THREE YEARS FOR RUDDOCK.

Sentenced to the Penitentiary for Stealing W. M. Bowman's Cattle.
At the opening of court this morning Isaac Ruddock, convicted of stealing cattle from W. M. Bowman, of Birch creek, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Mr. Ruddock is very low-spirited over his many troubles. The surgeons are of the opinion that all of the toes of one of his feet will have to be amputated on account of the freezing to which they were subjected at the time of the cattle transaction which resulted in his trial, conviction and sentence. He may lose the entire foot. District Attorney Hailey received an appreciative letter of thanks from Mr. Ruddock this morning for the impartial manner in which he had conducted the case.

Thomas Reed, the G. A. R. veteran, accused of larceny by bailee, was allowed to plead guilty to the simple charge of larceny this morning, the more serious one being withdrawn. He will receive his sentence at 1:30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon.

The statement that circuit court would adjourn Saturday evening and that Judge W. R. Ellis would commence a term of court at Heppner on February 5, were made in error. The circuit court will continue in Pendleton for several days.

The case of the First National bank of Walla Walla vs. Donald McDonald is set for Tuesday, February 5. This case has been heard twice heretofore, once by Judge Lowell and at the last term of court by Judge Ellis, the jury failing to come to an agreement both times. It is presumed that the hearing of the case will consume two full days after which the jury will have a tussle with it. The dispute is as to the location of a certain section corner on land a few miles from Weston.

The case of the state vs. Colter, charged with highway robbery, will probably come up on Monday, February 4. Mr. Colter is anxious to have his trial over with. He was asked all about it today, but said he had nothing to say. 'twill be settled next week, after that he will speak, and give the proceedings away. The crime of which he is accused, of robbing Thomas D. Edwards, of Milton, on Court street, in broad daylight is a serious one. Thursday, December 20 is the date that the alleged crime was committed. The defendant at the time and ever since has claimed that he was not there at the time and knew nothing of it for some time afterward.

Saturday, February 2 will be devoted to the hearing of the case of the state vs. William Harris charged with threatening to do great bodily harm to one of his neighbors on McKay creek. Mr. Harris says he only intended to repel boarders who had previously threatened to tramp out certain portions of his inner physical development.

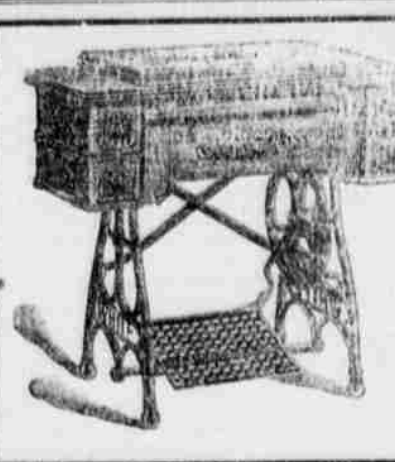
