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DUNN CASE WITH THE JURY.

Able Peace Fined Forty Dollars for Carrying Concealed Weapons.

Today, the third of the trial of Charles Dunn for stealing a cow, the property of John and Isaac Hagen, was consumed in finishing up the testimony, summing up of the attorneys and charge by the judge. The jury took the case for consultation late this afternoon. There were no sensational developments in the testimony. Able Peace pleaded guilty this morning to the charge of carrying concealed weapons and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$40, or undergo an imprisonment in the county jail for 20 days. He is unable to pay his fine. This sentence is the outcome of the events of Sunday evening, December 2, when Mr. Peace went to his home, the first house east of St. Joseph's academy on Court street, and after a few preliminary flourishes shot off a revolver three times. He had a couple of big revolvers on him at the time, and said he fired one of them just for fun, as though shooting at a market. Mr. Peace's wife thought he was going to make a target of her, and objected. He was arrested by Officers Sheer and Coffman, after a struggle. In this connection, also, attention might be called to another matter. The case against Able and Arthur Peace for the robbery of the Indian cache on the Bigby place, six miles east of Pendleton near Mission station three months ago has been withdrawn at the suggestion of District Attorney Hailley. Four were originally arrested for the crime namely: Able and Arthur Peace, Henry Sheehan and Andrew Shumway. The last two were set free at the preliminary hearing before Justice Fitz Gerald. Arthur Peace was in jail until last week when he was released. Now the charge has been withdrawn against Able Peace.

R. W. England, sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for stealing the property of Jim Washington on the evening of December 22, and William Moody, one year, for stealing a horse from Mr. Greaves at Weston two years ago, will leave for Salem Tuesday morning in charge of Deputy Sheriff Joe Blackley.

He had been a resident of Heppner for 28 years and was well known to many people of Pendleton. He was engaged as a brick-maker at Quincy, Ill., in early life, but quit that business to study medicine. He was engaged in the drug business at Heppner, in connection with his profession.
