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### THE MAN ABRAHAM LINCOLN.

Abraham Lincoln, the sixteenth president of the United States, was born in Hardin county, Kentucky, on February 12, 1809, and today, Tuesday, is the ninety-second anniversary of that illustrious American's birth, and still he is regarded as the greatest and most lovable of the country's great men, who have passed beyond the shadow of the great hereafter.

There were some who had greater talents in certain directions than Lincoln: some who were more correct and elegant in speech and conduct; but no one, not even excepting Washington, is so revered by Americans, especially by the plain people, the humble, lowly and freedom loving. He made no pretensions to perfection and struggled not to be grand and famous, and it is for this reason that he so perfectly understood and sympathized with imperfect humanity as he found it. He was not an educated man, yet who was wiser than he? He came from humble origin, through early experiences that were calculated to dwarf and cripple, yet how majestically he rose to greatness when the opportunity came and how easy he assumed mighty duties and cares.

The greatest of Lincoln's characteristics—that which made him great in every way—was his unfeigned, boundless, bottomless, inexhaustible charity, without tincture of envy, hatred or malice. He was tender as any woman, as pure of heart as a little child. He could not deceive, he could not be false, and with these sweet and gracious qualities he had a hunger to learn, a great capacity for acquiring knowledge, a keen perception of men and affairs, a swiftly and grandly broadening intelligence and a fixed determination to serve his fellow men and be ever just to one and the whole. And all these accomplishments were crowned with a keen sense of humor, which prevented him from becoming distant and cold even in assuming the garb of formal and dignified roles.

Lincoln was religious, but not orthodox. His mind was too broad and receptive—too creative—to accept any man-made creed in its entirety. He believed, without pretending to comprehend, much less to dogmatize, in God and immortality, in love and duty, in faith and prayer, in eternal goodness and everlasting justice. His feelings were stronger and keener than those of other men, and exerted the greatest influence in causing him to take up the work of breaking the shackles that bound the limbs of the slave, whom he felt was his fellow man, that "a government of the people, by the people, for the people shall not perish from the earth."

Blessed is the name and memory of Lincoln, who did most for a great party that feels little in common with him today.
