"NECROSIS OF THE BONES."

The Japanese in British Columbia Victims of the Disease.

A most peculiar and dreadful disease is attacking the Japanese of British Columbia. The doctors call it "necrosis of the bones," and it is said to be very rare. It is perhaps of the same family as leprosy, but is not contagious. It is a new disease, attacks the bones. First the marrow decomposes, then the hard part of the bone. Nature makes a brave effort to make up for the rotting tissue by building a bone around the decomposing log, but lack of food, and consumption of decomposed food, compels nature to give away, and the casing snaps and the leg is broken.

This happens first to one leg; then to the other. Then the arms, when the disease finally eats its way into the bones of the neck or the spinal column and the Jap is no more. The destitute Japs who did not smuggle themselves into the United States, are indeed in a desperate condition. Many of them are starving and have been rescued in the nick of time by sympathetic whites, but there is a legion of them living on scarcely enough to keep a canary alive, and decomposed food at that; thus this horrible new disease "necrosis of the bones."

SCHOOL MONIES.

Superintendent Nowlin Apportions to Different Districts.

The school monies received by Superintendent J. F. Nowlin for apportionment among the different school districts of Umatilla county amounted to \$11,472, or \$2 to each of the 5738 school children in the county. Of the 107 districts in the county, 100 have made their report according to law, leaving seven in the list of districts that have presumably not reported on account of not being organized.

EXPOSITION PORTLAND 1905.

To commemorate the Centennial Anniversary of the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

The Oregon Historical Society, at its annual meeting in Portland Saturday, adopted resolutions recommending that a Northwestern Industrial exposition be held at Portland in 1905 to commemorate the centennial anniversary of the Lewis and Clark expedition to the Pacific coast. The resolutions request the governor of Oregon to ask the coming legislature to give financial aid to the undertaking and also request him to transmit to the governors of the states of Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming which were comprised, in whole or in part, in the "Oregon country," a copy of the resolutions with an invitation to the people of those states to participate in the exposition. It is the purpose of the society to seek aid from the national government for the exposition.

A Payment of \$1 Must Accompany Applications for Them.

It has been decided by the newly formed Transcontinental Passenger Association to issue for 1901 an annual interline clergy half-fare permit, good over the lines named in the body of the permit west of Chicago, Wyo., Albuquerque, N. M., and El Paso, Tex. To meet the extra expense because of the greater accommodation thus granted—the maintenance of the clergy bureau, etc. a charge will be made of \$1, which must accompany each application. Such applications will be made through station agents of the roads, and addressed to James Charlton, chairman Transcontinental Passenger Association, at Denver, Colo.
