The story as told by George E. Mr. Moore's trial will take place this afternoon before Justice Fitzgerald. District Attorney T. G. Bailey went to Adams this forenoon on a civil case, and will return on the freight train at 2:30 this afternoon.

FOR SENATOR, H. W. SCOTT.

What the Newspapers Say of the East Oregonian's Proposal.

Spokesman Review. Through the Oregon legislature is within 10 days to adjournment, the senatorial deadlock continues. The Pendleton East Oregonian suggests that it be broken by the election of Editor H. W. Scott of the Portland Oregonian, saying:

"The broader minded the man that is chosen the better it will be for the state. Now, there is H. W. Scott, editor of the Oregonian, who is thoroughly equipped for the office and would fill it with distinction to the state as well as to himself. Why not elect him? He is thoroughly of Oregon; his blood is of Oregon making and his intellect would shine for Oregon in the senate of the United States. Mr. Scott is a lover of Oregon, a believer in its future greatness. No man is more an Oregonian than he is not more fitted to speak for Oregon in the great halls of statecraft. He is not a lawyer, but he is capable as any lawyer in Oregon. He is not a great orator, and none is needed in this connection. If he were chosen by the legislature the brains of the United States senate would receive a substantial addition and the fame of Oregon for producing men of mark, of talent and gray matter would go farther toward the four corners of the earth. No one in the state would be injured if Mr. Scott were sent to the United States senate. Those who would oppose his going are only those who have felt the lash of his newspaper whip, and in most instances they deserved what they got and were rather benefited by receiving it."

Oregon is not in the psychological mood to elect a man of Mr. Scott's intellectuality. Of recent years the tendency at Salem has been towards choosing senators of diminishing caliber. But even though political conditions at Salem would permit his election, Mr. Scott would not engage in the struggle, and it is doubted if he would accept the senatorship even though it might come to him without effort.

Election to the senate would not increase his power or add to his dignity. He has chosen his life work, the long task is well advanced and he is not the man to turn from the plow when the last furrows are in sight and so in search of another vocation and doubtful honors. To do that would require descent from a plane he has attained by nearly 50 years of preparation and effort.

If the land were in shock of great conflict, if the emotions of men were swayed by false doctrines endangering the Union, it would be different. But no great honor and no enduring fame attach to the existing functions of a United States senator. In that forum success best is gained by appropriations, by industrious attention to the errands of influential constituents, by standing with the administration whether the administration is right or wrong, and by wearing a stereotyped smile and extending the warm hand to all comers.

Mr. Scott is not cast in that mold. His power is with his pen, and his theater the editorial rooms of the Oregonian. As the public judgment goes, there are 50 men in Oregon who would make a 'better' senator. But who is in all Oregon is the man who would make a better editor?

Athous Press: What's the matter with Sam Jackson? Is he or is he not? From the general aspect of things that ought to be but are not, he isn't. Sam, in his East Oregonian, advising the legislature to vote for Harvey Scott for United States senator! Shades of Mary Ellen Lease, and other political acrobats and trapeze performers! What can Sam be thinking of? Surely not advocating support of the Scott-Corbett-Simon triumvirate, a combination which has been kicking over Umatilla county and the Inland Empire, for, lo, these many years? We won't believe it! We are from Missouri, and you'll have to 'show us.'"

FREE POSTAL DELIVERY.

Superintendent for the Coast Passed Through Pendleton Friday.

Mr. Edwin, special agent of the post-office department and in charge of the free delivery postal system for the coast, was a visitor in Pendleton on Friday afternoon and left at night for Baker City. The introduction of the free postal delivery system for Pendleton is not making any progress. The statistical situation is all right as regards population and postoffice receipts, but there are some things necessary to be done before this city will have the benefit of free postal delivery. One of these things is that the streets will have to be better lighted on the outlying free delivery routes and there will have to be better sidewalks in the same territory. All good things come in time and a free postal system for Pendleton is something that may be considered of that nature.

SENATOR PROEBSTEL'S BILL.

An Act to Prohibit the Operation of Nick-in-the-Slot Machines.

Senator Proebstel's bill for an act to prohibit the operating or conducting of nick-in-the-slot machines in Oregon passed the senate with but one dissenting vote, that of Senator Williamson, who contended that this matter should be left to local option and that municipal corporations should be allowed to regulate it. The bill is as follows:

"Sec. 1.—Any person or persons who shall conduct, maintain or operate either as owner or owners, proprietor or proprietors, lessee or lessees, employee or employees, agent or agents or who shall play or use any nick-in-the-slot machine, or other device of like character wherein there enters an element of chance, whether the same be played or operated for money, checks, credits, or any other thing of representative value, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$100, and in default of payment of the fine imposed, shall be imprisoned in the county jail one day for each \$2 thereof.

"Sec. 2.—In all prosecutions under this act for conducting, maintaining or operating any such machine or device, proof of the possession of such machine or device, or of permitting the same to be or remain in any public place owned or controlled by the person so prosecuted, shall be prima facie evidence against such person of violation of this act.

"Sec. 3.—One-half of the fine imposed of any conviction under this act shall be paid to the person who is the private prosecutor in the case and the other half shall be paid into the county treasury of the county wherein such conviction was secured for the benefit of the school fund.

"Sec. 4.—Justices of the peace shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit court in all offenses arising under this act.

"Sec. 5.—All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

"Sec. 6.—Inasmuch as there is some doubt existing regarding the validity of the act of February 4, 1899, covering the same subject matter, and inasmuch as the moral sentiment of the state demands this enactment in the interest of the youth of the state, and that the law shall be effective at once."
