GENERAL NEWS. BRITISH GARRISON SURRENDERS TO BOERS.

The sales of Standard Oil shares in the open market Wednesday aggregated 157 shares at \$700, a new high record for the stock. Eleven armored ships, to cost about \$40,000,000 when finished, are attracting shipbuilding experts to the navy department. The London Express publishes a rumor that a gigantic gold mine trust has been formed, including John D. Rockefeller, Cecil Rhodes, Alfred Beit and Joseph Benjamin Robinson. William Gibson, near Ashland, Ky., ran a red hot poker down the throat of his 3-year-old stepdaughter in Cattaraugus. The child died. Gibson then set fire to an adjoining building and fled. Rear-Admiral Frederick G. McNair died at his residence in Washington Wednesday, from a stroke of apoplexy. He was the ranking rear admiral of the navy and the officer next in line to Admiral Dewey. The general council of the Seine Wednesday at Paris unanimously adopted a resolution that the French government should take the initiative in the endeavor to bring about the arbitration of issues between Great Britain and the Boers. Contracts were signed in London and ratified in Wall street for the equipment of the Charing Cross, Euston & Hampstead underground railway with electricity at a cost of about \$20,000,000. Americans will furnish all the capital for the enterprise. A feature of the Fasig-Tipton horse sale today was the sale of Axtill, the famous trotting sire. He was bought by G. H. Barlow of Bingham, N. Y., for \$14,700. Robert J., the world champion pacing gelding, was sold for \$625. His racing days are over. A jury to try Jessie Morrison, charged with killing Mrs. G. Olin Castle, her rival at Eldorado, Kansas, was secured after more than three weeks' examination of witnesses. All of the jury are farmers and married men. None of them are under 30 years of age. The Union Pacific mail made a record of more than a mile a minute for 150 miles from Grand Island to Omaha Saturday. The train was two hours late at Grand Island. After an exciting run it landed in Omaha just 27 minutes behind schedule time, having made 154 miles in 150 minutes. Richard Novak, aged 14 years, was found guilty of murder in Chicago, Wednesday. Novak stabbed and killed his companion, Albert Olson, during a quarrel, September 17. Novak is said to be the youngest murderer ever convicted in Cook county. He will be sent to the reformatory under the indeterminate act. PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS. The charity ball at Salem given Wednesday night for the benefit of the Salem hospital netted about \$300. Doc Parrott, a veterinary surgeon, was killed near Grant's Pass, while assisting in repairing a bridge. The bridge timbers fell on him. The census given the population of Walla Walla county at 18,980. King county has the largest population, 110,053; Spokane county is second with 57,542. Of the 33 incorporated places in Idaho only five have a population of over 2000: namely, Boise 5957, Pocatello 2446, Lewiston 2425, Moscow 2484, and Wallace 2295. James Slorah, formerly a Seattle bartender, was convicted at Dawson recently of murdering Pearl Mitchell. He was sentenced to be hanged March 1. The jury returned its verdict in 20 minutes. Wheeler county is rapidly paying off the debt it inherited from Grant county. Last week another \$3000 was liquidated in repaying a bridge. The debt assumed from Gilliam and Crook counties was paid off some time ago. It is now thought that the body found last Thursday near Bellavista, Calif., is that of Frank Michaels, of Portland, Ore. Michaels left Holly Hill Thursday morning on foot for Redding, which place he never reached. Samuel M. Toed, a printer, who was well known throughout Eastern Oregon and Idaho died in Spokane Thursday. He was a bachelor about 50 years of age and had been on a protracted debauch. His mother and brother live at Huntington.

THE BOERS WERE 2500 STRONG

A Thrill of Alarm Goes Through Great Britain. Lord Kitchener Succeeds Lord Roberts, Who Returns to England.

London, Nov. 30.—Lord Roberts cables from Johannesburg under date of Wednesday, November 28: "The Dewetsdorp garrison of two guns of the Sixty-eighth field battery with detachments of the Gloucester regiment, Highland light infantry and Irish rifles, 400 in all, surrendered at 5:45 p. m., November 28. Our losses were 15 men killed and 42 wounded, including Maj. Hansen and Capt. Digby. The enemy is said to be 2500 strong. Four hundred men were dispatched from Edenburg to relieve Dewetsdorp but they did not succeed in reaching there in time. General Knox joined this force and found Dewetsdorp evacuated. Seventy-five sick and wounded had been left there. Knox pursued and is reported to have successfully engaged Steyn and Dewet near the Vaal bank. They retired west and southwest. Knox's messenger failed to get through so I have no details. The disaster at Dewetsdorp has sent a thrill of alarm through Great Britain. The conscription continues so strict that there is no hope of arriving at a clear conception of the actual position of affairs in South Africa. A British Disaster. London, Nov. 30.—The British disaster at Dewetsdorp has caused a very angry feeling here. The newspapers denounce the leniency displayed by Lord Roberts and attribute this latest disaster to it.

REHABILITATION OF GALVESTON. PEOPLE ROASTED ALIVE.

Rehabilitation of Galveston. Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 30.—Three thousand visitors attended the opening session of the convention which has been held for the purpose of rehabilitation of the city of Galveston. National and state aid will be asked. The Crew's Condition. Livada, Nov. 30.—A bulletin issued by the czar's physicians today says that his majesty slept well last night, and his condition today is satisfactory; temperature, 96, pulse, 62.

ROOF OF A GLASS FACTORY COLLAPSES DURING FOOTBALL GAME.

Two Hundred People Were on Roof; So Far Sixteen Are Dead. San Francisco, Nov. 30.—As a result of one of the most horrible catastrophes that ever occurred in San Francisco 13 people were killed and fully 50 badly injured yesterday afternoon by the collapse of the roof of the Pacific glass works on Fifteenth street. About 75 people fell through the roof upon red hot furnaces and glass vats below. All were horribly burned and it is feared that in addition to the 13 deaths already reported there will be several more. Two hundred people, all men and boys had gathered on the sheet iron roof of the glass works to obtain a free view of the annual football game between Stanford and the University of California. About 20 minutes after the game had commenced there was a crash, plainly audible from the football grounds and a portion of the crowd on the roof went down into a horrible death below. Fire in the Furnaces. Fires in the furnaces had been started for the first time today and the vats were full of liquid glass. It was upon those that the victims fell. Some were killed instantly and others were slowly roasted to death. The few who missed the furnaces or rolled off, together with the workmen in the glass works, saved the lives of many who lay unconscious by pulling them away from their horrible resting place. The police and fire department were soon at hand and every patrol wagon and ambulance in the city was summoned. They were not enough and express wagons and private carriages were pressed into service to carry off the dead and wounded. Many of the injured were unconscious while others were hurried away shrieking with agony. The Southern Pacific railroad hospital was only two blocks away and was quickly filled. About 40 wounded were taken there. Others were sent to St. Luke's hospital, the city receiving hospital, and to private residences and other places. Killed by the Fall. Only a few were actually burned to death, the majority being killed by the fall. Several of those injured are in a precarious condition and the list of dead may be increased to a score within a day or two. The list of casualties may safely be put at 13 killed and 100 injured. San Francisco, Calif., Nov. 30.—Hert Harrison, aged 15, of Topeka, Kansas, and John Brough, aged 19, a law clerk, died this morning as the result of injuries of the glass works catastrophe. Total, 15 deaths so far. Lawrence Meil, aged 9, makes the sixteenth death. Still Another Victim. San Francisco, Nov. 30.—Dante Monacosa, aged 17, died this afternoon. He is the 17th victim. Coroner at Work. San Francisco, Nov. 30.—A coroner's jury is being unpaneled. After viewing the bodies the jury will visit the glass works. It is quite probable that no responsibility will attach to the glass company who state that if the police had responded to its complaint when first given the crowd would have been kept away. Four more deaths are expected hourly.

HONORING A DEAD SENATOR.

The Remains of Davis Are Taken to the Capitol Building. St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 30.—Escorted by a battery and a company of state militia, the remains of Senator Davis were escorted to the capitol building this morning where they will be in state until this afternoon. No ceremony will occur upon the removal of the coffin to the funeral car. The route over which the procession passed, was lined by thousands of people. Business throughout the city was suspended. Private funeral services will occur at the Davis residence in this city tomorrow.

THE WAR TAZ REDUCTION.

Republicans Cannot Agree as to What Part of the Tax is to Go. Washington, Nov. 30.—The republican members of the ways and means committee have encountered a hitch over the proposed reduction of war tax, and a meeting of the full committee, called for tomorrow, has been postponed until next week, owing to the absence of Steele, Tammey and Grovesnor. It is said it has been decided to have a caucus, owing to the dissension in republican ranks. Democratic member this afternoon said it was evident that the republicans have decided not to commit any of the opposition in the matter.

REV. SAM SMALL'S TROUBLE.

The Former Evangelist is Released From Jail in Havana. Havana, Nov. 30.—Sam Small, the former evangelist, and Samuel Carr, a newspaper correspondent, who were arrested of their return from Cuba on the charge of swindling, and put in jail, have been released conditionally. Small was openly charged by a Havana paper last week with swindling operations, while he was editor of a Havana journal.

ARE TIRED OF SERVICE.

Regular Officers in the Philippines Weary of Their Jobs—Corbin Denies It. Washington, Nov. 30.—General Corbin this morning denies the reports printed in the newspapers that the president is considering the advisability of replacing General MacArthur in the Philippines with General James A. Smith, collector of customs at Manila. Corbin also denies the truth of the alleged reason, that all of the regular officers are tired of service in the Philippines.

FRENCH ADVANCE INTO SHANSI PROVINCE.

Minister Wu is Directed to Make Protest. FRENCH HAVE GERMANY'S ASSENT. The French Expedition is Likely to Stir Up the Chinese and Bring on Trouble—Its Purpose Said to Be Revenge.

Washington, Nov. 30.—It is understood that the viceroys of the southern provinces of China have appealed to the state department, through Minister Wu, to use the good offices of this government to stop the advance of the French forces into Shansi province. Minister Wu was an early caller at the department but he refused to say anything concerning the report. The appeal of the viceroys is to the effect that the French expedition will have anything but a quieting effect, they say the presence of the troops will cause a rebellion. Same appeal will be made to Russian, English and Japanese government. Minister Wu, it is said, alleges that Germany's commander gave his consent for the movement, which is alleged to be one of revenge solely. Col. Yarek is Dead. Berlin, Nov. 30.—Col. Yarek, a German officer, who was overpowered by gas while sleeping in a Chinese hut on the march to Peking has died from the effects.

MRS. VAN LIEW IS GUILTY.

She is Sentenced to Ten Years in the Penitentiary. Van Wert, Ohio, Nov. 30.—Mrs. Van Liew, the wife of a banker here, accused of the murder of Miss Alice Hammel, by throwing vitrol in her face, today pleaded guilty of manslaughter, after her trial had been in progress two weeks, and the judge sentenced her to ten years in the penitentiary. Miss Hammel was the ward of the banker. There were no witnesses to the act, throwing. The crime was the result of jealousy.

TELEPHONE MEN STRIKE.

Those at San Francisco, Portland and Sacramento Involved. San Francisco, Nov. 30.—Unless concessions are given by employers before tomorrow, all the telephone lines in San Francisco, Sacramento and Portland strike for a uniform day of eight hours and \$4 wages. The strike would tie up all coast lines. Companies announce they will make no concessions and expect trouble.

VICTIMS OF TYPHOON.

The Ship General Alva Has Not Been Heard From. Washington, Nov. 30.—Remy cables the navy department this afternoon the names of those of the Yosemite crew who were drowned, saying the bodies have been recovered and are unrecognizable. He asks for food supplies for the natives, who are destitute. The secretary has directed that supplies be sent. Nothing has been heard regarding the ship General Alva, which was in the same typhoon that wrecked the cruiser Yosemite.

PORTO RICO WILL LEGISLATE.

Washington, Nov. 30.—Abrogation of the Porto Rican tariff will be the most important subject of discussion in the Porto Rican legislature which is to meet shortly. Under provisions of the Porto Rican act it will have power to immediately terminate the Porto Rican tariff, by enacting legislation which will provide funds for the necessities of the government of the island.

ANOTHER DROP FOR CORN.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 30.—November corn took another sensational tumble soon after the board opened the morning, falling to 36 1/2; it closed Wednesday at 41. Heavy selling by the longs was the cause.
