THE BEAUTIES OF SKAGWAY.

LETTER FROM GEORGE F. ROSENBERG TO WALTER M. PIERCE.

A Fight Described Between a Whale on One Side, a Swordfish and Thrasher on the Other.

The following are excerpts from a letter written at Skagway, Alaska, to Walter M. Pierce, of this city, under date of January 22:

"Upon reaching Seattle, I sailed on the freight steamship Ruth, bound for Skagway. It took seven and one-half days to make the trip, but the time passed only too quickly. You cannot imagine the grandeur, beauty or immensity of Alaska until you have gone over this route. Here you steam across wide stretches of ocean, in a denoted into the coast, then suddenly plunge into narrow channels with precipitous and snow-capped peaks on either hand, down the sides of which tumble tiny rivulets or huge waterfalls. Along this path of oceanic beauty, of a sudden, burst into view Indian burying grounds with their fantastic totem poles, some hideous, but all real works of savage art, fully attesting to the peculiar beliefs of these people, and their more than peculiar method of burial of the dead.

"There is lots of timber on the mountains, but it is all stunted, owing to the fact that there is no depth of soil and the extreme cold.

"Just as we were finishing the passage across Queen Charlotte sound, which was very rough, I saw a sight vouchsafed to very few--no more or less than a battle royal between a huge whale on one side and a swordfish and thrasher on the other. The method of attack by the latter was for the swordfish to keep prying the whale in the belly, raising the whale to rise to the surface, when the thrasher would bring down his tail across the back of the whale with a vim and a will that would have brought the bluish slugs to your good-natured countenance at the recollection of the puny whipping you were capable of administering in your days of pedagogy. It was a sight, though, I never shall forget. Since that time I have with my family had the pleasure of walking on top of the body of a whale, and now have a memento thereof a whalebone at home three feet long and 14 inches wide. The whale measured 52 feet in length.

"At last I arrived at Skagway and was more than surprised at the town I found. I stepped from the boat to a wharf, the approach to which is nearly half a mile long. There are three other wharves jutting into the head of Lynn canal, with approaches equally as long. This is for the purpose of securing sufficient depth for the steamships, as the tide here has a range of 17 feet. With a strong wind from the south I have seen the tide racing through some of the streets of the town like a millrace.

"Skagway has a population, I should judge, of 2500 people, and a floating yearly population of 30,000 to 40,000. It is surrounded on all sides but the south by mountain peaks, some of which rise to a height of 8000 feet, and one can stand in his door way and see glaciers and eternal snows the year round. The peaks, by reason of their precipitous ascent, seem to overhang the town itself, and what strikes the beholder most forcibly at first is the sharp contrast between these and what one has been accustomed to see; for there with few exceptions rise to a sharp point. It is a wonderful sight when one can look up 4000 feet in going to and from his business to see a waterfall making its leap of 300 feet. It has been named Dewey Falls. It is impossible for one to portray with words the most marvelous grandeur of this country.

"This is practically the gateway of all interior Alaska, the only railroad being the White Pass & Yukon railroad, which begins at this point and runs to White Horse, the head of navigation on the Yukon river. This road is considered one of the most wonderful pieces of railway work in the world. You may form some idea of the value of the property and the traffic passing over it, when in one single month last September, the net earnings of the road amounted to \$1,100,000. The past year 30,000 transient persons passed in and out of Skagway. It is expected that this year the number will reach 80,000.

"You have no idea of the relief one feels to be in a country, a new country, where nearly everything is spoken of on large money considerations, where projects are large and tramps and poverty are unknown. They have fat pocket books here, and their hearts are as large in their liberality in the use of the contents as the purses are fat.

"You see here magnificently dressed people, but for all this, one is very dubious at going further than a mere glance, as the crowd is of a very cosmopolitan character, and while one might be touching elbows with silks, diamonds and nugget jewelry, as a rule it would not be safe to enquire any further. Of course there are exceptions, but the rule holds good.

"The town has a good water system, its supply being Lake Dewey, 1500 feet above the town, electric lights, two telephone companies and a sewer.

"As I write this, the wind is howling and piling up huge drifts of snow; while we, inside our little house, have two coal fires going. You cannot imagine the difference between the north wind at Pendleton and the one here. Here it blows for weeks at a time, without cessation, a perfect gale, and its intensity and penetrating powers must be felt to be appreciated.

"We wear heavy warm shoes, and a covering over them called mukluks--cape lined with fur that cover your whole head and most of the face and ties under the chin. For those who have to be out a great deal, they wear a parka; this is, the cap above described with a heavy canvas over-shirt attached covering almost the entire body, the same as worn by Eskimos that you see in pictures.

"Everything becomes a glare of ice here in the winter, and I have to wear on my shoes what are called 'crocs'--spiked plate that can be put on and taken off.

"Nine days have elapsed since writing the above, during which time and at this writing, a terrible blizzard has been raging. You don't know what a north wind, a snow storm and 14 degrees below all at the same time is like until you have spent a winter at Skagway.

"You will see business houses nearly buried in snow; in instances tunnels are cut long distances in the snow for ingress and egress. The north wind is responsible for these huge drifts, and three or four times a day I have to shovel snow away from the entrance to my house to keep from being entirely blocked.

"Now imagine this terrible blizzard blowing 60 or 70 miles an hour, driving the snow like pellets of shot, with a thermometer 14 degrees below, and you

then have the combination by which myself and family are at present surrounded.

It was 62 degrees below at Dawson and 78 degrees below at Forty Mile yesterday. The S. S. Dolphin arrived in port three hours ago entirely covered from stem to stern with four inches of ice. This may seem preposterous to you, yet the S. S. 'Cutch' upon its arrival here was covered with ice over one foot thick; but in spite of all, it is really enjoyable on account of its being so novel.
