THE PRISONER OF ZENDA.

Meritorious Presentation of the Play at the Frasier Saturday Night.

"The Prisoner of Zenda," a play in four acts, was presented at the Frasier Saturday night in a meritorious manner to the evident delight of a large audience. The play is an intricate one, exciting in its character, and that the different characters were so ably sustained is creditable to their ability. The duel scene in the prologue between Vaughan Glaser and Charles Brandt was realistic enough to cause to be to the spectators a matter of excitement. Vaughan Glaser, who plays the company and plays the title character, as the play progressed, he became a prime favorite and won the admiration of the audience for masterly interpretation of the dual characters of Rudolf V. the Red Elephant, king of Ruritania, and Rudolf Reesdyll, a young Englishman. His easy change of character from king, when those in the secret were present, to a civilian with those who knew the real condition of affairs, was extremely pleasing. Popular throughout the play was Charles C. Brandt, as Colonel Sapt, an old soldier who displayed all the nobility necessary for the part and did it almost to hold the throne for his faithful claimant. He had the audience with him all the time. Cecil Owen as Michael, Duke of Stralau, the king's cousin was up to the arduous duties of the part and gave a good representation of the desperate character of a prince. Luke Connors, as Fritz, a henchman, Colonel Sapt's right hand and supporter and abettor, played the part ably and gracefully. W. H. Wadsworth is entitled to credit for his consistent work as Bertrand, a young English artist. Willis Page as Marshal Strakenes; Louis Gilbert as Lorenz, Teppich, chancellor of Ruritania; and W. H. Wadsworth again as Franz Teppich, wife of Franz. Marie Palmer as Countess von Strofin. The second named was particularly effective in the dungeon scene. Robert Connors was sufficiently rakish as Captain Hertzau, follower of Duke Michael.

All that was lacking was a safety-pin to keep back the edge of the drop curtain when dropped between acts. Either that or the management should provide rotten apples for the spectators to throw at the stage hand who posed in the aperture, or see what was going on in the auditorium.

UNCLE TOM'S CABIN NEXT.

The Play to be Presented at the Frasier Wednesday Evening.

The famous play which dates back so far that some people have a vague notion that it caused the war of the rebellion has been presented with religious regularity each dramatic season sometimes with double little Evans and double Uncle Toms even but never has it been given with such an elaborate stage dressing and realistic effects as this.

In fact several of the features are in themselves sufficiently novel to make it worth while going to see "Uncle Tom's Cabin" for the forty-seventh time. The company is strong. Topsy is a fine piece of character and dialect acting with the additional virtue that it is really funny. It is doubtful if the part was ever given better or even as well played by anyone else. But the leading feature of the production is the gorgeous transformation scene, which represents "Little Eva in the Golden Realm." The tableau is a beautiful and striking one, representing the flight of the angels of death and the opening of the golden gates. There are also several other noteworthy stage settings, representing a cotton picking scene, Elihu crossing the ice, etc. Some very pleasing singing of plantation melodies is given by a colored quartette, and there is some wing dancing that is a great novelty.

SPENDING PEOPLE'S MONEY.

LEGISLATURE AT SALEM WILL BE THE MOST BURDENSOME ON RECORD.

One Appropriation Bill, and There Will Be Three, Carries \$1,220,000

The legislature is doing little at Salem but it is spending with a free hand. The appropriation bill reported from the ways and means committee carries \$1,220,000, not including \$100,000 for the scalp deficit, with a third bill yet to be reported. The items are as follows:

For the payment of the salaries of the officers and employees and for the maintenance, general and contingent expenses of the asylum, including salaries of the trustees, viz., governor, \$500 a year and the secretary of state and state treasurer, each \$100 a year, \$250,000.

Expenses of electric and gas lighting and purchase of electrical and gas supplies and fixtures for the asylum, \$15,800.

Expenses of returning to their homes, patients discharged from the asylum, \$1200.

Library and amusements for patients at the asylum, \$1200.

General repairs and improvements at asylum, \$15,000.

A Machinery, farming implements, etc., for asylum, \$3525.

Finishing and furnishing new wing, closed cottage and kitchen, and the construction of additional buildings, storehouses, sheds, asylum, \$46,350.

Expenses of the transportation of insane and idiotic persons committed to asylum, \$2,500.

Salaries of officers and employees, and for maintenance and general and contingent expenses of penitentiary, \$54,000.

Expenses of the general repairs and improvements at penitentiary, \$4500.

Expenses of transportation of convicts committed to penitentiary, \$12,500.

Salaries of officers, teachers and employees, and for the maintenance and general and contingent expenses of the reform school, \$53,000.

Expenses of general repairs and improvements and for purchase of tools, machinery, farming implements, livestock, etc., for reform school, \$5500.

Salaries of the officers, teachers and employees, and for the maintenance and general and contingent expenses of school for deaf-mutes, \$29,000.

Expenses of general repairs and improvements, plumbing, etc., and for purchase of vehicles, etc., for school of deaf-mutes, \$3000.

Salaries of officers, teachers and employees, and for maintenance and general and contingent expenses of institute for blind, \$15,000.

Expenses of general repairs and improvements at institute for blind, \$1,200.

Claims for the support and maintenance of Soldiers' homes, incurred during the years 1899 and 1900, for which past appropriation was insufficient, \$1075.71.

Salaries of officers and employees, and for the maintenance and general and contingent expenses of Soldiers' homes, \$24,000.

Expenses of construction of suitable addition to hospital at the Soldiers' home, \$9000.

Expenses of general painting and repairs and for purchase of horses for Soldiers' home, \$1800.

Current expenses of state agricultural college and for payment of professors and instructors, as provided by an act approved February 16, 1899, \$10,000.

Claims for support and maintenance of state normal school at Monmouth, incurred during the years 1899 and 1900, for which past appropriation was insufficient, \$4300.

Salaries of officers, teachers and employees, and maintenance and general and contingent expenses of state normal school at Monmouth, \$1500.

Expenses of general repairs and improvements and purchase of additional lands for state normal school at Monmouth, \$2500.

Salaries of officers, teachers and employees and maintenance and general and contingent expenses of Southern Oregon state normal school at Ashland, \$12,500.

Expenses of construction of a boys' dormitory for the Southern Oregon state normal school at Ashland, \$2500.

Salaries of officers, teachers and employees and maintenance and general and contingent expenses of the Central Oregon state normal school at Drain, \$10,500.

Expenses of general repairs, heating plant, etc., for the Central Oregon state normal school at Drain, \$1500.

Claims for the support and maintenance of Eastern Oregon state normal school at Weston, incurred during the years 1899 and 1900, for which past appropriation was insufficient, \$2429.55.

Salaries of officers, teachers and employees and maintenance and general and contingent expenses of Eastern Oregon state normal school at Weston, \$20,000.

Expenses of general repairs, painting, improvements, etc., at the Eastern Oregon state normal school at Weston, \$2500.

Expenses of construction of new building and heating plant for the Eastern Oregon state normal school at Weston, \$35,000.

Salary and expenses of Oregon dairy and food commissioner, \$9000.

Salaries and expenses of game and forestry warden and deputies, \$4400.

Expenses of fish commissioner and deputy, \$7000.

Expenses incident to making alterations, improvements and repairs in the capitol, \$16,187.

Expenses of support of non-resident poor in several counties, \$5000.

Expenses necessarily incurred in arrest and return of fugitives from justice, \$3000.

Rewards for arrests as provided by section 2197 HUI's code, \$600.

Per diem and mileage of electors of president and vice president, \$180.20.

Section 2 provides that, whereas, the act of October 18, 1878, appropriating \$2500 annually for the support of the University of Oregon was not repealed until the present session; and, whereas, such appropriation has not been drawn or used by the university since 1884 and now aggregates the sum of \$40,000; and, whereas, a central heating, light, water and power plant for the university is very much needed; now, therefore, the sum of \$30,000 is hereby appropriated for the construction of same, to be expended under the direction of the board of regents, which sum shall be in lieu of, and in full satisfaction of the unexpended balance under the act of October 18, 1878, and such act is hereby repealed.

Section 3 authorizes the secretary of state to draw his warrant for the above; section 4 provides there shall be no indebtedness incurred, and section 5 declares an emergency.

Sam Henderson and Myer, brakemen, injured about body, not seriously.

The injured men were taken to Portland hospitals.
