A. EDDINGER NOT RIGHT.

He was going to heaven and landed at Pilot Rock.

A. A. Eddinger, generally known as "Monty," who has been employed for several years by Charles Cunningham as a sheepherder, has become somewhat deranged temporarily, but it is hoped will soon recover his mental equilibrium. He was out in the Athol country, 15 miles or so west of Pendleton, a few miles from Echo, last Saturday, when John A. Noble, campmaster for Mr. Cunningham, accompanied by a sheep buyer, visited that section. He told them that they were trying to mesmerize him, so left his camp and sheep and went away, stating that he was going to heaven, and wanted them to go along. He was armed with a .45 caliber revolver, and it was feared that he would become excited and do badly harm to those who interfered with him, or else commit suicide. Instead of going to heaven, however, he landed at Cunningham's home ranch on Birch creek, a couple of miles above Pilot Rock, on Sunday morning, and had somewhat recovered. He at least said he was not so badly off as he had been the previous day. John Noble induced him to come to Pendleton with him, and they arrived here in the afternoon. On the journey to this city Mr. Eddinger said that he was not so exactly right, and that he would be killed when he got here, or at least taken to Salem and placed in the asylum. He had dressed himself in his best clothes as a touch for a journey, but changed his mind, also his clothes, and put on a rough suit. His good suit he gave to John Bradburn, told him to pack them away in his trunk and to keep them in case he never called for them. Upon arrival in Pendleton he was placed in the county jail.

An examination of Mr. Eddinger will be made by County Physician Vincent and County Judge Hartman to decide what is best to be done with him. He will probably be committed to the state asylum for the insane at Salem.

Dick Stevens, too. Dick Stevens was brought in from Birch creek Sunday, placed in jail and he will be examined as to his mental condition this afternoon. He has been at work cutting wood for a Mr. Southwell, who resides in that section of country. He claims to have a brother

THE BUNCH GRASS MEN.

THEY WERE IN EVIDENCE IN PORTLAND AND WILL BE AT SALEM.

The Handsome Young Woman is Pursuing a Clerkship With the Eagerness of Other Years.

Portland, Jan. 13.—The bunchgrass men are in evidence everywhere. The mud, rain, wind, typewriter girls, cartoonists, correspondents nor interviewers of the metropolis have no terrors for them. For nerve, beauty, indomitable good nature, generous heart and an increasing desire to see the sights of the city, they are unmatched.

We held a little session of the Oregon legislature on the tourist sleeper, between La Grande and Portland the other night. We had a quorum and none to spare. "Bud" McAlister, the Union county Cincinnatus, the best judge of horse flesh this side of Kentucky, was the only man present who had credentials, but we elected Henry Henderson members in emergency, upon their good looks, and proceeded with the business of the session. "Bud" said next to the election of United States senator, the coyote scalp law ranked in importance. We all handed him a list of favorites whom we wished placed in committee clerkship, and he said that owing to the fact that they were all unmarried females, of proper age, weight, color and class, he would enter them in the race without pedigree.

We passed a law leaving the asylum in Salem, and made it a misdemeanor for anybody to say "connoisseur" out loud, during the session. As the coach was full of railroad men, we didn't discuss the "dairy bill," nor the "sugar beet" bounty, that being out of their line.

After the session adjourned we enjoyed the southerly breeze just, and woke at the gates of Portland, the home of Harvey Scott, the Oregonian and all the disturbing elements in Oregon politics, religion and finance. Representative McAlister, on going to bed, laid his sombrero in the upper berth of his section and was charged the price of the best for occupancy with his hat. Talk about luxury. Eastern Oregon men don't stop at any expense to be properly provided with them.

Portland is pregnant with the beauties of unborn legislation. Every fish trap man, union printer, barrow manufacturer, well digger, fireman, brakeman, steamboat captain and milk man in Oregon, is now in Portland with his inside pocket swollen to twice its normal size with wise and judicious laws, which they will present to the coming session of the legislature. Every handsome young lady who has ambition in her breast and dexterity in her fingers, in the seven counties around, is here, in the sure faith that the old time gallantry of the Oregon legislator will rush upon her like a tidal wave with a four dollar job, and plenty of time to visit besides.

Somebody is going to be disappointed. The high horse which burned as they came hither, will not be visible to the naked eye in a few more days.

The committee of railway employees has been in session three days. Every railway organization of labor in the state has been represented. A bill has been drafted, covering just a few of the most urgent demands of these organizations. In the good, sound, honest, straightforward sense and judgment of the citizens of the great state of Oregon, who are entrusted with the power to fix future legislation, they hope and trust to find a champion, an advocate and a friend. It is not class legislation to prepare laws for the public safety and the safety of the employee. We have laws on irrigation, mining, horticulture, horticulture, navigation, and all legitimate industries and occupations in the state. Would it be class legislation to put the protecting arm of the law around the men who hazard their lives hourly and daily in serving the great corporations, which serve the public? Justice is asked and hoped for. It is an educational campaign for most of the legislators of Oregon. It is a subject so little discussed, so lightly looked upon that we can only hope to succeed by a just presentation of our cause to the impartial minds of those who elect to serve, and those who expect future favors at our hands. A MANUFACTURING ENTERPRISE. A New Pendleton Concern Will Build Combines Hereafter. The organization of the W. L. Ziger machine company has been perfected with a capital stock of \$10,000. W. L. Ziger is president of the company; L. B. Reeder, secretary; Chris Simpson, vice president and treasurer. The object of forming this company is the manufacture of a combine harvester and thrasher patented by W. L. Ziger, the blacksmith. One will be manufactured ready for operation early in the season, so that farmers may see how it operates and be in a position to judge as to its superior merits over all

other combines in the market. The first one to be exhibited will be drawn by from 12 to 14 horses. One of the main features of this machine will be its light draft.

It is predicted that from this small start in manufacturing an immense concern will grow. Certain it is that if this machine has the merit claimed for it, the demand will be much greater than the supply, and trouble will be experienced in enlarging the plant and increasing its capacity in order to keep pace with the calls for more combines.

GOOD YEAR FOR PENDLETON.

Excellent Showing Made by Recorder Beam's Financial Statement.

The year 1900 was a good one for Pendleton according to the financial statement as compiled by City Recorder John E. Beam. The receipts were larger and the expense of government was less. In the matter of licenses the comparison is more than \$1000 in favor of 1900 over 1899. In the matter of fines collected by the city officials the year beat all previous records, being \$1039.30 greater than the preceding year. This is gratifying at an expense standpoint, but might be not such great cause for congratulation from the standpoint of one who wishes to see the city advance morally.

The expense of the police department in 1899 was \$3279.92. This was cut down to \$2707.97 in 1900. The expense of lighting the city for the year was \$3480, the same contract existing as during the previous year. The expense of the health department was cut from \$610 to \$370.28. Dr. W. G. Cole being at the head of this branch of city government. Greater improvements were made to the bridges, streets and sidewalks in 1900 than in 1899, consequently, the expense was greater. Streets and bridges cost the city \$2844.19 and the sidewalks \$860 in 1900, while the streets and sidewalks during the past year have been improving at an expense of \$4519.77. The main street bridge and other bridge matters cost the city \$2542.85 the past year. The expense of the levee in 1899 was \$895, while in 1900 it was only \$504.15.
