STOLE TRAPPING OUTFIT.

A Man at Echo Gets Away With His "Partner's" Baggage.

For many years Henry Baldeizer has been trapping in the Umatilla river and on other streams in the vicinity of Echo. He had a cabin and had accumulated quite a wardrobe and a good supply of household furniture, including bedding, kitchen utensils, etc. For the past two or three years he has had a "partner," but the deal is off. The story of Damon and Pythias and the tale of "Tennessee's Partner" don't go at all in this case. The new member of the firm is named Henderson. Mr. Baldeizer recently announced that he was going to take a trip to the Camas creek country in the southern part of the county and would come down Butter creek on his return. He expected to be away a week or 10 days to look after the prospects for profit in trapping on those streams.

He started out on his trip and Mr. Henderson proceeded to haul up a large quantity of the household furniture and pack it away. Judging from the amount taken it is thought he must have used a wagon, for more is missing than could have been carried away on a horse. Instead of taking his proposed trip Mr. Baldeizer came to Pendleton and only staid a couple of days, and upon his return quickly discovered that his home had been despoiled of much of its contents, although the cookstove was not among the things taken. He came back to Pendleton and notified the sheriff of his depredations, and one of them went to Echo this morning to see what could be done to bring Mr. Henderson to time.

The Fall of Brooklyn Bridge.

The Brooklyn bridge is being weakened by electrolysis. Its four great cables are live wires through which wildcat currents are constantly flowing. These are escaping to the ground through the anchorages, which they are eating away at an estimated rate of nine tons a year. Echolites in Pendleton.

Echo is well represented in Pendleton today by Jesse Moore, W. Whitworth, C. R. Lisle, A. B. Thompson and others. They are all interested in stock, cattle, horses and hogs. Mr. Moore sometimes feeds as many as 500 head of cattle during the winter for beef, but is short this year. Mr. Whitworth is devoting the most of his time to the dairy. J. B. Saylor is feeding 300 head of cattle, probably as many as any person in that section. On the Meadows and lower Butter creek there are nearly 4000 head of cattle being raised and fitted for market.
