NEW YORK MARKET.

Reported by J. L. Ray & Co., Chicago Board of Trade and New York Stock Exchange Brokers.

January 10.—There was a very steady market in wheat today and prices at the close were the same as yesterday, 82 3/8, for May. Liverpool closed 1/4 higher, 4-2 3/8. New York opened 5/8 higher, 83c, May, and after touching 83 1/8 declined to 82 1/8, closing 1/4 better. The best Argentine advices are that, big crop or little, the shipments for the next three months will be small. The actual vessel charters are definite on this point. The Argentine failure has been in the Santa Fe province, which is easy of access while the good yields are in the remote provinces.

NEW COUNTY ROADS.

Two Reports of Viewers Were Adopted by the County Court.

At the session of the county court on Wednesday afternoon the reports of the viewers on two new roads were adopted and the road were ordered opened according to the plans of the surveyor. F. J. Kirk, Sam F. Hardy and F. M. Mansfield were the viewers on both roads. The first of the new roads, No. 516, commences at the southwest corner of section 21, township 5 north, range 34 east, Willamette meridian, and runs east one-quarter of a mile; thence north three-quarters of a mile; thence north to Geer gulch; thence north and east to the north bank of Pine creek; thence northwesterly along the north bank of Pine creek to the county road known as No. 517, commencing at the same point as the previous one, and runs east one and one-half miles. John Weidert was allowed \$75 damages for loss sustained by reason of the road taking part of his land. Both roads are to be 40 feet wide.

REED IS RUSTLING

Willing and Anxious to Settle Up His Trouble Over Furniture.

Tom Reed was again called up before Justice Fitz Gerald today upon a charge of larceny of \$61 by bailiff, William Parsons was his attorney. Mr. Reed is anxious to have the matter straightened. So are his attorney, Joe Basier and District Attorney Halley. All that remains, therefore, is for Mr. Reed to unearth the money to pay all expenses of the case, a fine for petty larceny and the \$61 due Joe Basier for the furniture. Justice Fitz Gerald would like to see it settled, also, so allowed Mr. Reed until January 15 in which to get out and operate for the purpose of raising the necessary amount. Mr. Reed says he has relatives in Kansas who have money and property, and that he will be able to get it from them. He was allowed to work with his attorney with the agreement to fix things before the 15th, or appear for further proceedings.

Amateur Hunters.

The usual amount of amateur hunters being shot by their companions or by other amateur hunters is recorded from the Maine and Adirondack forest regions this year. Any citizen out hunting in a leather or leather colored suit is apt to be mistaken for venison on the hoof by any other amateur sportsman, and consequently the usual result happens, and the coroner's verdict, if there happens to be a coroner in the vicinity, is accidental killing. As about the best remedy for preventing these accidental homicides it is suggested that city hunters undergo an apprenticeship and pass an examination before becoming deer slayers.

TO ENGLAND IN TWO DAYS.

Passenger Steamships of the Future Will Cross Atlantic in Forty-Eight Hours.

"Fast electric ships, crossing the ocean at more than a mile an hour, will go from New York to Liverpool in two days, writes John Elfreth Watkins, jr., of 'What May Happen in the Next Hundred Years,' in the Ladies Home Journal. 'The bodies of these ships will be built above the waves. They will be supported upon runners, somewhat like those of the sleigh. These runners will be very buoyant. Upon their under sides will be apertures expelling jets of air. In this way a film of air will be kept between them and the waters surface. This film, together with the small surface of the runners, will reduce friction against the waves to the smallest possible degree. Propellers turned by electricity will screw themselves through both the water beneath and the air above. Ships with cabins artificially cooled will be strictly fireproof. In storm they will dive below the water and there await fair weather.
