OLD PROUTY IN TROUBLE.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Golden, recently visitors to Pendleton, are at Oakes "Old Jed Prouty." Richard Golden, a well-known Pendleton resident, is in trouble. Recently the old Prouty company gave a performance in Pendleton in a large audience who paid as much as \$1.50 for seats that usually sold for 75c and \$1. The company returned on and in time reached Oakland, California, where it has an engagement this week in the Madison theatre.

It appears that "Old Jed," or Dick Golden, is a married man and his wife is a member of his company. When Golden was reached Mrs. Golden told him that she was not his wife, but she was supposed to be under the name of physicians at a hospital.

Golden was the divorced husband of Dora Wiley, an opera house star, when he met Katherine Killeman seven years ago, and they were married.

Before their marriage Mrs. Golden had been playing the leading female role in the production, which Golden had had on the stage about ten years.

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TWO KILLINGS RECALLED.

"BUD" HOWARD AND TILL GLAZE WERE KILLED AT BURNS.

A Brother of the Latter Killed His Partner Monday at San Francisco. Which Brings Up Recollections.

The killing of William Trowell at San Francisco, last Monday, by his partner, Robert E. Glaze, brings up recollections of happenings of the past third of a century, extending to the year 1864, during the war of the rebellion. Polk county in this state was the theater of the action and Till Glaze was the principal. He was a brother of Robert E. The Glaze and Whitley families of Polk county had become on bad terms and Till Glaze killed old man Whitley and his son, Mr. Whitley was a brother of Doc Whitley, well known in Umatilla county, where he long resided and who died a few years ago either at Milton in this county, or at Walla Walla, a matter unsettled by present information.

Till Glaze Killed.

The telegram from San Francisco states that Till Glaze died a violent death a few years ago in California. This is a mistake, he was killed at Burns, Harney county, during the fall races of 1890. He was the owner of the horse called Cottonwood. "Bud" Howard was a jockey. Glaze had promised to give Howard the purse in a certain race if he would "pull" the horse he was riding. Howard killed the horse, but Glaze refused to keep his part of the contract. The trouble occurred in Tex Stillman's saloon. Glaze shot Howard, who in turn shot Glaze as he was falling. "Kitty" Parker then took a hand in the fight and shot Howard. Howard and Glaze both died at once, and Parker was sentenced to the penitentiary for eight years for the crime. He was pardoned after having served about three years.

Bert Allen Was There.

Bert Allen, who has recently come to Pendleton from Coos county, a brother of Ed C. Allen at that time owned a horse called "Jordan," and was attending the Burns races, and witnessed the killing.

W. J. Holin, of Pendleton, who has been a resident of Oregon since August 5, 1892, knew the Glaze and Whitley well in Polk county and was there during their trouble. He knew Till Glaze in later years at Prineville, Burns, Boise and in Owyhee county, Idaho. He says Till was acquitted of the charge of murder when he killed the two Whitleys.

W. F. Mallock and Ed C. Allen also knew Till Glaze and state that he killed a man or two at Prineville before being called upon to cash in.

They say that he was over six feet tall, weighed two hundred pounds and was a fine specimen of a man. He was inclined to drink and was with one exception. He might appear in public without a coat or suspenders, but was never known to be without a trusty revolver in his belt. He was a violinist and was a popular musician for the dances of Crook, Harney and Grant counties.

CLOSE CALL FOR T. J. KIRK.

Fell Off a Plank and Narrowly Escaped Drowning.

Representative Thomas J. Kirk, of Umatilla county, had a narrow escape from a serious accident on the Clackamas bridge Thursday night, says the Oregonian. The representative was transferred at Oregon City to the trolley car. At the bridge they were required to transfer again to another car, walking across the break on a plank guarded by a railing. Mr. Kirk lost his way and fell through the ties, but saved himself by holding on with his extended arms. Representative Thompson and other members of the legislature lifted him up to the bridge. Mr. Kirk complained of a pain in his side, but did not appear to have suffered serious injury or strain. Had he gone through the bridge he could not have escaped drowning in the torrential Clackamas.

HIGHER TAXES IN UMATILLA.

The Athens Press on the increase in the County Tax.

Last year the taxpayers were tickled with an assessment which carried with it a 25 per cent reduction on assessed valuation of all taxable property in the county. Says the Athens Press, in today's Press the reader will be confronted with the reverse of the coin. The county court has placed the tax levy this year at 25 mills, as compared with 15 mills last year. Notwithstanding the assessed valuations were dropped over a million dollars by the raise in the levy the amount of taxes raised in proportion to 1899 is \$1200 greater. In 1899 this was not the taxpayer to wonder and agnoring. When he is through he will wonder again. He will wonder where he would get so much, another reduction of a million or so he made in the assessed valuations of property. Last year the state tax was 6-10 mills and this year it is cut down to 5-10 mills. Government for Umatilla county costs exorbitant figures and is caused mainly by unnecessary leakage. Why not plan these leaks?

WANTS A STENOGRAPHER.

The Attorney General Desires a Better Paid Assistant.

At the request of Attorney-General Blackburn, Representative Proctor of Clackamas county, introduced a bill in the legislature for the purpose of appropriating \$1800 for the employment of a stenographer in the attorney-general's office. This is an increase of \$600 over the appropriation made for the same purpose in 1899, and \$1800 more than was ever appropriated prior to 1899. The appropriation now asked is \$75 per month. Before the accession of Attorney-General Blackburn, the incumbents of that office paid for their clerical aid out of their salaries of \$3000 per year. During the last two years the state has paid \$50 per month for a stenographer in that office, and it is not known that the attorney general has had any difficulty in securing a satisfactory assistant at that price.
