THOMPSON ON KIDNAPING.

The Joint Senator From Morrow and Umatilla Has a Bill.

Senator Thompson, of Umatilla, having in view the possibility of anyone in Oregon seeking to kidnap Pat Crowe, who successfully kidnapped a son of the wealthy Cadbury family, has introduced a bill providing for the punishment of anyone who engages in the crime of kidnaping. The act is amendatory to the present law, and is as follows:

Every person who maliciously, forcibly or fraudulently takes or entices away any child or minor under the age of 16 years, with intent to detain and conceal such child from his parent, guardian or other person having the lawful charge of such child, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by imprisonment in the state penitentiary not less than one year nor more than 25 years, and by fine not exceeding \$10,000.

Inasmuch as the penalty now provided by law for this offense is wholly inadequate an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this law shall be in force and effect from and after its passage.

WEEKLY MARKET REVIEW.

Wheat Holds Its Own as Compared With Prices of a Week Ago.

Pendleton, Feb. 7.—Wheat just holds its own as compared with prices of a week ago. Millers are offering 46 cents for No. 1 club and redchaff delivered at the mill, while exporters are paying about 42 cents. Bluestem is worth nominally from 1 1/2 to 2 cents per bushel more than the above mentioned varieties. The wheat that will be sold at less than 50 cents per bushel has pretty generally changed hands. The farmers who have heretofore refused to sell at present prices are as firm in their determination as ever. The result is, that deals are not frequently reported.

Local Market.

Pendleton dealers are paying the following prices for ranch and farm produce: Butter, 40 to 60c per roll. Eggs—25c per doz. Potatoes—50c per sack. Parsnips, 60c per sack. Cabbages—4c per pound. Turnips, 7c per 100 pounds. Turkeys—Alive, 12c per pound. Geese—12c per dozen. Chickens, \$2.50 to \$4 per dozen. Ducks—\$5 per dozen.

Wool in Boston.

Boston, Feb. 7.—The bulk of business in territory grades, with fine medium and fine staple in scored selling 47 to 48c, while the strictly staple article calls for 48 to 50c. The sales in fleece wools are so few and far between that prices are nominal.

Territory, scored basis—Montana and Wyoming, fine medium and fine, 15 to 16c; scored, 45 to 47c; staple, 47 to 50c; Idaho fine medium and fine, 14 1/2 to 15c; scored, 45 to 46c; staple, 47 to 50c.

Australian scored basis—Spot prices coming, supreme nominal, 73 to 75c; good, 67 to 70c; average, 64 to 67c.

Committee Appointed to See to the Numbering of Pendleton Houses.

A brief session of the city council was held last evening at which Mayor F. W. Vincent presided. On motion Councilmen T. B. Wells, C. E. Roosevelt and H. F. Johnson were appointed to confer with a couple of men at present in Pendleton in regard to numbering houses, with power to act.

The recorder's report for the month of January showed the following: Total number of arrests, 57; fines paid, \$285; sent to jail, 7; discharged, 1; receipts from licenses for saloons, \$1,000; from houses for saloons, \$1,000; from houses for saloons, \$1,000; from bicycle ordinance, \$9; receipts from dog tax, 75c.

L. B. COX'S CONDITION.

There is No Improvement and No Hope for His Recovery.

N. Berkeley, eq., returned from Portland this morning, where he went to be at the bedside of L. B. Cox, eq., in his critical sickness. There is no improvement in Cox's condition. Mr. Cox may live a month, but the final summons is expected at any time. In the face of his impending doom, the sick man is himself mentally, being fully conscious of his condition, and directing the arrangement of his earthly affairs. Last July Mr. Cox was thoroughly examined for a large policy of life insurance and was then pronounced an excellent risk the policy being written, and accepted and is now in force.

After that Mr. Cox, in the course of the professional work made a trip to Harney county, and upon his return

to Portland felt he was seriously ill. His physicians determined that he was suffering from appendicitis, and an operation was performed, with the result that it was discovered that his trouble was a tumor. He was in the Good Samaritan hospital nine weeks, and left there still very weak and far from a well man. In a few more weeks he was able to go to his office and resume direction of his business, but the old trouble was renewed and a second operation was submitted to a few days ago. Then it was discovered that the tumor was of the cancer family, and there was no hope for him. Mr. Cox's multitude of friends and admirers all over Oregon and the Northwest hope that he may be spared, for they recognize his merit, ability and usefulness as a man, a lawyer and citizen.

To Regulate Loan Associations.

A bill to repeal the building and loan association acts of 1891, 1895 and 1898, was introduced by Representative Nottingham. The laws in force have permitted these concerns, because they were cooperative, to loan money to members at a much higher rate of interest than is allowed by statute, under the term of premiums. Recently the courts have declared the interest charged by such companies to be usurious, no matter whether called premiums, or by any other name. M. Nottingham introduced the bill by request.

For Eastern Oregon Fairs.

McAlister of Union county has introduced a measure to better regulate the holding of Eastern Oregon fairs. The bill creates the Second Eastern Oregon agricultural society, to be composed of one member from each of the counties of Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Wheeler, Crook, Sherman and Wasco, who are to hold office until the first Monday in January, 1903. The fairs in the first district already created shall be held alternate years at La Grande and Baker City, beginning with La Grande in 1901.

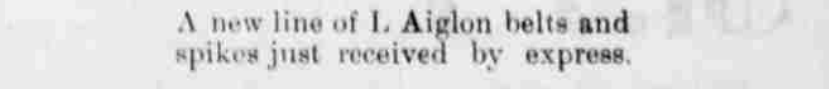
