HEREFORDS AND SHORTHORNS.

Twenty-two head purchased for Eastern Oregon and Washington.

At the international sale of cattle at the Union stockyard, Chicago, on Tuesday and Wednesday, December 4 and 5, 22 head of Herefords and Shorthorns were purchased at auction for Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington breeders. C. H. Wade, of this city, purchased several head for the company he represents as well as a number of other animals for different persons throughout Eastern Oregon from whom he had received commissions. One of the animals knocked down to Mr. Wade was a Hereford bull, highly spoken of, for Joe Vay of Butte creek.

A. J. Splawn, of North Yakima, was the one who bought the registered Hereford No. 104,745, for \$500. Prince was bred in Missouri and was calved March 17, 1900. This animal stood at the head of his class of 47, and took the blue ribbon. Another choice animal purchased by Mr. Splawn was Beau Donald 31st, registered Hereford No. 106,865, calved February 15, 1900, for \$1350. This bull was bred in Kentucky. The bidding was spirited. Mr. Splawn's principal opponent was a man from Tennessee, who bid right along up to \$1350. Mr. Splawn then raised him \$50 at one jump, and the man from Tennessee, Mr. Splawn was the only man from Washington present at the sale and had previously examined Beau Donald 31st and decided that he was the animal he wanted, and when he got warmed up he decided to buy the bull if it cost him \$2000, bid what he felt the Washington breeders have.

N. C. Maris, representing W. O. Minor, of Heppner, was at the sale and got away with two Shorthorn heifers, which cost him \$1000 each. Mr. Minor has at his Mountain Valley ranch just as good Shorthorn cattle as there are on exhibition anywhere, and these two additions will add to the attractiveness of his herd.

These 22 head of cattle arrived Sunday in two cars at La Grande where the Wade animals were detained and taken to the Pleasant View stock farm, eight miles east of La Grande, near Hot Lake. The bull for Joe Vay and the animals for Messrs. Splawn and Minor were brought on to Pendleton today. At this point Mr. Splawn put his stock onto a W. & C. R. train and they will be shipped this evening toward North Yakima. His stock farm lies 10 miles west of that city.

At the international stock sale 25 head of Herefords were sold at an average price of \$453. The Polled Angus animals sold averaged \$234 apiece, while the average price paid for Shorthorns was \$235.

ON THE RAILROAD BRIDGE.

Two Ladies and Two Gentlemen Have a Narrow Escape.

Two ladies and two gentlemen while crossing the railroad bridge over the Unatilla river in East Pendleton at 5 o'clock Sunday evening had a narrow escape from a horrible death. The express train from Spokane was coming at the rate of about 50 miles an hour. Jack Wright was at the throttle on the locomotive, and was sorry to find, for he stated afterwards that he was not as bold as he seemed as ever in his life. The quartet were walking toward Pendleton oblivious of approaching danger, and the engineer spied them just in time, and yanked the lever back in order to stop the train, applying the air brakes, also, but it was impossible to do anything but slow up. The two

ladies fainted and were dragged to the side of the track by the men, just as the train passed. The trainmen did not recognize the parties and the East Oregonian has not been able to ascertain who they were.

NEW YORK MARKET.

December 17.—Wheat was dull today, traders awaiting the final government report which will come out after the close of change. Liverpool was unchanged. New York opened 3 1/2 lower, 75 5/8, the low point of the day, and closed at 79, the high point. The visible supply showed a decrease for the week of 415,000, and corn a decrease of 724,000. Railroad stocks strong and higher. New York says the heaviest investment buying known in years is being executed.

Wheat Shipments From Portland.

Portland's wheat shipments for the week ending Saturday, December 15, were over 950,000 bushels. No other part in the United States has shipped as much wheat in a single week during the present season, and no other port or other two ports in the Pacific Northwest ever shipped so much in two weeks. Portland exceeded this record once in January, 1898, by getting out something over 1,000,000 bushels in six days, but the figures for the week just ended are believed to be the second best on record for this port for a single week. No attempt was made at record-breaking, but the ships were just hustled along because Portland exporters had bought the wheat and chartered the ships.
