GENERAL NEWS.

Senator Hanna was elected a comrade in Memorial post, G. A. R., in Cleveland, Ohio.

The deadlock over the election of United States senator continues in the Nebraska legislature at Lincoln.

The house committee on coinage acted favorably on the bill establishing branch units at Omaha and Tacoma.

Smallpox prevails at Glasgow, Scotland, in alarming proportions. A score of fresh cases are reported daily...

The board of health of New York city, by a unanimous vote has prohibited the future slaughter of horses and the sale of meat from all such animals slaughtered elsewhere.

The legislature of Virginia accepted from Tennessee the cession of one-half of Main street in Bristol as the boundary line between the two states.

The house committee on banking and currency tabled the bill repealing the 10 per cent tax on state bank issues and the bill requiring national bank depositories to pay interest to the government on public deposits.

Destructive brush fires throughout the colony of Victoria, Australia, have done great damage to property and stock.

The resignation of Congressman Charles A. Bontelle, as representative of the Fourth Maine district in the national congress, has been received by Governor Hill of Maine.

The Cuban constitutional convention will refuse positively to add a clause to the constitution expressing gratitude to the United States.

It is now accepted as a sure thing that the New York Central will be extended ultimately through the North-western and Union Pacific lines to the coast.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Billy Westfall was thrown from the stage he was driving by a runaway team near Susanville Thursday, and severely injured.

Charles M. Thompson won out on all three counts in the divorce suit against his wife, Ermie Thompson, by the decision handed down by Judge Clelland in Portland.

It is reported that a syndicate of Eastern capitalists have opened negotiations for the purchase of the Cougar mine, located about three miles north of Granite and owned by J. W. Larkin and D. R. Evans.

Mrs. Louisa L. Epping died suddenly at her home in Portland Wednesday evening. She had been in her usual health up to the hour of her death.

Mrs. A. F. Prescott, wife of Capt. A. F. Prescott, commanding Company F, 4th United States infantry, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Messer, of Elgin, has returned to her home at La Grande, after a long absence in the distant Orient.

George Fox, of Crawfordsville, Linn county, died while on his way home on a transport from China. Fox was a member of the Fourteenth regiment, and after serving in the Philippines, was transferred to China. Having served his time, he was on his way home to be discharged.

Mrs. Mary Crow, aged 90 years, died at her home at Lorane, 12 miles from Cottage Grove, Thursday night. With her husband, John Crow, she came to Oregon in 1852.

WILLIAMS RECEIVES M'BRIDE'S VOTE TODAY.

The Word Was Passed Around to Vote for Him.

MILITARY BILL, WITH \$46,000, PASSES

Transfer of McBride's Strength to Williams is Taken as the Beginning of a Break up in Attempt to Re-elect Him.

Salem, Feb. 9.—McBride's votes as well as those which have been given to Lowell, Moore and Fulton heretofore were cast for Hon. George H. Williams, for United States senator at the joint session of the legislature today.

The vote was as follows: Corbett, 20; Williams, 20; Smith, 1; Hermann, 1; absent and paired 20.

The house passed the military bill today, carrying an appropriation of \$45,000.

The house adopted the minority report, by Butt of committee on railroads, favoring three cent fares on all railroads in Oregon.

The vote for Williams for United States senator today was not the result of caucus action, but was due to word being passed around among the members this morning to vote for him.

It is taken as the beginning of a break up in the attempt to re-elect George W. McBride.

Williams May Win. Salem, Feb. 9.—The caucus of George H. Williams, for the United States senate, is a growing one.

HAZING AT WEST POINT. The Congressional Committee, Appointed to Inquire into It, Reports.

Washington, Feb. 9.—A special committee of the house, appointed to investigate the hazing at West Point, reported today.

The committee discovered there were three classes of hazing perpetrated: Things done for the good of the fourth class men in service; things done to punish the fourth class men in violation of the upper class code and things done apparently without purpose, except to annoy or amuse.

In regard to the fights arranged by the "upper class" men to punish the "plebes," the committee says there appears to be a fairness in that the effort to have the combatants nearly the same weight, height and length of arm.

In opinion of the committee when this system of fighting has been destroyed, the worse forms of hazing must die with it.

The committee reports the pledge made by the president of four cadet classes now at the academy to the effect that hazing hereafter will be discontinued.

MRS. NATION, CRUSADER. She Arrives at Omaha on Her Way to Des Moines and Chicago.

Council Bluffs, Ia., Feb. 9.—Mrs. Nation arrived here at 6:15 this morning and received a most cordial reception from a number of people who were at the depot to meet her.

She remained only long enough to take the next train for Des Moines, where she speaks tonight. She will be at Muscatine on Monday at Chicago on Tuesday, and return to Peopeka, where she says she will do more "house cleaning," on Wednesday.

Mrs. Nation at Des Moines. Des Moines, Ia., Feb. 9.—Mrs. Nation arrived here at 1 o'clock, the depot being jammed with men and women, who lined the walks leading thereto and they shouted and cheered as she rode in a carriage to her hotel.

Did it With a Hatchet. Auburn, Ind., Feb. 9.—Mrs. Tom Creal, whose husband is foreman in the Baltimore & Ohio shops at Garret, demolished the handsome new plate glass front of Peter Behler's saloon with a hatchet.

She had repeatedly warned Behler not to sell liquor to her husband who was in jail at the time.

THOSE DEMANDS ON CUBA. General Wood Authorized to Make Them to Constitutional Convention.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Secretary Root admits that General Wood, with the consent of the war department, has made three demands on the constitutional convention in Cuba.

First, recognition of the right of the United States to military control of the island until the native government has been formed; second, the admission of the right of the United States to intervene to prevent the island from passing into the control of some other foreign power; third, granting the United States three coaling stations on the island.

ENGLAND WANTS PEACE. Will Probably Send a Peace Commission to South Africa.

London, Feb. 9.—Rumors are persistently being spread that the government has finally determined to abandon the policy of extermination and adopt measures of conciliation in South Africa.

It is still believed that Sir Evelyn Wood is going to the Transvaal on a peace commission. He may succeed Milner as governor there.

Boers Held Up a Train. London, Feb. 9.—A dispatch from Pretoria says a train bearing a number of civilian refugees and nurses was held up by the Boers near Heidelberg.

Boers Looking Over the Country. Phoenix, Ariz., Feb. 9.—Boer envoys are visiting northern Arizona and New Mexico, preparatory to moving a colony of Boers there if suitable land can be found.

THE REPLY OF ENGLAND. It is expected to be Unsatisfactory on Nicaraguan Canal Matter.

London, Feb. 9.—It has been learned by the representative of the Associated Press that a reply will shortly be sent to the United States on the Nicaraguan canal project.

It will not comply with the senate's demands, neither will it be in the nature of a flat refusal though for the purposes of immediate construction it will be tantamount to such a refusal.

It will consist mainly in a counter proposal or proposals likely to necessitate extended negotiations.

Next Week in Congress. Washington, Feb. 9.—The ship subsidy bill will be kept under consideration all of next week in the senate, giving way only to the appropriation bills.

SENATOR TILLMAN STIRS UP THE SENATE.

He Pleads for Justice for a Mexican War Veteran.

SECTIONAL DIFFERENCES IN THE WAY South Carolina Senator Makes a Sensational Speech in the Senate Which Was Both Dramatic and Furious.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Senator Tillman created a scene in the senate today when he declared: "I swear by Almighty God I'll never heretofore permit another pension bill to be unanimously considered by the senate until an old veteran, for whom I've labored for years, to secure justice has received attention and justice."

The person the senator referred to is a Mexican war veteran, who in 1847 had both arms shot off while in the service of the government.

"Sectional difference is the cause," shouted Tillman. "Is the war over or isn't it? I want to know!" he concluded.

The bill under consideration was then passed and the naval appropriation bill called up.

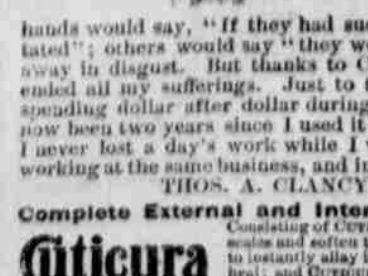
