PENDLETON HIGH SCHOOL WINS SEASON WITH A VICTORY.

La Grande Team Shows Great Improvement, Having Received Instructions From a Coach.

The game of football Christmas afternoon on the Alton street grounds between the High School teams of La Grande and Pendleton, was a fine exhibition. Pendleton won handily, but had to fight for victory, as the La Grande team showed marked improvement over the game on their ground in November when they lost to Pendleton by a score of 63 to nothing. They have been receiving the instructions of Ernest Patrick Mahaffey, and their playing showed the effects of it. A large crowd was present and enjoyed the game, which was played in a gentlemanly manner. The visitors made many friends by their deportment and it is hoped that next year they will again be seen in Pendleton.

Manager George Hansen, the visiting eleven and two substitutes, Wallace Childers and Jasper, and Coach Mahaffey were accompanied to Pendleton by Mrs. E. P. Mahaffey, Miss Lena Coy, Lester Coy, Frank R. Brown, E. Wakinger, and Claude Jones. The players were escorted to the Hotel Pendleton.

First Half of the Game.

In the first half of 25 minutes Mr. Mahaffey acted as referee and Prof. R. S. Pond, of the Pendleton Academy, as umpire. Harley Rothrock and Lester Lewis were linemen. La Grande kicked off, and after a few seconds of play, including a fumble, McCarty made a run around La Grande right end for a gain of 30 yards; after a little blocking without great gain, a little Jim Wyrick went around the left end for a gain of 15 yards; straight-backing for six downs brought a touchdown, and Will Wyrick kicked goal; time, 7 1/2 minutes; score, Pendleton 6, La Grande 0.

La Grande again kicked off, and McCarty got the ball. Will Wyrick ran around left end for a gain of five yards; rain made the ball hard to hold, and Pendleton lost it on fumble; La Grande was equally unfortunate, and lost it on fumble after one down; Jim Wyrick ran around left end for a gain of three yards; McCarty made a run for a gain of 50 yards, but ran out of bounds, so was brought back to point where the gain was but 12 yards; center was backed for four yards; fowl tackle by La Grande advanced the ball 10 yards; Stevens ran around left end for a gain of 15 yards; Hopper making a good tackle, crisscross play gave Pendleton 12 1/2 yards; Pendleton failed to make yardage; La Grande's ball; La Grande failed to make yardage; Pendleton's ball; McCarty ran around right end for a gain of seven yards, when tackled by Captain Laughlin; Mr. Laughlin was straightened by McCarty, and when he went down was accidentally stepped upon, McCarty's foot alighting on his eye; Jasper was substituted for quarterback in place of Laughlin, and the game went merrily on; Jim Wyrick made a beautiful run around left end for a gain of 20 yards; backed center for three yards; McCarty carried the ball 10 yards further; Jim Wyrick took it seven; more; guard was pushed through the center for touchdown; Will Wyrick attempted goal, but kicked to left, leaving the score 11 to 0, and one minute to play.

La Grande kicked off, and McCarty got the ball, but was downed by the player from La Grande who was conspicuous on account of his red socks. First half ended, with ball 30 yards from Pendleton's goal, Pendleton having the ball.

Second Half.

Captain Laughlin came back to his position as quarterback. Pendleton kicked to La Grande's 30-yard line; La Grande's ball; Bay made run around right end for gain of several yards; La Grande lost ball; McCarty made right end run for five yards; backing center non-productive; Stevens was raised into the air with ball under his arm, but La Grande pushed him back; McCarty made a 30-yard run, right end, and Myers made a good tackle; straight-backing for several downs gave Pendleton another touchdown, and Will Wyrick kicked a strong goal, leaving the score 17 to 0.

La Grande kicked off, and Pendleton got the ball; McCarty ran around right end for 12 yards, and followed it up with the sensational play of the day, a run around right end for a gain of about 55 yards, ending with a touchdown. Will Wyrick kicked goal. Score 23 to 0.

La Grande kicked off, and after a play that would not be scored very distinctly, it was noticed that Pendleton had made a touchback, and brought the ball to the 25-yard line and kicked; La Grande got the ball, but Pendleton soon gained it; McCarty made a right end for 15 yards; crisscross play gave Captain Larson opportunity to gain five yards; he followed it with five yards more around right end; Jim Wyrick dashed around left end for 30 yards; McCarty ran five yards around right end; backing gave little gain; ball 40 yards from La Grande's goal; when the whistle announced the finish of the game, the score was: Pendleton, 23; La Grande, 0.

Reception to Visitors.

A reception was tendered to the visitors in Assembly hall, adjoining the High School building last, which was appreciated by the guests of honor and enjoyed by all. A neat musical and literary program was rendered.

The La Grande folks remained over in Pendleton today and will leave on the flyer for home this evening at 5:15. Although defeated, the La Grande football team is not prostrated by the successive shocks received, and will practice with vigor in the hope of having a winning aggregation next year.

The Pendleton High School team announces its retirement from active service for this year, with a record of two defeats and two victories.

New Year's Day Game.

The Weston football team will come to Pendleton to play a game with the Pendleton academy on New Year's day. Game will commence at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. The two teams met at Weston recently when the academy boys won in the rain by the score of 15 to 0. Ralph Balling, captain of the Weston team and its best player, was disabled in the first 10 minutes of

play, which may have had the effect of giving the visitors some of their scores. At any rate, the game New Year's day will certainly be exciting and will be well worth seeing. This will be the last time this winter and the first time next century that football enthusiasts will have an opportunity to see a game. Win or lose, the academy boys will disband after the game.

STRUCK THE LEDGE.

The Buffalo, Near Granite, Has Six Feet of Ore.

Peter Parmentier, the veteran mining man, arrived home from Grant county at 2 o'clock Christmas morning and will remain in Pendleton for the remainder of the winter. He states that the Buffalo, of which R. T. Cox is lessee, struck the ledge on Thursday of last week and is now in six feet of ore. Nearly \$20,000 of Pendleton money has been sunk in the Buffalo, it having been formerly owned by 10 men in Pendleton.

Portland parties now own it. The specimens brought from the Buffalo by Mr. Parmentier are rich in gold and silver and indicate that the property will be a producer of great value. Mr. Parmentier has three claims adjoining the Buffalo, as follows: Washington, California and Encouragement. They lie at the head of Chipman gulch and Granite creek, five miles from Granite City, Grant county.
