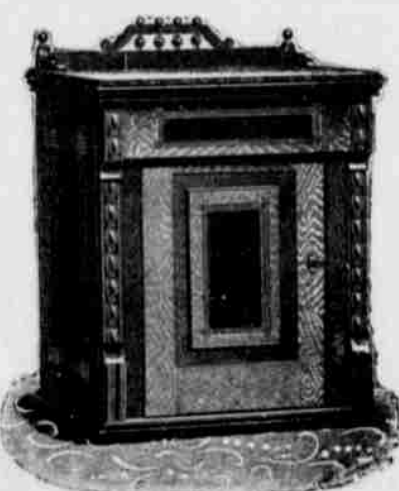

GENERAL NEWS.

Orders were prepared at the war department for the organization, assembling and equipment of 10 additional regiments authorized by the army reorganization law.

Colonel Ferris Forman, who was in command of an Illinois regiment during the Mexican war, of which he was the last surviving field officer, died at Oakland, Calif., Monday at the age of 84 years.

Maurice Thompson, the author, is dying at his home in Crawfordsville, Indiana. His age is 56. Will H. Thompson, attorney for the Great Northern railway, at Seattle, is his brother.

The followers of General Maximo Gomez triumphed in the constitutional convention at Havana. The clause making him eligible to the presidency of the republic was adopted by a vote of 15 to 4.

Russian officials admit that widespread distress exists in large sections of the country, owing to the failure of the crops. The government already has sent a million and a half roubles for the relief of the sufferers, and considers that five and a half millions will be necessary.

Lieutenant S. Hooker and Miss Mary Condit-Smith were married Monday at Epiphany church, Washington, by Bishop Satterlee. Lieutenant Hooker is stationed at the Brooklyn navy yard and is the grandson of Senator Stewart. The bride while sojourning in China several months ago became a prisoner during the siege of Peking.

One of the most interesting events in connection with the opening of the parliament on Thursday will be the formal declaration by the king of his disbelief in the characteristic doctrines of the Roman Catholic faith. Any person professing the popish religion is incapable of inheriting or possessing the crown, and the sovereign is bound to make the required declaration either on the throne in the house of lords, in the presence of both houses, at the first meeting of the first parliament after the accession or at the coronation, whichever shall happen first.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mrs. Rebecca Riffe, wife of E. G. Riffe, a pioneer of the Walla Walla valley, died Tuesday at her home in Walla Walla, aged 86 years.

Mrs. Mary Tibbitts, aged 83 years, one of the oldest pioneers of the Pacific northwest died at her residence in Walla Walla, Friday morning, February 8, of senile decay.

John W. Power, ex-state senator, brother of ex-United States Senator T. C. Power, died at Fort Benton Monday. He was a leading business man of Montana for 33 years.

Clyde Vaughn, the youth who is charged with striking Lulu Jones, of Jefferson, over the head with an ax last fall, pleaded not guilty, at Salem, and will be tried February 15.

Major E. H. Conger, minister to China, has cabled to an Iowa friend that he will accept the republican nomination for governor of Iowa, but will not make a fight for it.

Murray Wade, charged with an assault, being armed with a dangerous weapon, committed upon Will Evans, also pleaded not guilty in the circuit court at Salem, and will be tried February 19.

A big jackrabbit drive on the California plan is projected for March 3, on Blackfoot island, in the Columbia river. This island is about opposite Coyote station, on the O. R. & N., and excursionists are expected from as far as Portland for the occasion.

The Rev. John Flinn, of Portland, a pioneer minister who began his work in the Northwest in 1850, has been made the beneficiary of the will of an old Vancouver, Wash., citizen, Mr. Ross, and will thereby inherit money and property estimated to be worth \$25,000.

P. M. Maher is under arrest at Salt Lake City, on wire information from Walla Walla, Wash., charged with having obtained money under false pretenses. It is understood the sheriff of Walla Walla county is now on his way after Maher who says he is willing to return without a trial on 10 papers. He is charged with defrauding Smith Henderson, the contractor, out of \$650.

DEADLOCK STILL ON AT THE STATE CAPITAL.

Was Expected the Unexpected Would Happen Today.

ASSERTED MITCHELL HAS 45 VOTES

When He Secures the Pledge of Another He Will Be Nominated, and His Election Will Follow, It Is Asserted.

Salem, Feb. 12.—The promised sensation failed to materialize today at the time of taking the joint ballot for United States senator. The only change in the voting was the democrats and populists voted for R. D. Inman, of Portland, for senator instead of William Smith, of Baker, as heretofore. The predicted increase in the Hermann following did not materialize. The vote was as follows:

Corbett, 32.
Hermann, 29.
Inman, 26.
Absent and scattering, 3.

It is claimed that Mitchell has forty-five votes which he can depend on, 29 now being cast for Hermann and 16 democratic votes, and as soon as he can secure one more his name will be placed on the list of candidates and his election will follow. It was asserted here last night by some of the "push" that this would occur today, but the "unexpected" did not happen.

Pendleton Charter Bill Passes.
Salem, Feb. 12.—The Pendleton charter bill has passed both houses of the legislature and awaits the signature of the governor.

Legislative Notes.
The railroad fellow-servants liability bill met with defeat in the house.

The bill for a bounty on sea lions passed the senate.

Mulkey's dog tax bill failed.
Governor Geer has signed the bill reducing the interest on school loans to 6 per cent, and it is now a law. All persons having loans may secure the benefit of the new rate by paying up all arrearages.

Governor Geer filed the barber Sunday closing bill without his signature, thus completing the proceedings necessary to make it a law. As it bears an emergency clause, it goes into effect at once and will make barbering on next Sunday a crime under the law of Oregon.

MR. NATION IS SENSIBLE.

He Does Not Approve of Her Eastern Tour.

Wichita, Kans., Feb. 12.—When Mrs. Carrie Nation, the saloon smasher, returns to her home at Medicine Lodge she will not meet with a pleasant reception from her husband if he remains in his present state of mind. He gave out an interview in which he severely criticized his wife for touring the East.

"She should remain in Kansas, where she can do some good," he said. "I don't approve of her going all over the East and making a show of herself, as people there only want to make fun of her."

"I think she is showing to the world that she is losing her nerve, instead of telling them how she did things out here. People have read in the papers how she smashed saloons. If she starts to raise any row in Chicago and other towns I hope they will put her in jail and make her suffer for it. I took her part and spent several hundred hard-earned dollars while she was fighting saloons in Wichita, but when she goes out of her sphere I will have nothing more to do with her should she get into trouble."

In this connection it is well to note that fourteen years ago David Nation was run out of Columbia, Texas, for horsewhipping this same woman. Perhaps he will do so again if she fails to please him.

Mrs. Nation in Chicago.

Chicago, Feb. 12.—All sensation that Carrie Nation was scheduled to create by her appearance in Chicago was delivered last night. Today, the famous ax-wielder from Kansas rested quietly at her hotel, reading her voluminous correspondence and resisted all attempts to get her out on the war-path. This afternoon she lectures at Willard hall.

Smashed a Saloon.
Winfield, Kans., Feb. 12.—A mob of two hundred today demolished Henry Schmidt's saloon in this place. Schmidt's son was struck with an ax and seriously hurt.

THE JEFFRIES-RUHLIN FIGHT.

Ten Companies Ordered to Be Ready to Stop the Contest.

Columbus, O., Feb. 12.—While it is now stated that no actual orders have been issued sending troops to Cincinnati, all plans have been perfected for such purpose if it is found necessary.

Troops Ordered Out.

Columbus, O., Feb. 12.—Ten companies of the Sixth regiment have been given orders to start for Cincinnati, so as to reach there Friday afternoon and camp at the Sangerfest building, where the fight is scheduled to take place.

THE KING MAKES REPLY.

He Has Deep Interest in Better Houses for Working Classes.

London, Feb. 12.—King Edward answering the address of the London county council today, said the development of the government of London was one of the most important features of

his mother's reign. He was confident he would do nothing to slacken the efforts now employed, especially in the housing of the working classes, a matter in which he felt a deep interest.

Coronation Ceremony.
London, Feb. 12.—It is stated that the coronation of King Edward will take place on July 24.

Oil Strike in Indiana.
Hartford City, Ind., Feb. 12.—The gigantic oil well struck on the Bird farm, which has been astonishing the old men in the business, by producing seven thousand barrels per day, has narrowed down to five hundred, and shows signs of exhaustion. The well is a freak and will not last much longer.

Convicts Attempt to Escape.
Birmingham, Ala., Feb. 12.—Seven convicts attempted to escape from Pratt's mines today. The guard caught them in the act and shot and killed Chase, Higgins, a liver and fatally wounded George Barker. None of them succeeded in escaping.

An Address of Loyalty.
London, Feb. 12.—The lord mayor and the members of the corporation proceeded in state to St. James Palace this afternoon to present an address of loyalty to the king. There was only a languid interest in the proceedings.

Revolutionary Movement in Spain.
Saragossa, Spain, Feb. 12.—In an encounter today between the police and an anti-clerical mob one man was killed and six wounded. The populace is inflamed by revolutionary speeches.

Mrs. Senator Platt Dead.
New York, Feb. 12.—Ellen Brewster Platt, the wife of Senator Thomas C. Platt, died at 6 o'clock this morning, at the Fifth Avenue hotel, of heart trouble.

Steamship Overdue.
Quebec, Feb. 12.—The steamer Rhineland, from Philadelphia, is six days overdue. Much anxiety prevails here for fear of disaster.

M'KINLEY AND ROOSEVELT.

FORMALLY ELECTED TO HIGH OFFICES BY PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS.

The Vote Was Taken in the Hall of the House of Representatives.

Washington, Feb. 12.—The formal ceremony which makes William McKinley president, and Theodore Roosevelt, vice president elect, of the United States took place in the hall of the house of representatives at 1 o'clock today, when the ballots were cast of the different states by the presidential electors, and were counted by tellers appointed from the membership of the two houses of congress, and the result announced by Senator Frye, president pro tem of the senate. Entrance to the galleries was by card. The tellers were Chandler, Caffery, Grosvenor and Richardson. The ballot boxes were placed, one on the speaker's desk and one on the teller's desk, the contents being duplicates. By the time Indiana was reached, however, the interest in the proceedings waned and many hurried themselves with reading newspapers.

DUTY ON RUSSIAN GOODS.

Secretary Gage Recommends That It Be Imposed.

Washington, Feb. 12.—The first gun in a commercial war between the United States and Russia has been fired by Secretary Gage, who recommends a countervailing duty on goods imported from the land of the czar. Russia has been purchasing \$11,000,000 of farm implements from the United States every year. Donbass Russia will return a shot by imposing high duties on our products if Secretary Gage's suggestion is adopted.

Mexico, Feb. 12.—The Maya rebels suffered another severe defeat by the government troops at Chanaatz Cruz. Reports from Merida, Yucatan, say hundreds are dying there of smallpox.

May Wheat in Chicago.
