COUNCIL MEETING.

A Number of Ordinances Passed and Now Await Mayor's Signature.
Chairman F. B. Clopton presided at the meeting of the city council last evening. Mayor Vincent being absent. All the councilmen were present except C. E. Roosevelt. The following ordinances read the first time at the council meeting on January 16 and referred to the proper committees were reported upon and passed, and now await the signature of the mayor to become the law of the city.
Laying a tax of 7 mills for the year 1900. Prohibiting the posting of cards and other advertising matter on telegraph and telephone poles, etc.
Appointing the chief engineer the water superintendent and the city marshal the board of fire wardens.
Prohibiting the use of barbed wire for fences within the city limits.
Providing for stringent quarantine against persons exposed to contagious or infectious diseases.
F. X. Schenck was granted a license to sell liquors.
A petition from property owners to grade and put sidewalks on Jane street, between Webb and Railroad streets, was read and referred.
City officials' salary list was allowed and warrants ordered drawn.

Adams, Ore., Jan. 30.—To the Editor.—I wish to say that I am personally acquainted with Thos. Reed, who is now confined in the jail at Pendleton. I served with him in the 25th Missouri infantry during the "late unpleasantness," he serving in Company H, while I served in Company E. He first brought to my notice at the battle of Shiloh, where his life was saved by a ball striking a medal on his left breast. From that time on I was intimately acquainted with him, and always found him to be a straightforward honest man, a good comrade, and an obedient soldier.
