The funeral of Hazel Bryant, aged 18 months, took place Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the home of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Bryant, on Willow street. Rev. C. A. Dotson conducted the services, which were largely attended by sympathizing friends.

The quarantine was raised on Saturday evening by Health Officer W. G. Cole, and the members of the family are pleased to be again at liberty.

### CIRCUIT COURT.

The Criminal Docket is an Unusually Large One.

Circuit court convened at 9 o'clock this morning. Judge W. R. Ellis on the bench. County Clerk Chamberlain and District Attorney T. G. Hailey are in attendance. The criminal docket is an unusually large one. There are 23 persons in jail and two out on bail. Of those in jail two, Tom-Tom and Columbia George, have been convicted of murder in the first degree; four are serving jail sentences; one is awaiting to be taken to Salem to serve a term of 18 months in the penitentiary, the other 16 and the two out on bail make 18 criminal cases to be tried.

Thomas Burns and R. W. England were arraigned this morning charged with the larceny of jewelry and a sweater from Jim Washington on the evening of December 21, just one month ago today. The former pled guilty and was sentenced to serve 18 months in the penitentiary at Salem. The latter pled not guilty and was remanded with bail fixed at \$250.

John Colter was arraigned and pled not guilty to charge of highway robbery. Bail was fixed at \$750.

Harry Fields, accused of cursing and swearing and of calling George Ernst, Peter Medernach's bartender, vile names, was arraigned this morning, pled not guilty, and had his bail set at \$250.

Thomas Reed pled not guilty to charge of larceny by bailie. Bail set at \$250.

William Moody, accused of horse stealing, had his bail fixed at \$500, after he pled not guilty. Mr. Moody is a grandson of Mrs. Hank Vaughn. He is claimed to have stolen a horse from Mr. Greaves of Weston, about 16 months ago. He was arrested at the time, but managed to give bail, which he forfeited.
