MAKE GOOD USE OF BOOKS.

The Federation of Women's Clubs of Pendleton Start Two Free Libraries.

Some time ago four cases of books were turned over to the library department of the Woman's club of Portland, by the Free Library Association, of that city. During a recent visit of Mrs. C. R. Wade, of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, to Portland, arrangements were made to have two of the cases sent to Pendleton to be taken in charge by a committee made up of representatives of the clubs here. Such a committee was organized, with Mrs. E. P. Marshall, as chairman. The books arrived, the railroad furnishing free transportation, were neatly covered by the committee, and have been sent on their way, one case to Meacham, where Miss Agnes Lane will act as librarian, the other to Pilot Rock, where a responsible person will be found to take charge of the books at the latter place.

The reception accorded to these books in the smaller towns, and the outcome of this experiment on the part of the library association and the clubs will be watched with great interest by many people in Oregon. Out of small beginnings of this kind splendid systems of traveling libraries have grown in many states.

ENTHUSIASTIC GRAND GUARDIAN.

Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdall Has Returned From Trip to Colorado.

Mrs. C. C. Van Orsdall, grand guardian, has returned from a trip to Colorado, having been away nearly a month on an official visit to the circles of Women of Woodcraft of the eastern part of that state. She visited the circles of 15 different cities, including those of Denver. The meeting at the last mentioned place was held under the auspices of the nine circles of the city and 1500 members were present. Mrs. Van Orsdall was the recipient of an elegant present on that occasion, two candidates and clock manufactured of mosaic gold and marble. It was presented by the nine circles of Denver in appreciation of the meritorious work of the grand guardian and greatly pleased the recipient.

Mrs. Van Orsdall states that the Women of Woodcraft numbered more than 10,000 on the first of December, and that the 20th century will commence with a membership of more than 20,000. There are 311 circles in existence, and the grand guardian says the order is the most successful of any secret society of the kind in the United States.
