CIRCUIT COURT.

Jury in the Rudebeck Cow-Larceny Case is Still Out.

The jury in the case of the state vs. Isaac Rudebeck retired at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening with the evidence, argument of attorneys and charge of the judge in their possession. They had failed to agree up to a late hour this afternoon.

This afternoon there was a relaxation of the legal tension that has characterized the proceedings during the past few days when the criminal cases were being fought, and the time was consumed in running over the docket and setting cases for trial.

William Murray and Thomas Dillon will probably start for the penitentiary Friday to serve three years and three years and six months, respectively for robbing Mrs. Keadie's house at Umatilla. They would have been forwarded ere this had it not been that they were subpoenaed as witnesses in the case of the state vs. John Dyer, tried today.

The case of the state vs. W. J. Bozard is now before the court. Mr. Bozard is accused of robbing an O. R. & N. car of a sack of flour on the evening of December 8. He and a man named Sargent were arrested by Officer Glen Bushee on the evening of December 9, for the crime. Sargent pleaded guilty and is serving out his term in the penitentiary.

The criminal docket will have been pretty thoroughly cleaned up by Saturday, when court will adjourn. Judge Ellis will commence a term of court at Heppner next Monday, February 6.

Improvements at the Savings Bank. The Pendleton savings bank has added a Mosier patent safe to its office furniture. This is one of the latest patents and there are very few of them in this state. It cost \$1000 and weighs a ton and a quarter. It has two locks, one a chronometer, the other an ordinary combination. The safe itself is small, with sides, bottom and top composed of seven layers of steel of different degrees of hardness. The door is a big screw, operated by a crank. When the door has been screwed in and set with the chronometer lock

FIRE IN A NEW YORK HOTEL.

Several Lives Were Lost and a Number of Thrilling Escapes.

New York, Jan. 30.—Two women lost their lives in a fire at the Hotel Jefferson at 4 o'clock this morning. They were suffocated in a room on the seventh floor. Eleanor Dowling, a trained nurse, swung by a rope from the fourth story window, it broke, she fell and her skull was fractured. Four other sufferers, injuries escaping from the building. A wild panic prevailed, following the discovery of the fire and several thrilling rescues were made. The loss is \$50,000. Faulty insulation of electric wires was the cause of the fire.

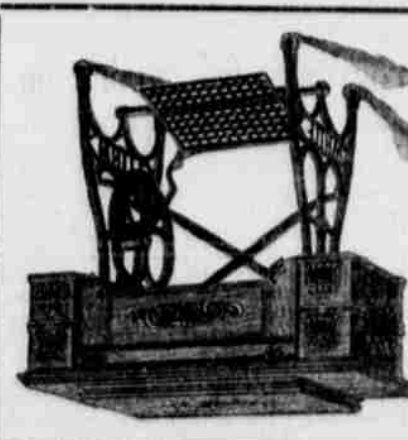
