CIRCUIT COURT.

The Land Case Several Times Tried is Still on Trial.

The case of the First National bank of Walla Walla vs. Donald McDonald is still on trial in the circuit court, the plaintiff's witnesses having not all been examined. John L. Sharpe, of Walla Walla, and A. D. Stillman, of Pendleton, are for the plaintiff; A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, and T. G. Bailey, of Pendleton, are for the defense. The proceedings were enlivened this forenoon during the giving of testimony by Alex Still. He is a peculiar witness. Sometimes he will talk rapidly and again will come to a dead standstill as though in deep meditation as to what he was going to say. He started off like a racehorse and Court Stenographer Beckwith galloped along after him taking down his language until the rapid crossfire questions by attorneys and replies by the witness got everything in such a tangle that they had to take a new start. The rapid talk of Mr. Still together with the language itself, were of such a nature that the entire court, judge, jurors, attorneys and spectators were convulsed with laughter and several minutes were pleasantly spent in regaining composure.

DEATH OF WILLIAM DOYLE.

A Victim of Hemorrhagic Smallpox at Pendleton Posthouse.

William Doyle, colored, aged 19 years, died at a few minutes past 5 o'clock on the afternoon of Tuesday, February 5, at the posthouse, being a victim of hemorrhagic smallpox. This is the first fatal case of smallpox in Umatilla county during the past few years, or since the return of the soldiers from the Philippines. Mr. Doyle came to Pendleton in July, 1900, from Omaha, and almost immediately thereafter secured employment as porter at J. W. Privett's barber shop, and has worked there ever since. He was taken sick on last Friday, but remained in his room in the rear of the shop until Monday, when he was taken to the Pendleton lodging house, his disease having been pronounced to be measles by the attending physician. It was not until Tuesday forenoon that the disease was pronounced to be smallpox and reported to the health officer. The city officials removed the young man to the posthouse and took stringent measures to prevent the spread of the disease by burning the bed-clothing and thoroughly fumigating the room occupied by him at the lodging house. The mother and other relatives of deceased are supposed to be living at some point in Wisconsin. The funeral took place at 12 o'clock today.

Mrs. D. M. Taylor's Condition.

D. M. Taylor received a telegram from his brother-in-law, Dr. T. F. Smith on Tuesday afternoon, telling him to come at once, owing to the condition of Mrs. D. M. Taylor. Mr. Taylor left for Tacoma on the W. & C. R. train at 6 o'clock last evening. Mrs. D. M. Taylor is the daughter of William Redford, this city. She went to Tacoma a couple of weeks ago and was operated upon at a hospital there for the removal of what was supposed to be a tumor. The surgeons discovered that instead of a tumor it was an accumulation of pus, and that death is very likely to result.

William Redford received a telegram from D. M. Taylor at Tacoma this afternoon, as follows: "Wife is resting easy today." This is a cause for congratulation, as it was feared that Mrs. Taylor would die from the shock of the operation before the arrival of her husband.

Stricken With Paralysis.

Warren, Feb. 5.—Mrs. Thompson Warren of this place received the sad news at 2 o'clock yesterday that her husband had been stricken with paralysis at the Rosebud Indian agency in South Dakota, where he is employed as government blacksmith. She made hurried preparations, and two hours later started for South Dakota, on the afternoon train, to attend his bedside, accompanied by her little daughter, Fay. Mr. Warren, who was an early resident of Umatilla county and formerly lived at Albia, had many friends throughout the county who will learn with deep regret of the serious misfortune that has befallen him.
