JOHN H. BOYCE'S FUNERAL.

Buried at Echo This Afternoon. With Masonic Honors.

W. B. Parker, I. R. Yerkes and S. D. Williams, Masters of Umatilla, and Frank Rack and Richard Jones, Masters of Echo, came to Pendleton on Friday in response to telegrams announcing the death of John H. Boyce at 11:30 p. m., on February 21, at the Pendleton sanitarium. After discussion it was decided to have the funeral at Echo, to which place the remains were taken on the delayed train shortly after noon today accompanied by the above mentioned and W. D. Hansford, Col. E. D. Boyd and H. C. Means and others of this city. Interment was announced to be in Odd Fellows cemetery at 2 o'clock this afternoon with Masonic honors, the deceased at the time of death being an honorary member of that order.

At the time of his death Mr. Boyce

left an estate worth about \$10,000 which will go to Ralph McCoy, of Echo, a foster child of deceased. Mr. McCoy was in Pendleton and accompanied the party to Echo. Ralph, an older brother and a sister were taken by Mr. Boyce to raise and brought up and made their home with him as though he were their father. The daughter married and died several months ago. The older brother enlisted in the army and was on duty in the Philippines, and is reported to have been killed. Thus Ralph McCoy, being the only survivor of the family, will be heir to the property.

A Corrected Biography

John H. Boyce was born in Vermont in 1830 and came around the Horn to California in 1850; in '51 he mined on the Stanislaus; in 1852 he freighted with a 16-mile team from Stockton to various points; in 1860 engaged in hauling quartz in Nevada; came to the Elk creek mines, Eastern Oregon, in 1862; was at Bannock, Idaho, in 1862, mining and packing; from '64 to '69 engaged on a teamster of a 12-mile prairie schooner, which he afterwards bought and continued driving till 1880. 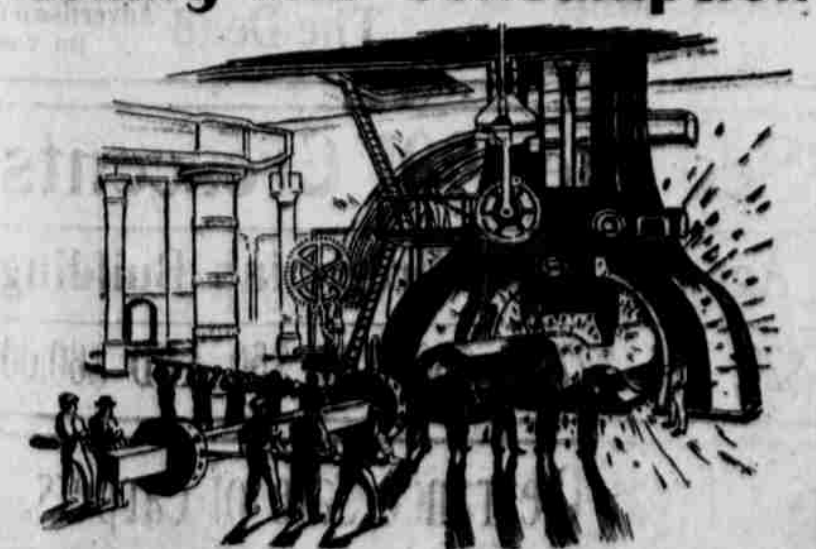

VICTORY FOR PENDLETON.

WALLA WALLA PLAYED WELL, BUT WAS UP AGAINST IT.

Pendleton had the best of the game all the way through and by the score of 11 to 0.

The game of football on Friday afternoon, February 22, on the Alta street grounds, between the teams of Walla Walla and Pendleton, was won by the latter by a score of 11 to 0. The visitors arrived on the train Tuesday evening and were met at the depot by a large delegation and escorted to their quarters. Early Friday afternoon there was a stampede to the scene of operations. The stores, banks and postoffice were closed, affording an opportunity for many to attend and the crowd there was estimated at 500.

When play was called Pendleton had the west end of the grounds and Walla Walla the east. Slusher kicked off and the ball rolled toward Walla Walla, but through some mistake the players fluked and on the down Pendleton got the ball. Mr. Shull being largely instrumental therefore. The players pushed each other back and forth and glared savagely at each for several downs, Lewis getting through the center taking advantage of large holes made in the opposing team by Shull and Anderson; Dale Slusher made a left end run; Turner ran around right end to within 15 yards of goal. Slusher made a run south across the field, but; then came more straight line bucking until Captain Hill was enabled to dash through the line for a touchdown back of the goal; Slusher kicked a straight goal, and the score stood 6 to 0 in favor of Pendleton.

Second Half.

After the touchdowns in the first half the Pendleton enthusiasts breathed easier, and as nothing of interest happened before time was called the second half was opened with a large majority of those present in a good humor. The boys from Basket Mountain were waiting for an opportunity to announce that they were present, for naturally they sympathized with Walla Walla, and made no bones about it. Lasater kicked off for Walla Walla and here is where it required the real article to keep Walla Walla from scoring a touchdown. Pendleton kicked to make a dash for it. Walla Walla got the ball. It was pushed and shoved for some little time until the gloomy eye of the umpire detected one of the Pendleton boys on the wrong side of an imaginary line, and he advanced the Walla Walla boys 10 yards. Whether it was, however, Elmer Turner who was the offender will never be positively known. Some say that Mr. Turner hopped nimbly through the Walla Walla line like a weasel before the ball was in play. This decision had the effect of putting the skin right on Pendleton's front door-step, as it were, and the home boys humped their backs for a supreme effort. The off-side play had given them the ball, and they took no chances. They backed the center and made holes for Lewis to go through, and it is superfluous to state that he went. That which he was there for, and he attended strictly to his knitting. Time after time and steadily the ball was advanced toward Walla Walla's goal, until near the center of the field. A couple of short runs for good gains and the right end took the ball to Walla Walla's 20-yard line. After some bluffing and puffing in the southwest corner of the field, the ball was passed to Slusher, and assisted by good interference he ran diagonally across the field and over the line into Walla Walla's back yard for the second touchdown. He had a chance to kick goal from a difficult position and made a good effort, but the ball went a few feet to one side, with a decision of no goal. That left the score at 11 to 0 in favor of Pendleton, and there was no opportunity to reset the pegs, those being the final figures.

It was near the close of the second half that Walla Walla made one of the prettiest plays of the game. Pendleton had forced the ball close to Walla Walla's line, and threatened a touchdown. Walla Walla had the ball and realized that no gain could be made through Pendleton's line, so passed the ball back and punted to the center of the field. It is a play with which the Pendleton players are familiar, but was heartily applauded by all, as it was desired to give credit where due. Lacy Galbraith, manager of the Walla Walla team, was referee during the first half and umpire in the second, while Robert Bond, of the Pendleton academy, alternated with him. Most modestly officiated as timekeeper. They played 25-minute halves.

NEW MINING CAMP.

Frank Bowman, Formerly of Pendleton Writes About It.

Joseph Ore., Feb. 20.—L. D. Lively, who recently was in Pendleton, was quoted by the East Oregonian as saying that he was located in the Seven Devil's country, while the fact is he is twenty miles above Wild Goose and a long ways below the Seven Devils. In short he is located at the mouth of Inasha river, on Deer creek and near Crook, and close to where several of us have claims. He is on the Oregon side and a resident of Walla Walla county. The outlook here is excellent and a good deal of freight is being delivered to these mines, showing that considerable work is being done there. The ore is reddish and some of the assays show forty per cent of copper. A man named Thresher has bonded five claims to a Spokane man on an option price of \$40,000. There will be considerable activity in the camp next summer.

Grain Fleet in the Columbia.

The German bark Professor Kohn and the German ship Brunshausen arrived up the Columbia Thursday afternoon, and the fleet in the port of Portland is again assuming good proportions. Including the Marie Blackfield and the Colony, now at Astoria ready to leave up, there is 16,900 tons net register in the river. This fleet will carry 25,000 tons of wheat, an amount which will materially ease the strain on the docks. There is about 20,000 tons net register under charter and now due there, so that the scarcity of ships which kept business down to small proportions in February will not be in evidence in March.
