NEW YORK MARKET.
Reported by I. L. Ray & Co., Chicago Board of Trade and New York Stock Exchange Brokers.

December 13.—Wheat was weak today on lower cables and trading was light. Liverpool closed 5-11 3/4. New York passed unchanged, 79 5/8. May, and declined steadily to the close, 79c. The market is a disappointment to the trade as it was assumed that with a crop of 75,000,000 under last year, and a shortage in Europe, prices would do better. Notwithstanding this short-ages primary receipts on the crop are only 5,000,000 under last year to this date. The visible supply is 7,000,000 larger and reported shipments are 14,000,000 less. With receipts so liberal and stocks so large it is argued we can not look for much advance in the immediate future. Stocks are all lower. Money, 4 per cent.

Smallpox at Colville.
Colville is awakening to the fact that the disease which has been for a year past designated by the local physicians as Manila itch is in fact smallpox. In the past two months two deaths have

resulted from this malady, and one victim has lost his sight. It is said that the state quarantine law is inoperative except in seaboard and border towns, where invasion of infectious diseases from foreign countries is possible. The coming legislature will be asked to enact a law covering the case and provide severe penalties for violation. There have been over 50 cases of smallpox in Colville within the past six months. The attacks have been light, but this is due to the general practice of vaccination and the season of the season. As the cold weather approaches the disease becomes more severe.

N. P. Telegraphers Stirred Up.
The Northern Pacific's action in introducing the system of telephones between St. Paul and the coast for the transmission of train orders may cause a decided upheaval among the telegraphers of the company. This scheme will necessarily displace a large number of the men, they maintain, and already complaint is beginning to be heard from the aggrieved operators. A report comes from St. Paul that already a committee of operators has held a conference with the Northern Pacific officials, in which the matter of the present wage scale and the telephone project were discussed. There has been no decided action shaped as yet by the operators and it is probable that the reported action will amount to very little.

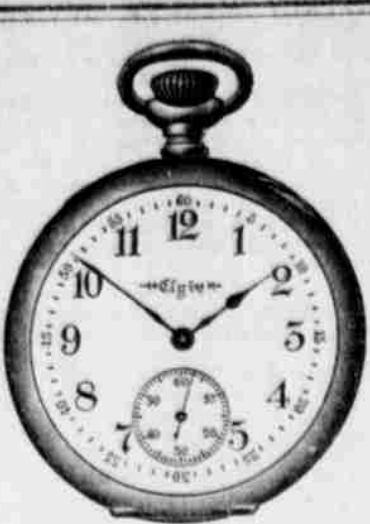

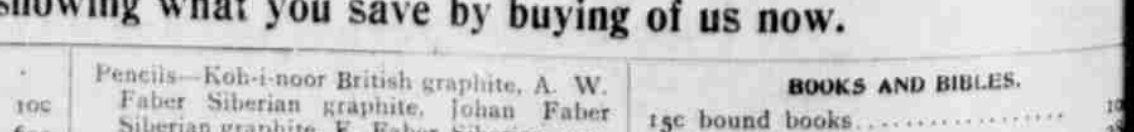
