"HERO" IS DEAD.

Henry Gierlich's Scotch Collie Died From Consumption With Sidekick.

Henry Gierlich's Scotch collie named "Hero" died Sunday after a lingering illness brought on by consumption with the solid sidewalk and street in front of the East Oregonian office. Thousands of readers will remember the accident, the particulars of which were published at the time. One day last October Mr. Gierlich had taken the dog upstairs in the East Oregonian building to have its photograph taken. He was called out and left, intending to return in a few minutes, but didn't tell the dog about it. After his departure "Hero" became wild to follow his owner and after sizing up the situation came to the conclusion that he would be able to save time by jumping from the window, which he did. He broke one of his hind legs, and was taken home and cared for. The bones of the leg never knit. The dog also injured its fore foot, but that was not noticed at the time. Mr. Gierlich had been repeatedly offered large sums of money for the dog, but refused them one after the other. "Hero" was of blooded ancestry and was imported from Scotland when quite young.

PENDLETON STOCK YARDS.

A BUSINESS MAN OF THIS CITY TRYING TO MAKE IT GO.

A Successful Carrying Out of the Proposed Enterprise Would Be of Inestimable Value.

It is proposed to establish stockyards at Pendleton. A business man of this city evolved the idea and it wasn't a great while before he was offered all kinds of money, to an amount reaching to \$200,000, to carry this plan into operation. This offer comes from a stockman of Omaha, who knew in a second after the matter was brought to his knowledge that "there's millions in it." He is correct in his views, not only for the promoters of the enterprise, but for the business men and property owners of Pendleton and for the horsemen, cattlemen, sheepmen and hoggers of a section of country extending from North Yakima on the north to Ontario, Malheur county, and Burns, Harney county, 300 hundred miles to the southeast and south. Grant county stockmen and Morrow county, southern Umatilla county, Union and Walla Walla counties would all come in for a benefit. Butter creek and the Echo region would also be in a position to participate in the benefits.

Markets by Telegraph. Pendleton would increase her shipments of live stock 400 per cent within two years—in fact would be the greatest stockshipping point between Omaha and Portland. It would be necessary to construct large barns, sheds and pens in which to feed the stock while here waiting for shipment. Pendleton stockyards would be in telegraphic touch with the markets of Portland and the cities of the Sound, as well as with those of Kansas City, Omaha and Chicago. It would make a steady cash market here for all kinds of stock and farm produce. Stock would be driven in on foot and shipped in by rail in response to the demand. The wonder is that the matter has not been taken up heretofore and put in active operation.

WEEKLY MARKET REVIEW.

Wheat Has Advanced Another Cent During the Past Week.

Pendleton, Jan. 10.—In addition to the raises of from one to two cents for the week ending January 3, another advance of one cent per bushel has been made during the week ending January 10. Wheat delivered at the mills is now worth 46c for redchaff and club, while millers as well as exporters, are offering six to seven cents along the O. R. & N. and W. & C. R. railways. Formerly there was a difference in price of 3 cents between bluestem and club or redchaff per bushel, but no such great difference is longer quoted. It has been cut in two and bluestem is today quoted at 47c delivered at the mills.

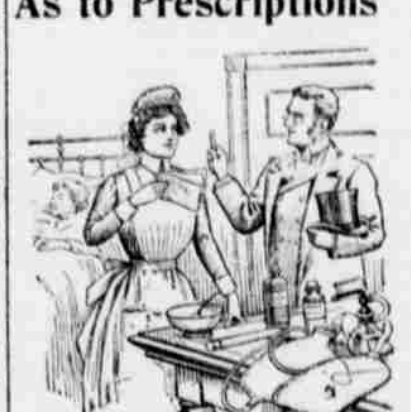
