### WATERS WERE NOT WISE.

Agent Charles Wilkins says that the result of unwise action on the part of the hunters, Indian Charles Wilkins has issued his permit that white men will not be permitted to hunt or shoot on the reservation. Permits have recently been given heretofore to enable them to enjoy a day's shooting on the Tutuilla game preserve and grouse on the Indian lands and in the foothills. The hunters have overstepped their license, and the Indians to protest to the agent on Sunday, January 6, and Thursday of last week hunters shot whisky to the Indians for the purpose of being allowed to hunt on the land. This might never have happened had it not been that one of the Indians thus approached was a member of the agency judiciary, and with an excellent reputation for the taking of whisky for a reservation is a serious offense against federal statutes. White men who are taking whisky are being sent to a term in jail that will be of great benefit.

White men must not break the laws and hunt on the reservation. They must get the permission of the agent before they are granted. The hunters have broken this harsh action upon them.

### COAL LANDS BEING LEASED.

A TRACT OF LAND SIX MILES SQUARE IS WANTED.

This Country is to the South of Pendleton on McKay and Birch Creeks.

A little flutter of excitement is commercial, financial, farming and several other circles has been caused by the appearance in Pendleton of N. W. Whelan, of The Dalles, and his leasing of lands on McKay and Birch creeks. He announced that he wanted to lease a section of country six miles square. Nearly or quite enough leases have already been secured. The leases are taken in the name of Farr, supposed to be, and so numerous a capitalist from New York city. This leased land will be prospect for coal, iron, petroleum and natural gas. Wells will be bored and shafts sunk. One of the stipulations of the lease is that the lessee shall proceed within a reasonable time to sink shafts for coal, iron, petroleum and natural gas. Another stipulation is that in case of coal being found and mined, the lessee shall pay to the lessor the sum of ten cents for each ton of coal mined, in addition to the sum paid for the original lease of the land.

### There is Reason for It.

For years it has been suspected that coal, at least, and perhaps iron and oil, are hidden beneath the lands of the McKay and Birch creeks within ten miles to the south of Pendleton, then stretching away to the mountains 40 and 50 miles. As long ago as 12 or 15 years a coal prospect was found about 15 miles southeast of Minn, across the line in Morrow county. That section has been watched, to see what would develop. Being so far from a railroad, and consequently shut off from market of any kind, the work of development was not pushed. The dawn of the era of activity is in sight. In the fall of 1900, there was an excitement on McKay creek, within a few miles of Pendleton. A farmer dug a well a few feet deep close to the stream, struck water, and was surprised to discover that steam formed upon the top thereof so that it could not be used for drinking or the bath. It was another thing altogether, and the samples brought to Pendleton were so plainly redolent petroleum mixed with pulverized country rock and aqua pura that the find did not create a stampede, as it was thought to be a hoax. This legitimate development work, however, is another thing altogether, and great hopes are entertained that something valuable will be found.

### HORSES FOR ALASKA.

W. F. Matlock Trying to Make Up a Carload.

W. F. Matlock, formerly state senator from Umatilla county, is at the Perkins hotel, while arranging to make his fifth shipment of horses to Alaska. The fourth shipment was made last week from Eastern Oregon, and the animals are now being loaded for Skagway. He says heavy draft horses are in demand in Alaska, and are likely to be for some time, but there are very few left now in Eastern Oregon. He will visit portions of the Willamette valley this week, in quest of a carload.

### Cardinal Gibbons Opposes.

Cardinal Gibbons delivered a sermon at high mass in the Baltimore cathedral Sunday, in which he reviewed briefly the events of the century just closed, with special reference to the wars which have been waged during that period. He made an urgent plea for universal peace, and incidentally touched upon the subject of the proposed increase of the standing army in this country, pointing out the evil results arising from the maintenance of large bodies of armed men in Europe and expressed the hope that similar conditions may never obtain in this country.

### JUDGE WHITE DEAD.

He Was the First Probate Judge in the State of Oregon.

Judge Samuel S. White, one of Oregon's early pioneers, died Sunday at the family residence in Portland aged 89 years. His career was intimately associated with early Oregon history. Judge White was born in Franklin Mount, Indiana, in 1811. Later he lived in Sangamon county, Illinois, and continuing westward was the founder of Burlington, Ia. His wife was the first white woman ever in Burlington, and her brother, Colonel West, was the first white settler in that city. In his early manhood he moved to Fort Madison, Ia. and was engaged in steamboating and freighting on the Mississippi, between Keokuk and New Orleans.

Judge White was the first probate judge in the state, holding office under an appointment by Governor George Abernethy in 1846. In 1849 he was one of a party of agents who made the trip to California in connection with the great gold excitement. He engaged in merchandise in Sacramento for several years, afterward returning to Oregon City. During his public career he was a member of the state legislature, a county judge for Clackamas county and a justice of the peace for six years in the South Portland precinct. Since 1873 he resided continuously in Portland, and was a well known and highly respected citizen. He was an Indian war veteran, having fought in the Sac and Fox Indian wars of 1831 and in the Blackhawk war.

### GRAND ARMY OF REPUBLIC.

According to Adjutant General's Report There Are 1800 Members.

John E. Mayo, assistant adjutant-general for the department of Oregon, G. A. R., has completed his report to the adjutant-general. It covers the past six months, and includes a full showing of membership and financial standing of every G. A. R. post in Oregon. In the Oregon department there are 60 posts in prosperous condition. The membership grades up from five, the smaller posts being in out-of-way places, where a few survivors of the war have gathered. The membership is a little over 1800. During the past half year there has been an increase over the preceding six months, and Mr. Mayo says the posts throughout the state are generally in better condition than at the opening of 1900. The greatest increase is reported by the Oregon City Post. At Oregon City there was some trouble which threatened to disrupt the organization, but the members took hold and rolled up a membership of about 85. Pleasant Home Post is probably one of the most prosperous posts for its size. It has 12 members. It has a two-story building paid for.
