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DEATH OF MRS. KINNEY.

A Prominent Worker in the Temperance Cause for Years.

Mrs. Narcissa Edith White Kinney, state president of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, died at her home in Portland early Sunday morning. She was well known all over the Northwest as a temperance worker. She was born in Grove City, Pa., in July, 1854, her ancestry being Scotch-Irish. She was a direct descendant of Adam Wallace, who was burned to death in Scotland for his religious belief. She was reared in the United Presbyterian faith, and early became a worker on behalf of temperance. When still quite young she became superintendent of the Edinboro Union school, in New Erie, Pa. While there she assisted in bringing the importance of scientific temperance teaching to the attention of the state legislature. She joined the White Ribbon organization in 1880, and became president of the local union at Grove City. In 1884 she was sent to Washington territory, to assist the W. C. T. U. in securing temperance legislation, and to her efforts the success of local option was largely due, as the Horton advocates put up a strong opposition. In 1888 Mrs. White was married to M. J. Kinney, of Astoria, and about a year ago the family moved to Portland. Mr. and Mrs. Kinney helped to organize and maintain Chautauqua association Oregon, and Mrs. Kinney became its secretary. Mrs. Kinney donated grounds and auditorium worth \$2500 to the organization, while Mrs. Kinney's gifts have aggregated over \$6000.

Mrs. Kinney's death was painless. She was stricken with paralysis Friday morning, and was only conscious at intervals until her death. She had been in poor health for the past two years.

THE DEAL IS OFF.

Dorman Brothers, of Ritzville, Did Not Purchase Business of E. L. Smith.

Arthur and Orris Dorman, of Ritzville, Wash., doing business under the firm name of Dorman Brothers, made a deal while here last September to purchase the implement business of E. L. Smith, corner of Court and Thompson streets. As one of the preliminaries Mr. Smith required them to pay \$1000 down on the bargain, which they did by giving a note for that amount. Time passed on and Dorman Brothers or either of them failed to appear. On the third of January Mr. Smith telegraphed to them that as they had failed to keep their part of the contract the deal was off.

Arthur Dorman has been in Pendleton for a couple of days discussing the matter with Mr. Smith, and left this morning for home, a loser to the tune of the note put up as a forfeit. He gave as a reason for failure to consummate the trade that the firm was not able to raise as much money from their Ritzville business when they sold it as they expected, so were unable to tackle such a big proposition.

This district proposes to hold a convention in La Grande about the first of February, at which most of the grand lodge officers of the state will be in attendance. What the Marine State Experimental Station has to Say About Some Coffee Substitutes.

"Skim milk, which is ordinarily considered a rather thin beverage, contains almost twenty times as much food material as the average of the beverages made from cereal coffee. If made according to directions, one would have to drink 4 1/2 gallons of an infusion of one of them which made an especial claim to high nutritive value in order to get as much food as is contained in a quart of skim milk."

"The comments here made are in no wise intended to condemn the beverages, but to point out that the claims for greater nutritive value are not founded on fact."
