BAKER CITY TEAM WON.

FOOTBALL GAME THANKSGIVING WAS
A WARM CONTEST.

Victory Went to Visitors Largely
Through Two Rank Decisions of
Referee O'Donnell's.

The Thanksgiving day football game between Baker City and Pendleton High School teams was the most enjoyable event that has ever taken place on the Alta street grounds. The weather was warm enough that spectators did not get chilled and the character of play was sufficiently exciting to stir sluggish blood. It is estimated that more than 300 persons were present. The teams were very evenly matched and visitors came in with local players for a fair share of applause for good playing. The visitors won the game, but their victory was largely due to two rank decisions of Referee O'Donnell, of Sumpter. An excuse could easily be made for one of those decisions, but for the other there can be none.

In the account of the game in detail following, it will be noticed that Pendleton boys had the best of the first half, although neither side scored, as the fighting was all done in Baker's territory. Referee O'Donnell's second displeasing decision was when early in the second half he allowed the Baker City boys to retain the ball after they had failed to make their yardage on three downs. The ball at that time was dangerously close to Pendleton's goal line, and the benefit of another down in which to make yardage was improved by the visitors, by securing a touchdown, kicking a goal, and by the play ultimately winning the game.

That decision could have been overruled for a referee might easily be honestly mistaken in keeping count of the number of downs in such times of momentous excitement, but what shall be said about the first pretentious decision, which was so rank it smelled to high heaven.

The second half Gard kicked off for Pendleton. It was exhilarating in the highest degree to see that pigskin stuffed with atmosphere go sailing high in air, over the heads of the Baker City lads, then bound and roll with all the elasticity of a jackrabbit through the goal post, over the goal line for a touchdown.

A Successful Event.
Stewart Creek, Ore., Nov. 25.—(On the evening of November 24, a basketball game was held at the school house, in social district No. 77. The proceeds were to be used in paying for the new desks, which had been ordered for the school. A literary and musical program was rendered by the school children, after which the baskets were auctioned off. There were twenty-one baskets sold, for which the sum of \$12.75 was received.

Rule 13 (c) says: "At kick off, if the ball is kicked across the goal line and is there declared dead when in possession of one of the side defending the goal, it is a touchback. If it is declared dead thus in possession of the attacking side, it is a touchdown."

The first sentence of rule 25 says: "A side which has made a touchback or a safety, must kick out, from not more than 25 yards outside the kicker's goal."

Pendleton having at kickoff sent the ball over Baker's goal, it was secured by a Baker City player, which made it a touchback. The kicking should have taken place in Baker's territory. Pendleton having the ball, but some one had blundered, or failed, or something, and the game was lost. It was too bad, wasn't it, to see Pendleton High School team lose, when playing the better game?

Game in Detail.
At 2:30 the platoon was taken to the center of the field. Baker kicked to Pendleton's 15-yard line; Larone caught the ball and advanced it 15 yards; then the scrimmage began. Cronin made straight buck of four yards; Gard went through line for three yards; on fake play Larone made seven yards; Baker's ball on downs; Reeves Baker's start right ball, goes around end for 10 yards; on fumble, Pendleton's ball; side over; little Jim Wyrick made a beautiful run of 20 yards; the ball now in Baker's territory; looks very good for Pendleton; the ball was advanced by end run by Stevens, Hession and Wyrick, and soon was on Baker's 15-yard line when on downs they lost ball; Baker's hard work commenced; they advanced the ball by good end runs; Baker tried many a time to gain through Pendleton by line bucking, but it was useless, as it was like a stone wall; soon the ball was in center of field again and by hard playing Pendleton recovered the ball on downs; after Gard and Cronin hit the line for a few yards, the whistle blew, with the ball on Pendleton side in Baker's territory; score, 0 to 0.

Second Half.
When the whistle blew, every man was at his place ready for the final round; Pendleton kicked off to Baker; Gard made a powerful kick over the goal line causing the ball to be brought back and kicked over again; Gard then kicked to Baker's 20-yard line; good tackle by Mackery kept the ball on 20-yard line; Baker by snappy playing on ends took the ball down the field to Pendleton's 15-yard line; there is where dissatisfaction with a ruling by Referee O'Donnell came in; Baker failed to make its yardage and Pendleton was entitled to the ball by rules, but the referee blew whistle and said "play ball." Baum and Haley, linemen, saw the mistake and tried to have it corrected but failed; Baker forced the ball over the line, made a touchdown, and kicked a goal; score 6 to 0 in favor of Baker City; Pendleton kicked off and soon got the ball; Stevens made a beautiful run of 25 yards around left end, almost having a straight line for a touchdown; Pendleton soon had ball on Baker's 10-yard line, with four minutes to play; Wyrick took the ball for three yards; Baker claimed line was up, but Timekeeper Haley said 45 seconds still to play; Cronin took the ball; and he was pushed over the line for a touchdown, with a few seconds to play; the audience went wild with joyous excitement; Gard failed to kick goal; men went bitterly; the girls said "darn it," and the game was over, with score of 6 to 0 in favor of Baker City. Rev. C. A. Dotson officiated as umpire; William O'Donnell, of Sumpter, referee; A. C. Haley, timekeeper; Sol Baum and Arch Bostwick, linemen.

HIGH SCHOOLS CEMENT FRIENDSHIP.

Baker City Team Given a Reception in Assembly Hall.

The friendship of Baker City and Pendleton High School teams was cemented last evening when the visitors were given a reception in Assembly hall, which had been decorated and arranged with artistic taste for the occasion. Lace curtains at the windows, festoons of blue and yellow ribbon—the team colors—tables lighted with wax tapers and Japanese lanterns,

the homelike setting on the stage, made a pretty picture. The hearty welcome accorded the visitors put them at ease, and the evening passed quickly and most enjoyably. Prof. E. B. Conklin, principal of the public schools, presided and delivered the opening address, which was responded to felicitously by Prof. William Hyde Stalker, of the Baker City schools on behalf of the visitors. Then came a chorus by Pendleton's High School pupils, address by Rev. C. A. Dotson, song by Elvin Lampkin, accompanied on the piano by Miss Ethel Kimball; recitation by Miss Lulu Simpson; song by quartet consisting of Messrs. McCarty, Saulsbury, Gard and Hawke.

Rev. F. L. Forbes, president of Pendleton academy, was in good humor, as he said, after having partaken liberally of Thanksgiving turkey and later learning that the team of the institution of which he is the head had defeated Goldendale in a game of football by a score of 12 to 3, he gave a little of the early history of football, declared himself in favor of clean athletic sports and hoped that foot ball would be kept within control of schools of all grades and be played by the younger generation. He expressed pleasure at the good feeling existing between his academy and the public schools and also between Baker City and Pendleton. His remarks were humorous at times and always instructive.

A triple trio of young ladies sang a song, after which the chairman announced that the evening was drawing to a close and that the visitors would be entertained with refreshments and other important and less important subjects. It was done as he had said.

Teachers and High School pupils had been organized into committees, and the visitors and their duties with grace and with tact.

Conspicuously displayed upon the rear wall of the stage was a handsome silk and satin flag of blue and yellow, which had been presented to the foot-ball team by Mrs. Cronin, mother of the popular player tackle. On a stand at one side of the stage was a silver cup emblematic of victory in field sports won by Pendleton High School team last spring. It was bedecked with team colors of Pendleton academy and the winners.

The reception was a pleasing feature of the visit to Baker City of the Baker City High School football team.
