GENERAL NEWS.

Smallpox cases are increasing in
New York city and the authorities are
uneasy, fearing an epidemic in the in-
fested district.

Governor Pingree, of Michigan, has
pardoned both General White and Gen-
eral Marsh upon the payment of \$5000
fine each, in the face of their recent
convictions for frauds against the state.

Senator Fairbanks introduced a bill
in the senate to admit Oklahoma as a
state, with two representatives. The
usual provisions for a constitutional
convention and the grants of land for
state institutions are made.

General MacArthur makes his week-
ly death list to the department and it
is much longer than heretofore. The
American soldiers in the Philippines
are losing their lives from disease at a
rapid rate as these lists show.

The Jesse Morrison murder trial at
Eldorado, Kansas, is nearing its end.
The strongest evidence against the
young woman is the death bed evidence
furnished by Mrs. Castle, whom Miss
Morrison is accused of killing on ac-
count of jealousy. Miss Morrison was
courted by the man that Mrs. Castle
married. Mrs. Castle died from wounds
in the throat made with a razor.

Shafroth's irrigation bill is now in
the hands of the committee on public
lands. It directs the geological survey
to make surveys of at least four
reservoir sites and ditches therefrom
in each of the arid land states, which
are designated as Washington, Idaho,
California, Oregon, Nevada, Utah,
Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Kansas,
Nebraska, South Dakota and North
Dakota.

Preparations for a prize fighting
carnival, to be held in Cincinnati in
February, are under way. The prelimi-
nary steps in the matter were taken
when James J. Corbett, acting for the
Cincinnati promoters, signed Tommy
Ryan of Syracuse to box Jack Root of
Chicago 20 rounds for a percentage of
the gate receipts. The men will fight at
158 pounds, weighing on the date of the
battle, February 15.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Wasco county warrants are "called"
to September 1, 1897. The county is
over three years behind in the pay-
ment of its obligations.

Andrew Snover, a well known
business man in Portland, died at
Fairview, near that city, Monday
night. He had been in bad health for
a long time. His age was 49 years.

Fred J. Ziegler, captain of the Uni-
versity of Oregon football eleven, has
been honored by selection for an end
position on the All-Pacific coast team,
which was chosen by California ex-
perts.

A lot of 80 beehives were shipped from
Baker City Monday night for Frye &
Brother, of Seattle. The band averaged
1200 pounds, and it is said that the
owners realized 3 1/2 cents, and foot,
which makes the price per head about
\$42.

In the case of Drake C. O'Reilly vs.
Columbia Southern, E. E. Lytle, et al.,
a demurrer to the complaint was
sustained some time ago and a petition
for a rehearing thereon was denied,
whereupon the plaintiff abandoned and
dismissed the suit.

Two weeks ago James Hays missed
a yearling heifer, eye the Enterprise
Chieftain. Eight days later he dis-
covered that she had fallen into a
cellar. As the cellar was almost filled
with potatoes, she was none the worse
for the experience.

Frank Wilson, a mere child, is in the
Tacoma jail. The little fellow says
his parents died years ago at Omaha,
Nebr., since which time he has been
tramping over the country; and when
he could, stealing rides on freight
trains.

George G. Van Wagner, an old and
highly-respected resident of Salem,
died Tuesday, after an illness of six
months. Deceased was born January
2, 1831, in Dutchess county, New York.
He came to Oregon in 1855 and was en-
gaged in the furniture business until
1880.

THE ISTHMIAN CANAL
BILL IN THE
SENATE.And Army Reorganization Bill
in the House.

REPUBLICAN OPPOSITION TO LATTER

Representative McCall, of Massachusetts, Ob-
jects to Granting Such Power
to the President.

Washington, Dec. 6.—The senate au-
dience was again large this morning
when that body met, the ship subsidy
bill being the attraction. Disappoint-
ment soon came when after ordinary
proceedings the senate went into execu-
tive session to consider the "Hay-
Fauntleroy" treaty.

Senator Mallory introduced the bill
for the construction of the isthmian
canal over the Nicaraguan route. It
provided for a board of nine men to
take charge of the work.

Army Bill in the House.
In the house the army bill was taken
up over the oleomargarine bill which
had the special order for the day. The
amendment providing for the addition
of one hundred and fifty surgeons in
the Philippines was adopted, as was
the amendment providing for a corps
of dental surgeons in the army.

McCall Objects.
Something of a sensation was created
during the debate on the army bill in
the house by McCall, of Massachusetts,
who delivered an hour's speech in op-
position to the bill. He criticized
some of the technical features of
the bill, charging that the organization
proposed was not economical in that it
contemplated the same number of
officers for the army of 50,000 as for an
army of 100,000. He was especially
severe upon the proposition to lodge
with the president for all time, unless
congress acted to the contrary, power
to double the army at will, but it was
against the policy of retaining the
Philippines and the inauguration of
the colonial policy that he opened all
his batteries.

Members streamed into the house
from the cloak rooms when it became
known that McCall was speaking
and listened with great eagerness to
his speech.
McCall said he did not believe in
the principle of giving the executive
authority to multiply almost by two
the regular army although President
McKinley would doubtless exercise that
discretion patriotically and wisely. The
objection was one of principle. Such a
grant of power could not be paralleled
in constitutional monarchies. It was
not conferred with any limitations as
to time. The bill proposed a standing
army of practically 100,000 men. Such
number he said was not needed.

Reduction of War Tax.
Washington, Dec. 6.—The house com-
mittee of ways and means, at a
full meeting, this morning, adopted
a bill prepared by the republicans
providing for a \$40,000,000 reduction in
the war revenue tax, with but one
change, that it shall take effect im-
mediately upon its passage instead of
thirty days thereafter.

Greater Reduction Demanded.
The war tax reduction bill will be
reported Friday or Saturday.
Richardson, the democratic leader,
expressed great dissatisfaction at the
provision of the bill, demanding a
greater reduction, while the brewers
want a dollar reduction flat.

QUEEN VICTORIA'S SPEECH.

She Addresses the House of Commons
in a Special Session.

London, Dec. 6.—The shortest speech
made from the English throne on
record was read in the house of com-
mons at 2 o'clock this afternoon. It
said: "It has become necessary to
make further provisions for expenses
incurred by the operations of my
armies in South Africa and China. I
have summoned you to hold a special
session in order that you may give your
sanction to enactments required for
that purpose. I will not enter upon
any public matter requiring your at-
tention until the ordinary meeting of
parliament in the spring." There is a
full attendance of members of parlia-
ment. The debate will open with the
moving for amendment by the opposi-
tion to address a reply to the queen's
speech and likely it is that Joseph
Chamberlain will be severely attacked.

CONFESION OF A MONSTER.

Little Girl, Three Years Old, Was Tor-
tured to Death.
Mayville, Ky., Dec. 6.—William
Gibson, who fatally tortured his step-
daughter to death, at Cattleburg,
this state, with a red hot iron, was
placed in jail here this morning,
having been captured in Carter county,
yesterday. The prisoner said other-
wise he would not have been in the
jail. He said he had accepted the
offer and would vote against the
subsidy bill and for a larger army in
the Philippines for the purpose only of
continuing the war there in accordance
with the vote of the people at the
recent election.

FALL OF BILLY EMERSON.

Drink Has Been the Ruin of This Tal-
ented Desciple of Minstrelsy.
Chicago, Ill., Dec. 6.—From being
the highest priced comedian on the
vaudeville stage for years, Billy Em-
erson, known from ocean to ocean as
the king of the minstrel world, is said to
be gleaming a living from the saloons
of Cincinnati by singing his famous
songs.
A month ago Emerson was in
Chicago on the verge of a nervous
collapse. He visited some of his old
haunts and then left for Cincinnati.
Before he left Chicago he was confined
to his bed in the St. Charles hotel, and
at that time it was feared he would
die.

LABOR FEDERATION
IN ANNUAL
SESSION.Attendance of Two Hundred
and Fifty Delegates.

GOMPERS' REPORT IS INTERESTING

Railway Telegraphers Tie Up the Gulf, Colo-
rado and Santa Fe, and Not a Wheel
is Moving on That Road.
Louisville, Ky., Dec. 6.—The annual
convention of the Federation of Labor
met in Music hall, this city at 10
o'clock this morning, with an atten-
dance of 250 delegates. President Com-
perts responded to the address of wel-
come, delivered by William Higgins,
after which Gompers' report was read.
It opened with a review of the history
of labor of the century just closing and
of the strike record. He said the
statistics indicate considerable im-
provements and achievements for the
year. Of the 668 strikes, 455 were suc-
cessful. Of compulsory arbitration he
said it was only practicable when
voluntary. Of the negro organization,
he said unless the Federation continues
to be the friend of the negro serious
consequences will ensue.

The secretary's report shows receipts
of \$80,000 and expenditures of \$68,000,
leaving a balance of \$12,000 in the
treasury. The gain in membership was
300,000 during the past year.

President Gompers will be re-elected
unanimously, John Mitchell, of the
miner's union, announcing that he
will not permit his name to be used.
Railway Telegraphers Strike.
Fort Worth, Dec. 6.—A conference be-
tween the Gulf, Colorado and Santa
Fe railway officials and the railway
telegraphers here culminated in a
strike on the entire system this morn-
ing. Not a train is moving. The com-
pany refused to submit to arbitration
rules and regulations, but was willing
to grant the wage scale demanded.

MINISTER WU WANTS INFORMATION.

Washington, Dec. 6.—Minister Wu
called early this morning at the state
department to obtain information of
the details of the agreement signed by
the envoys at Peking yesterday. After-
wards he said he had not seen the
text but believed the agreement on the
whole would be satisfactory to the im-
perial government of China.

VERDICT OF CORONER'S JURY.

San Francisco, Dec. 6.—The coroner's
jury at noon today rendered a verdict
of the Thanksgiving day fatality in
this city, holding the victims were on
the glass work's roof against orders and
the temporary resistance of the owners
thereof, and had no business there.
No one is held responsible for the
deaths, which were entirely accidental.

POPE SUBMITS TO AN OPERATION.

Rome, Dec. 6.—The Messagero today
says Dr. Mazzoni has operated on the
pope for a tumor under the arm.
Twenty months ago a cyst was removed
from the pope's thigh.

A DENIAL OF REPORT.

Rome, Dec. 6.—Dr. Laponi later
denied the report that the pope had
been operated upon.

CHARTER FOR RAILWAY.

Victoria, Dec. 6.—A charter has been
applied for the building of a railway
next year from Victoria north, cross-
ing the Seymour Narrows to the east
through Yellowhead pass. McKenzie
and Mann are believed to be behind
the scheme.

POSTMASTERS APPOINTED.

Washington, Dec. 6.—President Mc-
Kinley sent nominations of Joseph
Baker, as postmaster at Antioch, and
Charles Durner, at Benicia, California.

OFFICERS RE-ELECTED.

Washington, Dec. 6.—The Women's
Christian Temperance Union this
morning re-elected the present general
officers.

LORD ROBERTS LEAVES DURBAN.

Cape Town, Dec. 6.—Lord Roberts
left Durban this morning for this city.
He was given an enthusiastic send off.
