The apple industry of the Grande Ronde Valley in the past few years has grown to be one of the leading industries of Eastern Oregon, says the La Grande Chronicle, and few people are aware of the amount of apples raised, or the sum realized from the sale of the fruit. From the original Neesler tract alone, about 40 miles north of La Grande, across the river, which a few years ago was divided into five and ten-acre tracts, there has been sold this season \$8000 worth of apples and there yet remains unsold some in earloads, all first-class fruit of the very best varieties and free from any kind of pests whatever. C. D. Huffman, who bought one of the ten-acre tracts, a few years ago and planted it in apple trees, cleared above all expenses \$200 the first year the trees bore fruit.

ROBBERS ARRESTED.

Tom Burns and R. W. England Brought Back From The Dalles.

Tom Burns is in the county hospital critically ill with pneumonia and R. W. England is in the county jail. Mr. Burns arrived in Pendleton on Friday, December 21, coming in on the same train and representing himself to be property man of the Frawley company.

In the evening of that day he entered into an arrangement with R. W. England, the young man who has been operating the shoe-blackening game in front of Gus Lafontaine's, to take him along with the show. Mr. England, accompanied by Burns, went up into the second story of the Judd building, ostensibly to find Charley Graves, for the purpose of having him purchase the bootblack stand, so that England could sever the business ties binding him to Pendleton. While England hunted Graves, Burns hunted valuables. He entered the apartments of James Washington and emerged with a revolver in one hand and a sweater in the other. This was between 7 and 8 o'clock in the evening. The sweater was given to England, who placed it under lock and key in his strong box at his stand. Both went down to the Dalles on the train that carried the Frawley company.

Jim Washington notified the officials Saturday that he had been robbed the preceding evening of a watch, a charm, a revolver and a sweater.

Early Sunday morning a deputy sheriff at The Dalles telephoned that the two men were there. The charm, watch and revolver were found on Burns. He and England were brought up from The Dalles Monday by Sheriff
