MURDER MYSTERY CLEARED.

Martin Stickle and Ed. Pierce the Murderers of Cornelius Knapp and Wife.

Castle Rock, Wash., Dec. 6.—The murderer of Cornelius Knapp and wife, as they sat at their supper table at their home in this place Wednesday night of last week, is under arrest and in jail at Tacoma, and he has confessed. Martin Stickle is the assassin. He involves a man named Ed Pierce in his confession. Stickle says he and Pierce together planned to kill the aged couple for a few paltry dollars of pension money that they were supposed to have in the house.

About a year ago William B. Shanklin was killed at Kelso, near Castle Rock, in a similar manner. He was also a pensioner. Stickle and Pierce shot Shanklin as he sat in his cabin one night and they robbed his body of \$30 in money and a watch. No clue to the murder of Shanklin was ever obtained, until Stickle's confession was made.

Upon the basis that Martin Stickle, a fisherman, has been held for murder of three persons, it is short of miracles that his residence was not searched, for there has been found in his possession property belonging to old man Shanklin—a bowie knife and a silver watch—which have been identified as the property of the Kelso pensioner killed a year ago.

LUMBER COMPANY HELD UP.

Masked Men in Portland Secure \$5,000 With Pistols.

Portland, Dec. 6.—Six masked men, heavily armed, held up the office of the Western Lumber company last night and secured \$5,000 and made their escape in the darkness. The robbery occurred when dozens of men were in the vicinity of the mill, which is located at Front and Seventeenth streets.

Four men guarded the two entrances to the office while the other two entered with drawn revolvers and ordered the four clerks to hold up their hands. The money was in gold and silver, and was enclosed in envelopes ready to be paid out to the mill hands, this being the regular weekly pay day.

One robber with a revolver in each hand kept the clerks covered while the other quickly threw the money in packages into a sack. The two backed out of the office, locked the doors and the entire gang escaped.

The police station was immediately notified.

CASE OF TOO MUCH JOHNSON.

The Trouble of Two Walla Wallans to Be Sued in Frisco.

San Francisco, Dec. 6.—Mrs. Evaliza Johnson of Walla Walla, Wash., has secured a warrant for the arrest of her husband, William J. Johnson, on a charge of bigamy. She alleges that he was married in this city last September to Minnie G. Winters, of Seaside, Ore. Johnson was for several years in the confectionary business at Walla Walla, and deserted his wife there and came to this city with the Winter's woman. Mrs. Johnson recently arrived here.

The Fall of Brooklyn Bridge.

The Brooklyn bridge is being weakened by electrolysis. Its four great cables are live wires through which wildcat currents are constantly flowing. These are escaping to the ground through the anchorages, which they are eating away at an estimated rate of nine tons a year. 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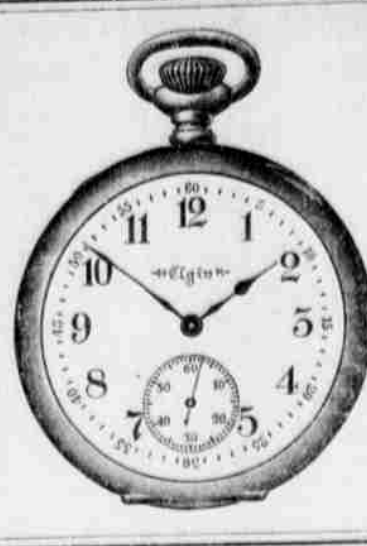
