WEEKLY MARKET REVIEW.

Wheat is Higher in Pendleton Market Than a Week Ago.

Pendleton, Feb. 28.—There has been an advance in the price of wheat during the past week, which reached its climax on Wednesday, when No. 1 city and redchaff was worth 46 cents delivered at the mills. It is not worth this much, today, however, having dropped a half cent per bushel. Exporters are still offering 45 cents per bushel. L. C. Rothrock sold 5000 bushels of extra redchaff in the warehouse at Eastland to W. S. Myers at 44 cents per bushel. The same wheat would be worth 44 cents per bushel today. Several farmers who are holding their wheat announce that they will let it go at 45 cents per bushel at outside warehouses. If the price ever goes to that figure.

New York, Feb. 28.—Special cable and telegraphic communications to Bradstreet's show the following changes in available supplies, compared with last accounts:

Wheat—United States and Canada, east of the Rockies, decreased 1,622,000 bushels; about for and in Europe decreased 2,000,000 bushels; total supply decreased 3,622,000 bushels.

THE LAND OF SUNSHINE.

AN ERA OF PROSPERITY IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA.

A Million Acres of Land Opened for Settlement in That Part of the State.

Armed, Calif. Feb. 24.—To say this country is entering upon a prosperous era, would be to repeat an old saw, but if the number of trains that pass in the night is any criterion to go by, then the facts are clearly manifest, for there is scarcely an hour from dusk until day break, but what a train goes thundering by. Some of them are overland flyers, bearing hundreds of Eastern tourists, others are through freights, loaded with oranges bound eastward, besides an occasional special. At this season of the year many people from the Atlantic and middle western states who are blessed with the means for enjoying a few months' outing come to this most pleasant climate, free from "winter's chilly blasts" they can rest and grow happy.

Irrigating One Million Acres.

Just now there is a great rush to the lower part of the state, near the line of old Mexico, where the government has recently surveyed and has opened up for settlement a tract of land embracing nearly one million acres. The California improvement company are opening a canal from the Colorado river sufficiently large to reclaim the whole tract. The canal is fifty feet wide on the bottom with sloping sides and is calculated to carry ten feet of water, that is, the water will be ten feet deep in the canal. They have about 30 miles of the canal completed. Besides this they use about 40 miles of the channel of the old Salton river bed. They have two large dredges at work straightening and widening the river channel. One of the machines does over 120,000 and the other one \$10,000. As is the case in all new openings, the "sidewalk farmer" is very much in evidence. Hundreds of men who know no more about practical farming than I do about almost any subject you may mention, have gone there and filed on 320 acres of desert land, with the sole object of holding for a better price. It is claimed the climate is very good, equal in fact to any portion of the San Joaquin valley and the soil is equal to any other spot on earth. I expect to go there in a short time, then I will tell you how it looked through my optics.

Mitchell's Election.

I learn by the Los Angeles papers that John H. Mitchell has been elected to the United States Senate. It is also very pleasant to see the political hucksters and grafters occasionally get it where the chicken got the axe, just as they did in this state when Thomas Bard outwitted the "Ees Pew" gang.

Plenty of Professionals.

While this country is noted for its healthfulness, patriotism and sanctity yet we are fairly flooded with doctors, lawyers and dabbles. There are barbers on every street corner, preachers fairly block the way and doctors thicker than socks around the state house. There is one of the "D. D." faculty here who furnishes me with a great deal of amusement. He passed me one day in the edge of town going as fast as his horse could run. I said "who are you dying so suddenly in this healthy climate?" for I was certain "Doc" had been called on an emergency case, but what was my surprise to find him a mile or so out of town, sitting by the side of the road leisurely swapping lies with one of the best known fair-actors in the county. I have seen him at other times rushing down the street, elbowing his way through the crowd and all the time swearing and cursing to indicate the importance of his mission. I followed him one evening only to see him switch off into an alley and then cautiously enter his own lot through the rear gate. To see this fellow parading around the county, this one would think he was attending all the sick in the country, when the facts are he has not had a legitimate call in three months. There is another of the cult here who is as great a curiosity as the one above referred to, except in the way of practice. This one lives on a quiet orange ranch, and while he owns a horse and a bike, he makes most of his calls afoot. You may meet him on the road anywhere between Los Angeles and San Bernardino, always wearing the same brown overcoat with the pockets overflowing with bottles and boxes of purgatives and emetics of his own concoction. He is a young fellow, about 26, yet he has an established reputation that many older heads are justly jealous of and it doesn't seem to matter to him whether his patients are able to pay for his services or not, he goes just the same. I met him one day near Covina the other day, when I inquired in a confidential way "How many stiff have you laid out this week, Billy?" "None by gosh," was his reply. "I have not made out a death certificate for so long that the one at the case I have of this kind I will have to look up the law on that subject."
