The case of the state vs. Thomas Reed, charged with larceny by baillee, was postponed in Justice Fitz Gerald's court this morning to Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, same place.

George Krupke, a clerk in the post-office, at Portland, was shot three times and fatally wounded about 11 o'clock Saturday night by a footpad at the corner of Fourth and Montgomery streets. Krupke was on his way home and he resisted the footpad who shot him. The victim died at the hospital. The murderer escaped.

C. A. Lindsey, a business man at Lewiston, is under arrest there on a charge of adultery. The complaining witness is D. N. Meyers. The charge also includes the wife of the complainant. The officers found the defendants in the same bed and asleep when they entered the room. Meyers is a laboring man and Mrs. Meyers was acting as temporary housekeeper for Lindsey, whose wife is visiting in the east.

At 10 o'clock this morning the voting was a tie in choice of those who had purchased tickets as to their preferences for "The Duke's Jester," as billed, or for "Richelieu."

NEW YORK MARKET.

Reported by I. L. Ray & Co., Chicago Board of Trade and New York Stock Exchange Brokers.

January 6.—The wheat market was strong early and advanced a cent over Saturday, closed 84½, but there was considerable realizing at the advance and the reaction carried prices to 83 for May. Liverpool was up 5-8 to 6-34. New York opened 84, May, sold to 84½ and back to 83, closing at the low point. The visible supply showed a decrease for the week of 150,000.

Offered the Judge \$50.

A sensational episode occurred in the superior court room in Colfax, Saturday, when J. E. Jacobson, of Moscow, Idaho, attempted to publicly bribe Judge McDonald and was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail for his audacity. Mr. Jacobson attempted to induce Judge McDonald to administer a light fine upon J. W. Clark, who was convicted of selling liquor without a license, and fled to Idaho before sentence could be passed upon him. Mr. Jacobson offered the court \$50 if he would give Clark the minimum fine. Jacobson is said to be wealthy and is engaged in the lumber business in Moscow. He is apparently rather ignorant, as evidenced by his attempt to bribe the court in public. He seems to be unable to realize that he has done wrong. When searched a bottle of whisky and \$6.50 was found in his pocket. He is about 40 years old and has a wife and five children in Moscow. He is now in jail and is anxious to get out.

Massachusetts Industries.

The Massachusetts labor statistician reports 192,997 persons, out of a total population of 2,805,346, to be engaged in manufactures, as many as 82,624 being engaged in the making leather and shoes, 77,092 in building, 45,488 in clothing, 9045 in food preparations, 58,457 in machinery and metallic goods, 9887 in paper and paper goods, 127,117 in textiles, 21,374 in wooden goods and 61,415 in "other industries." In the "learned professions" of religion, law and medicine there are some 13,000 persons. For every 544 persons there is one engaged in religious work; for every 899 one engaged in law; for every 431 one engaged in medicine.

What the Maine State Experimental Station has to Say About Some Coffee Substitutes.

"Skim milk, which is ordinarily considered a rather thin beverage, contains almost twenty times as much food material as the average of the beverages made from cereal coffee. If made according to directions, one would have to drink 4½ gallons of an infusion of one of them which made an especial claim to high nutritive value in order to get as much food as is contained in a quart of skim milk."

"The comments here made are in no wise intended to condemn the beverages, but to point out that the claims for greater nutritive value are not founded on fact."
