He "stamped out" San Francisco and had a pleasant trip. Mrs. Josephine F. Dunn, of Portland, mother of Charles Dunn, came up from her home to be in attendance at circuit court. E. P. Dodd has returned from a trip to Portland and Salem, where he watched the maneuvering of politicians in the senatorial struggle. George Haigh has returned from San Francisco, bright and smiling, and will take his old position in the Pendleton wool-scouring mill. Miss Myrtle Smith left this morning for Spokane and Reardon, to visit for ten days. At the latter place she will be the guest of Mrs. W. H. Crawford-Burns. W. D. Nelson, editor and publisher of the Cove Courier and the Oregon Macabee, is a visitor in Pendleton from his home at Cove. He stopped off here on a trip to Walla Walla and Portland. Mr. and Mrs. Leon Cohen will leave this evening for New York city. They will be away one month. Mr. Cohen goes for the purpose of purchasing a large stock of goods for the Peoples Warehouse. Henry F. NEW YORK MARKET.

Reported by I. L. Ray & Co., Chicago Board of Trade and New York Stock Exchange Brokers. January 26.—The wheat market continued to advance today in all markets. Liverpool being up 1/4d, 6-1 7-8. New York opened 1-8 higher and after touching 81 1/2, advanced to 82 1/4, closing 81 7-8 or 3-8 higher than last night. The export shipments for the week were 4,800,000 and the trade looks for a good sized decrease in the visible supply on Monday. Stocks strong, St. Paul closing 6 points higher than yesterday. Money, 2 per cent. Close yesterday, 81 1/2. Open today, 81 5-8. Range today, 81 1/2 to 82 1/4. Close today, 81 7-8. May Wheat in Chicago. Chicago, Jan. 26.—May wheat is quoted at 76 1/2 to 77 cents per bushel.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Case of the State vs. Charles Dunn Will Be Finished Today. The jury was secured and two witnesses for the prosecution, Isaac Hagen and Louis La Brache, were examined Friday morning in the case of the state vs. Charles Dunn. On the afternoon of Friday and on Saturday forenoon, the rest of the witnesses for the prosecution were heard, as follows: Charles Wilkes, James Stamper, Sam Mahaffy, Isaac Hagen (recalled), Eugene Stanton, James Boddy. On Saturday forenoon the following witnesses for the defense were heard: Charles Dunn, Mollie Wilson, John Stanton, Ed Murphy, Dave Love and Clayton Luna. At the conclusion of the testimony of the last named, a recess was taken. At the opening of court this afternoon the defense continued by calling Henry Bain. The case will be ended this afternoon or tonight. E. W. England was brought into court this morning and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for the part he took in the stealing of Jim Washington's sweater and jewelry. Tom Burns, who was presumed to be the ringleader, plead guilty and was let down with a sentence of 18 months in the penitentiary. England made a defense and stood trial, but was landed. At 1:30 this afternoon, William Moody was sentenced to one year in

the penitentiary. He is a grandson of Mrs. Hank Vaughn. About two years or a little less ago he stole a horse from a Mr. Greaves near Weston. Having been arrested and bailed out, he jumped his bond and only returned to the county a few weeks ago. After consultation with District Attorney Hailey he plead guilty. Mr. Hailey recommended the minimum penalty of the law, owing to the youth of the prisoner, being under age when the crime was committed, and Judge Ellis acted favorably on the recommendation.

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The Railroad Won.

The case of P. B. McAlexander vs. the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company, at Walla Walla, a damage suit for \$1975, was completed in the superior court, the verdict being for the defendant after the jury had been out but nine minutes. The action was appealed and will be fought through in the supreme court of the state. Pending the decision of the matter the other four similar cases were postponed and will be held in abeyance. Much testimony was received regarding the alleged assault committed upon the person of P. B. McAlexander, the plaintiff, by the conductor of the train on which he was attempting to reach Wapshupa. The preponderance of evidence was to the effect that no assault had been committed and that the man had been removed from the cars at a duly designated station of the company.

The Cup Defender.

Boston, Jan. 26.—The Herald makes public the dimensions of the Lawson cup defender. The figures are as follows: Her extreme beam is 24 feet. This is 2 1/2 inches narrower than that of the Columbia and the draught is just the same as the Columbia—20 feet. Her water length is 90 feet.

Boers Make a Capture.

London, Jan. 26.—A dispatch from Kimberly says: The Boers yesterday captured a train laden with military stores, near Fourteen Streams, north of Kimberly. The troops on the train and a small part of the Dublin fusiliers were taken prisoners.

Corruption at Lincoln.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 26.—Both houses today passed a resolution appointing a committee to investigate the charge, made at yesterday's joint session, that railroad passes and political appointments were being made in the interest of certain senatorial candidates.

Filipinos Take Oath.

Manila, Jan. 26.—Advices from Ilo Ilo say about fifty thousand Filipinos have taken the oath of allegiance in Ilo Ilo province.
