

The Dalles, Nov. 28.—At Antelope, this county, Monday evening, Bert Rogers shot. Murderer Finlayson, one ball taking effect in his breast and the other went wide of the mark. THANKSGIVING AFTERNOON.

The Great Game of Football, Baker vs. Pendleton.

The time for the great football game between Baker City and Pendleton High School teams is rapidly approaching. Thanksgiving afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock, the teams will line up ready for the call of play. The excitement is already at fever heat, indicating that an immense throng will be present to witness the sport. The Baker City boys will arrive on the morning train and will be met at the depot by a committee from the local High School and escorted to the Hotel Pendleton.

Thanksgiving evening a reception will be tendered the visitors in Assembly hall at the school house on the hill. Brief literary and musical program will be rendered and refreshments served. This will be an opportunity for the forming of mutual acquaintanceships, which will doubtless be improved by many of Pendleton's representative population, large and small.

The lineup of the Pendleton team will be identical with that presented at La Grande, with the single exception that Jim Wyrick will play left end instead of Mark Moorhouse. This will be undoubtedly the most interesting game ever played in Pendleton up to this time, and if the weather be

propitious the attendance will be immense. The grounds on lower Alta street are being put in readiness for the encounter.

THE PAN-AMERICAN EXPOSITION.

Mrs. Weathered, One of Oregon's Commissioners, in Pendleton in the interest of the Enterprise.

Mrs. E. T. Weathered, of Portland, one of the commissioners to the Pan-American exposition is in town looking after exhibiting from this locality. A committee will be appointed to look to the wool and manufacturing interests and another for mining, fruit and agriculture. It is the plan of the Oregon commission to have every part of the state brought out. Mrs. Weathered is particularly anxious to have a fine display of Indian relics from the Pendleton woolen mills. Lee Moorhouse has responded to a request for a large collection of Indian pictures. Mrs. Weathered states that while this will make an artistic and attractive corner, it will at the same time be viewed from the practical side and greatly help to show what is done with some of Oregon's wool. A large assortment of the different grades of wool is asked for, also photographs of sheep in pairs and herds.

Mrs. Weathered, who was one of the commissioners to the Omaha exposition, says that people by the hundreds looked at pictures of Oregon towns and school buildings and seemed greatly surprised that we had such structures in the far off west. Photographs of Pendleton's business houses, dwellings and schools will be on exhibition at Buffalo. All pictures are to be left with Lee Moorhouse.

The Woman's Club will be asked to arrange for a collection of Indian curios, baskets, etc. This will simply be a loan and will be carefully guarded and safely returned to the owners.

Farmers who have any specimens of grains, grasses or anything in the agricultural line, which would aid in the collection, are requested to report to R. Alexander.

The people of Pendleton should grasp the opportunity to advertise this part of the state at the Pan-American exposition next year. The time is limited when the exhibits have to be looked up and each one should consider themselves a committee of one to assist in the collection. The Oregon legislature will be asked for an appropriation to cover all expenses of installing and looking after the exhibit from this state. The commissioners are arranging everything systematically and economically and do not intend to draw on public funds any more than is actually necessary.

BITTERLY DISAPPOINTED.

Pendleton Academy Football Boys Received a Message.

The Pendleton academy football boys assembled at the depot bright and early this morning ready to take the train for the west, to play the Golden Rule academy team on Thanksgiving. A bitter disappointment was in store for them, however, as a telephone message was read to them while there telling them not to come as no grounds could be secured and the game would have to be postponed indefinitely. This message was received in Pendleton at 11 o'clock Tuesday night but too late, of course, to notify the boys then that the game was off. The Golden Rule management is criticised for the hiten in the proceedings, which necessitated the postponement.

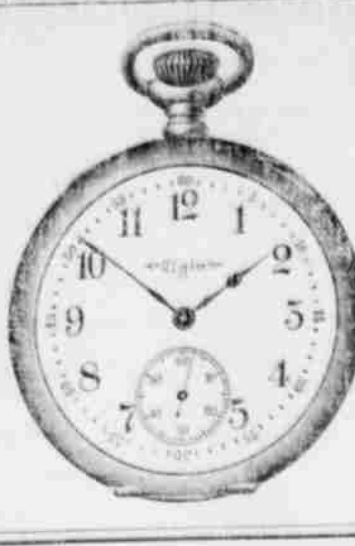
