EXPERIENCES IN PHILIPPINES.

Died From the Shock of Being Wounded.

Scared by a Smooth Bore.

Charles J. Ferguson, of Pendleton, who is visiting relatives in Walla Walla, tells the Walla Walla Union of some of his experiences in the Philippines, several of which have not been before in print, as follows:

"For the most part I was with the troops on the north line, which was opposite the scene of the operations of the Washington regiment. Only once was I with the Washingtons and that was when a reconnoitering party was put across the Pasig opposite San Pedro Macuti. On that short trip I saw one of the strangest things I ever fell to my lot. I do not now remember what company the young fellow belonged to, but there was a private who received a wound in the leg. I happened to be near him when the shot was fired and assisted in laying him behind a rock. He did not appear to be badly hurt and I told him I would find a doctor in a short time and left him while I went in search of a surgeon. After a few minutes I returned with a physician and the man was dead. The wound was simply a flesh wound, but the man had died from heart failure. He had been a superstitious nature and the shock of the bullet piercing his flesh had been so severe that he could not recover and had died almost at once.

"Many of our expeditions were made almost alone but on others there was a guard. It speaks well for the love of the volunteer soldier that Maj. Bell once expressed the opinion that he would rather have a detachment of volunteers with him than regulars. He said the regular might have more staying power in a long fight where the troops were on the defensive and ammunition had to be saved but that for short, quick dash and the kind of work which he and his men had to do, the volunteer was much the best soldier.

"I think the worst scared I ever was in my life was one time in front of the Washington line. It was while the line was being held along the ridge just on the Manila side of Guadalupe and the niggers were in force along the front about 1000 yards away. They had an old smooth bore gun which they had been firing from time to time and which the boys had got to despise for the reason that it never carried anywhere near where they were. Well I was on a scouting trip far in advance of the regular established front and was easily within range of the rifle fire of the line of hills behind which the Filipinos were. I had never been under artillery fire and did not know there was a big gun there at all.

"All at once the thing went off. It made noise enough to drown out a whole Fourth of July celebration and I was so scared for a moment that I did not know whether I was dead or alive. I was simply in a lethargic state and waited for the balls to come and tear me all to pieces. From that I changed into a state of wonderment that I was still alive. Finally I regained my composure and was able enough to realize that I was not hurt at all and that all I had to do was to continue on about my business. Then I really felt relieved. I can tell you I have been in some pretty tight places and had to run for my life once or twice, but I was never on another occasion so badly scared as I was when that gun was fired at me and there was in reality no danger at all."

WALLA WALLA WATER WORKS.

Under City Management There is a Surplus in the Treasury.

The report of the Walla Walla water works just issued shows that from all sources the revenue has been \$34,443.57 which includes water rents, a reserve of water power, property and the cost of water material. Miscellaneous rents brought in \$20,329.08; irrigation \$9665.10 and metered water \$4370.90. The operating expenses and repairs amounted to \$1304.78 and general expenses \$619.69. The net income for the year is given as \$30,301.74. The expenditures of the distributing system amounted to \$709.50 and \$17,787.73 has been paid in to the city treasurer. The cash statement shows receipts of \$34,309.78, and disbursements of \$31,072.32, leaving a cash balance of \$3,237.46.

A total distance of 25 miles, 3500 feet of water mains are shown to be laid in the city, being an extension since the beginning of the year of 5,701 1/2 feet. A total of 95 meters are in operation.

ASSESSMENT INEQUALITIES.

Some of the Inconsistencies of the Assessment Values.

The assessment of the Oregon counties for 1900, as shown by the rolls, have the usual inconsistencies and inequalities of an iniquitous system of taxation. The rolls show that assessing property is all guess work and in spite of the fact that the present system has been in vogue for years and years the assessment is as imperfect as at the beginning. Taxation that is not equal is robbery and by such taxation the morals of all society is attacked.

A glance, for instance, at the tax rolls will show that horses are fewer in number in 1900 than in 1899, by 587, but in valuation there is a gain of \$72,751. With cattle the results are just opposite, their number being increased this year over last by 11,049, but their valuation is reduced \$50,939. In the sheep and goat items the results are reversed again, the number this year falling off over 40,000, while the valuation is increased over \$50,000, according to the vagaries of the respective assessors, the increase and decrease in the counties being no where near equal. It remains for the assessor to come forward with a double gain, 891 in number and \$3596 in value over 1899, Walla Walla being the banner county for bogs, the number assessed in that county being 18,346. Douglas county standing next with 14,275. There are about 80,000 bogs, according to the assessors, in the state, valued at about \$170,000, barely more than \$2 each.
