FOTTBALL TEAM FROM BAKER.

Visitors Will Be Tendered a Reception This Evening.

The Baker City High School football boys arrived on the train at 8 o'clock this morning and were escorted to the hotel. Pendleton, William Hyde stalker, teacher of physical culture, accompanied them. The game between them and the Pendleton High School team is being played this afternoon on the lower Alta street grounds. This evening a reception will be tendered the visitors in Assembly hall at the school house on the hill. A musical and literary program has been arranged, and refreshments will be served. It is expected that the reception will be largely attended by teachers, pupils, parents and interested friends.

A HENNERY AT BLALOCKS.

The O. R. & N. Realizes the Demand for Fresh Eggs Should Be Supplied.

Steps have been taken to supply the Portland market with fresh ranch eggs. A Portland firm with the aid of the O. R. & N. Co. have established a chicken ranch at Blalock and the first shipment of eggs will be made about December 18.

The chicken ranch is to be conducted along the most modern scientific lines, and should be made to pay. Several Eastern parties stand ready to establish large henneries in Oregon with a view of supplying not only the Oregon market, but the whole Northwest with fresh ranch eggs. Two-thirds of the eggs now used in Portland market are Eastern eggs, taken from cold storage. Thousands of dollars worth of eggs are imported into the state every year. As an instance, 35,000 eggs were shipped into the little town of Wallace in one month. At present it is next to impossible to secure absolutely fresh eggs. This fact was called to the attention of B. Campbell, traffic manager of the O.

R. & N., who referred it to the road's industrial agent, R. C. Judson. Mr. Judson took hold of the matter and had a chicken ranch built at Blalock. C. R. Smead, of the Smead fruit farm, donated the ground for the coops, runways, grass plots and other buildings. Already 300 chickens of the Plymouth and Lagher varieties have been secured, and arrangements for increasing that number are progressing smoothly. Two large incubators will be put in as soon as possible, with a view of furnishing "broilers" for the market. Other marked improvements are well under way.

An experienced man is in charge, who will keep an account of all the expenditures and receipts, so at the end of the year the figures will show how well the experiment paid. Should it fulfill expectations several other henneries on a much larger scale will be established along the line of the O. R. & N. Colonel Judson is now in receipt of several letters from persons anxious to go into the business. Before encouraging them, however, he prefers to wait and get accurate figures from the present experiment, feeling certain that the result will prove the strongest argument for intending investors.

LINCOLN'S PICTURE FELL

It Alarmed the McKinley Household at the White House.

The president and Mrs. McKinley and all others in the White House were startled by a tremendous crash in the east room on the second floor. The room had been closed since the afternoon, and there were all sorts of conjectures as to the noise, ranging from the explosion of a bomb to the collapse of a wall.

Half a dozen attendants rushed into the room and found the life-sized portrait of Lincoln on the carpet. The canvas was torn from the frame and the frame badly damaged. Examination showed that the painting itself was not injured, and it was rolled up and put away. It will be necessary to get a new frame. The broken one was a massive affair of gilt moulding and measured five feet high.

The portrait of Lincoln, with those of George and Martha Washington and Jefferson, hung in front of mused windows on the east wall of the room. It was painted by Cogswell and was one of the most striking objects in the famous room. It is considered a fine likeness and has been reproduced in many different ways.

It is supposed the work of building the new stairway to the president's office loosened the plaster and caused the cornice on which the picture hung to give way.

White had been supposed to be dead, but it seems that he had been in the west, where he has acquired considerable property. He will return and take his wife back with him.

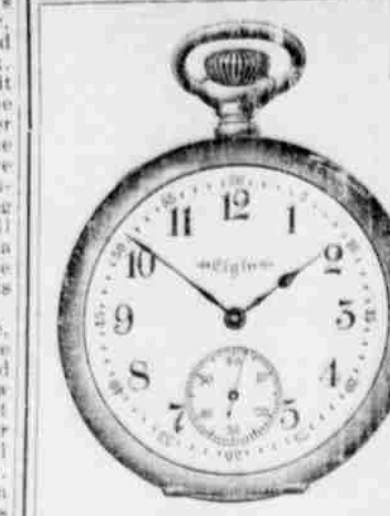
