PORTLAND WANTS IT.

Effort to Secure the Meeting of the National Livestock Association.

Portland will make a strong pull to secure the annual meeting of the National Livestock Association in 1900. The meeting this year will be held at Salt Lake City, beginning next Monday and continuing for five days. In 1902, it is understood, the meeting will be held at Omaha, a tacit agreement to this effect having been reached at the meeting held last year, when Salt Lake City secured the convention for this year. Letters have already been sent to the association extending an invitation to meet in Portland in 1903. The meetings of the National Livestock Association are attended by the representative stockmen of the country. Nearly all are men of means, and it is believed that an acquaintance with the superior advantages for the stock industry possessed by Oregon would result in bringing many of them out here to locate.

MANY PENSIONS GRANTED.

One Hundred and Seventy Special Bills Were Passed by House.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Not since the 51st congress has the house passed as many private pension bills at a single sitting as it did Friday. In all 170 special pension bills were passed.

The most important was the one to increase the pension of Gen. A. V. Rice from \$36 to \$100. General Rice was wounded several times during the civil war and lost a leg at Vicksburg. He was formerly a member of congress from Ohio, and was the author of the arrangements of the pension act. The senate had passed a bill to increase his pension to \$60 and the house raised the amount to \$100.

A Proper Measure.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 12.—A bill is to be introduced at the coming session of the legislature which will have as its object the transferring of the responsibility of hangings from the sheriffs of the various counties to the warden of the state penitentiary, and providing that all executions will take place within the walls of that institution.

New York's Foreign Trade.

New York, Jan. 12.—Official statistics of the foreign trade of the port of New York for the calendar year of 1900 show an aggregate movement of merchandise to the extent of over \$67,000,000. The increase in 1899 over 1898 was about \$10,000,000. Imports of merchandise were \$34,459,501 and exports \$32,540,500, the latter being material gain over last year.

Two Steamers Wrecked.

Seattle, Jan. 12.—The steamer Tillamook, from Skagway to Seattle was wrecked on Wood's Island. All aboard were saved by the steamship Senator. The steamer Aoha was wrecked between Sitka and Juneau. No particulars have been received here.

"Tex" Arberry's Funeral.

Walla Walla, Jan. 12.—The funeral of W. T. Arberry who died in this city January 10, 1901, will be held from the Smith undertaking parlors, Sunday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. The service will be conducted by Blue Mountain lodge No. 13, A. F. & A. M.

Naval Station in Philippines.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Secretary Long has received a cable dispatch from Admiral Bemy, announcing that the board of officers convened to select the most suitable site in the Philippines for a permanent naval station have fixed upon Olapango, on Subig bay.
