GENERAL NEWS.

Verdi, the composer, died at Milan, Italy, Sunday morning. He died unconscious with his relatives and close friends gathered around his bed.

Another death from bubonic plague has occurred among the members of the crew of the British steamer Pirary which left Alexandria December 22 for Hull, England.

The Amsterdam correspondent of the London Express wires that news has been received there that Mr. Kruger is very seriously ill, that his medical attendant despairs of his life, and that three doctors visit him daily.

The ministry of war of Russia has completed the draft of a law to regulate the military service in Finland in conformity with the system adopted in the empire at large. It is expected that it will be put in force early in the year.

The special service held in the German church of Constantinople on Sunday in honor of the anniversary of the birth of Emperor William was followed by the inauguration in Hippodrome Square of the fountain presented by the Kaiser.

Preliminary skirmishing in a battle for about \$450,000,000 has already begun in Washington. Holders of the Cuban war bonds, issued by Spain to raise funds for the prosecution of the war in Cuba, are again moving to get their money back.

The body of Jacob Kuntz, a hermit, was found in a miserable cabin near Peoria, Ill., Sunday. The body was clad in rags. On his person was \$438 in money and a deed to 80 acres of valuable land. He had literally starved himself to death.

Stella Thomas, 20 years old, was crushed to death in Chicago by the elevator in the Young Woman's Christian Association building. She had watched the inmates vaccinated by a doctor. She took the elevator to her room, where she fainted, falling forward, her head being caught between the car and floor.

The anthracite coal operators and miners in Pennsylvania, were much stirred up by the report sent out from Indianapolis that the United Mine Workers, now holding their national convention there, had decided to invite the operators of the anthracite region to enter their miners in conference and decide upon a new wage scale.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The tax levy in Portland this year for all purposes will reach 40 mills, or four per cent.

John Wolf, the 18-year-old boy who killed Sheriff Summers, of Madison county, Montana, from ambush, has been captured, after an exciting chase.

William Baskett, the rich London banker who died a few days ago, had relatives in Polk county, Oregon, the late Mrs. E. O. Chase being a Miss Baskett. Her brother, G. L. Baskett, formerly a Salem druggist, is now a resident of Idaho.

The Pacific Sheet Metal Works, at Astoria, has received orders from three Alaska canneries for 5,000,000 salmon cans, sufficient for 100,000 cases. The cans are to be shipped during the month of March, and will go on vessels direct from here.

James P. Finnican, who died Saturday in Portland, was a well known railroad and mining man. He was born in New York in 1844, and came to Oregon 25 years ago. He was assistant superintendent of construction on the O. & N. when the road was built from The Dalles to Portland.

Because he had wronged a young girl in Minneapolis some years ago, Frank H. Hanley, of Seattle, and a bridegroom of but five hours, swallowed a dose of strychnine Sunday at his home in a lodging house and expired in the arms of his bride. With his last breath Hanley managed to gasp out to the terrified woman: "I am not worthy of you." Then he fell into her arms and life was extinct.

The shooting affray at Gaiser, Baker county, was thoroughly investigated. First, Garrison, the saloonkeeper who did the effective work, had a hearing, and was adjudged to have acted in self-defense and was discharged. Then Orrell, the "bad man" had his turn in court charged with assault with intent to kill, but he waived examination and was held for the circuit court with bonds fixed at \$500.

HERMANN GETS TWO
OF FULTON'S
VOTES.

No Change in the Result, the
Deadlock Still Exists.

DEMOCRATS WILL STICK TO SMITH

A Republican Caucus is Scheduled for Tonight,
at Which the Senatorial Problem May
or May Not Be Solved.

Salem, Jan. 29.—Still no change in the senatorial situation, with the exception that Hermann has gained two votes that Fulton has lost, Hermann and McQueen having voted today for Hermann instead of Fulton as heretofore. The vote today was Corbett, 29; McBride, 19; Smith, 20; Hermann, 8; scattering, 7; not voting, 4.

For the first time, there were no absentees today. The democratic caucus last night decided to stick to Smith of Baker as their choice for senator.

A republican caucus will be held tonight.

McBride Confident.
Salem, Jan. 29.—Senator McBride's forces predict his re-election before the end of this week. Ex-Senator Corbett is ill and confined to his room because of illness brought on from the excitement and conflict of the contest.

Legislative Notes.
The subject of fellow-servants is being warmly discussed in both branches of the legislature. Senator Sweet has a bill in the senate, which holds railway companies liable for all damages done employees through negligence of any other employee. Representative Briggs and Poorman have like measures in the house, and the passage of a just and broad law on this subject is likely to be the result of the present agitation. Workingmen throughout the state are watching the final vote on this bill, and will probably be in better position to vote two years hence, than ever before.

Corbett headquarters at the Hotel Willamette comprise an elegant suite of ten rooms, where at least eighty guests can be entertained. It is an interesting campaign, viewed from any standpoint.

Judge Whitney of Linn county, opposed in a strong speech, the taxing of the valley counties for the payment of scalp bounties. He holds that those counties and individuals directly benefited should bear the burden of their own luxuries.

The salmon which finds his way to Eastern Oregon, through the net work of legislation in his behalf, should be caught and preserved as a relic. If the legislature don't protect our fish, they will follow the antelope, buffalo, wild turkey and elk into extinction.

Senator Clem's bill to prohibit "treating" is not a measure adopted to this climate. Oregon is clamoring for more efficient irrigation.

The Malheur county seat removal is agitating some few minds very much. A party of Malheur county citizens is on hand, opposed to the removal. Representative Geer, who introduced a measure on this proposition, by request, is a resident of Burns, Harney county, and is only taking action through request of citizens interested.

Representative Orton, a printer, of Multnomah county has a bill to establish a bureau of labor statistics, and the office of labor commissioner. It provides for the inspection of mines and factories and the proper ventilation, sanitation, protection, and cleanliness of all buildings, where a number of persons are required to work together. It is a measure which older states adopted years ago. Missouri, Illinois, Iowa, New York and all prominent labor states have a bureau of this kind.

MAJOR E. McNEILL DEAD.

Died in New York City Monday Very Suddenly.

New York, Jan. 29.—Edwin McNeill, formerly president and general manager of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company, and well known in financial circles here, died in this city Monday morning, aged 44 years, after a few hours sickness. Mr. McNeill recently came here from California and Montana, where he is interested in several mining enterprises with his brother George McNeill, who was with him at the time of his death. He was contemplating a European trip in company with his brother when he was taken ill.

TO JOIN TRIPLE ALLIANCE.

Asserted That This Will Be One of the
Earliest Acts of King Edward.

Vienna, Jan. 29.—The News Journal asserts that one of the earliest acts of King Edward will be to join the triple alliance.

Edward Left Cowes for London.

Cowes, Jan. 29.—King Edward left here for London this morning. He will be present at the meeting of the privy council at which the details of the queen's funeral will be determined.

THE JEFFRIES-RUHLIN FIGHT.

A Suit for an Injunction Filed at Cincinnati.

Cincinnati, Jan. 29.—A suit for injunction to prevent the Jeffries-Ruhlin fight was filed with the common pleas court today. The petition asked the court to prevent the fight on the grounds that it would be a public nuisance and injure the good name of Cincinnati if it is allowed. The fight is referred to as a prize fight and upon

this point it is thought the issue will hang. The attorney for the Saengerfest directors says his answer will deny all the allegations of the petition.

The summons on the defendants is made returnable on February 11, but it will be served immediately and the case will be heard without delay. The state will ask the issuance of a temporary injunction as soon as defendants can be brought to the court.

CONTRACT LABOR IN HAWAII.

Porto Ricans and Southern Negroes
Going by Thousands.

Honolulu, Jan. 29.—Every American steamer arriving here from San Francisco brings several hundred Porto Rican or negro laborers for the cane fields of the islands. On the steamer City of Peking there were four hundred Porto Ricans and thirty negroes from Alabama. Of the Porto Ricans, many died on the way and on arrival many were too sick to be removed. The able bodied ones were put on island steamers from the deck of the Peking and rushed off to the plantations without being allowed to land in Honolulu.

On the way across the continent the immigrants suffered a great deal from the cold as they had hardly any clothes to wear. Three of them that have been here several weeks are working well and apparently contented. The recruiting agents having the furnish ing of the laborers for Hawaiian plantations have contracted to bring 5000 Porto Ricans and 10,000 negroes here in the next two years.

THE LOST TRAINING SHIP.

Only One Body of the 121 Lost on the
Vessel Has Been Recovered.

Tokio, Jan. 29.—No trace has yet been found of the missing training ship that was recently wrecked with all on board, the Fushikuma Maru. In searching for the lost vessel, in the sea between the sound and the eastern shore of the bay of Suruga, looked lines which had been thrown into the deep, more than once caught hold of something apparently not a rock. It is thought that it may be the hull of the wrecked ship, but as it is more than 200 fathoms below the surface more efficient apparatus will have to be used before it can be ascertained whether or not it is the wreck. Only one body of the 121 lost, that of the captain, has been recovered.

THE BOSSCHETTER CASE

McAllister, Campbell and Death Sen-
tenced to 30 Years; Kerr 15 Years.

Paterson, N. J., Jan. 29.—Kerr, Campbell, McAllister and Death, the Bosschetter murderers of Jennie Bosschetter, were sentenced by Judge Dixon this morning. Campbell, McAllister and Death each received a sentence of thirty years at hard labor and Kerr fifteen, owing to the fact that he was an accessory to the crime and warned the others against committing it.

The sentences imposed were the heaviest the law allows. In passing sentence Judge Dixon said it was through the leniency of the jury that they had escaped hanging.

TO SECURE RIGHT OF WAY.

Companies to Contest Line From Seattle
to Portland.

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 29.—A petition was filed in the superior court of Clark county by the Washington & Oregon Railway company, asking that condemnation proceedings be instituted for the acquisition of a right of way for that railroad from Portland to Seattle. The land sought to be condemned is the present route and right of way of the Portland & Puget Sound Railroad company (old Union Pacific route). The petition states the road will cross the Columbia river at Vancouver. Similar proceedings were commenced in Cowlitz county.

The company has just completed a survey of the right of way sought to be appropriated and from all accounts had little time to spare as several other corporations are reported to have parties out surveying the same route with a similar object in view.

It is expected the proceedings filed will be the beginning of a lively fight for possession of this valuable route.

Russian Students Rebel.

New York, Jan. 29.—The London Post prints a dispatch saying the students of the Russian university at Kiev, Russia. Eighteen students were killed in the encounter and thirty wounded while two hundred were arrested.

Hurburt's Successor.

St. Paul, Jan. 29.—A. L. Craig, assistant general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific railway company has tendered his resignation to take effect February 15. Craig will become general passenger agent of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company with headquarters at Portland, Ore.

Orange Crop Threatened.

Tampa, Fla., Jan. 29.—Much apprehension is felt among the orange growers as to the safety of the orange trees. If a freeze should come at this time the loss would be heavy.

Department Store Burned.

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 29.—Franklin's department store in this city was burned this morning. The loss is \$400,000.

Captured Rhodes' Cattle.

Kimberley, Jan. 29.—The Boers have captured many head of Cecil Rhodes' cattle.

BEWARE OF IMITATIONS.

THE PRESIDENT WILL
CALL AN EXTRA
SESSION.

Necessary Because of Cuban
and Philippine Questions.

SECRETARY ROOT IN FAVOR OF ONE

Believes the Peace of Cuba Will Be Broken if
There is Delay in Disposing of the
Cuban Constitution.

Washington, Jan. 29.—A cabinet member today made the statement that if congress shall not act upon the Philippine and Cuban questions before March 4, there will be an extra session. He added it would be impossible to dispose of either matter before inauguration day and thus practically declared President McKinley would call congress together in an extra session after his inauguration for the second term.

Discussed at Cabinet Meeting.

Washington, Jan. 29.—At the cabinet meeting today the question of an extra session was discussed. Secretary of War Root favored it. He said he believed for the peace of Cuba that congress should dispose of the Cuban constitution without delay.

NO TRUTH IN THE REPORTS.

Indians in Indian Territory Not on
Warpath as Reported.

Washington, Jan. 29.—General Lee last night wired the war department that Lieutenant Dixon, commanding a cavalry of troops sent to suppress the Indian uprising in Indian territory, had reported no violence by Indians and no excitement at Holdenville and Kufala, that the people were not leaving their homes and that they can go anywhere without fear.

MRS. NATION, THE CRUSADER.

She is Preparing to Smash Tepeka
Saloons and Slot Machines.

Topeka, Kans., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Nation commenced preparations this morning to raid the Tepeka saloons. She studied the surroundings of the biggest saloon in the city in the hope of discovering the best place of attack. She told a cigar dealer she would smash his two hundred dollar slot machine if he did not take it from his place and declares she proposes to stay here until every saloon in the city is closed.

TEXAS TO OKLAHOMA.

One Congressman Calls Another a
Malicious Liar.

Washington, Jan. 29.—In the house this morning Stevens of Texas addressing Fling of Oklahoma, during a discussion over some mineral lands in Oklahoma, said: "The gentleman is uttering what he knows to be a willful, malicious lie." Stevens was rapped to order by the chair. The only reply made by Fling was: "That is very serious language for one man to use to another."

HALE'S SUICIDE A MYSTERY.

His Alleged Confession of Cause for the
Act Not Believed.

Minneapolis, Jan. 29.—Frank Hale, who suicided Sunday at Seattle, has not resided here for two years. His relatives are unable to assign any cause for his suicide. They discredit his alleged confession concerning his killing himself because he had wronged a young woman in Minnesota prior to his coming west. When he suicided he had been married to a widow less than a week.

Insurance Man Dead.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—A special to the Tribune from Louisville, Ky., says: Charles H. Ferguson, a well known insurance man and once president of the American Association of Underwriters is dead. Mr. Ferguson had been in failing health for a year. He was born in Oswego, N. Y., on August 13, 1846.

The Reward for Pat Crows.

San Francisco, Jan. 29.—The police officials have received word that the total amount of reward for Pat Crows is \$50,000. Crows is supposed to be on the Pacific coast somewhere seeking a ship to get away.

Senators Sworn In.

Washington, Jan. 29.—Senators-elect Burton of Kansas and Gable of South Dakota were sworn in this morning. The senate then resumed consideration of the Indian appropriation bill.

Mexicans Rob a Bank.

Phoenix, Jan. 29.—Monday afternoon a band of Mexican robbers held up a stage near Bisbee robbing the mail and passengers. The amount taken is unknown but it is believed to be large.

Chicago's Discourtesy.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—The municipal council last night refused to pass a resolution of sympathy with the British empire on the death of Queen Victoria.
