Captain James L. Smith, better known as "Big Jim" Smith, died suddenly at Newberg, near Portland, Monday afternoon, aged 63 years, 11 months and 23 days. Captain Smith was for more than twenty years a prominent figure in Willamette river steamboat circles.

William Martin, a farmer, was found guilty of assault and battery, committed upon George Murphy last November at Salem. Martin and Murphy became engaged in an altercation, which resulted in Martin assaulting Murphy and injuring him so as to necessitate the removal of an eye.

The cause of death is not known, but it is believed to have been the result of an overdose of a narcotic taken to induce sleep. The deceased was born in New York in 1832, came to California in 1860, and to Oregon in 1864. He leaves no family.

The funeral of the late J. W. Froome took place at Athena at 10 o'clock this morning. The services being conducted by Rev. William Brewster, of the Methodist Episcopal church, with which denomination Mr. Froome had been connected for many years. George M. Froome returned this afternoon to Pendleton.

LAW REGARDING ROAD TAX.

County Courts Given Authority to Do Road Work With Cash.
House bill 108, to provide for the collection of road taxes, became a law Tuesday. The law requires county courts to levy a road tax of not more than 10 mills on the dollar, based on the previous year's assessment. The fund thus created is to be expended under the direction of a county roadmaster, who has supervision of the road supervisors.

Upon the petition of 12 freeholders of any road district, approved by the roadmaster for the improvement of any road, the county court shall consider the petition, and, if approved, shall call for sealed bids for the performance of the work and furnishing of the material needed, and let the contract to the best bidder, provided, however, that the court may reject any and all bids. The court is also authorized to purchase rock-crushers out of the road fund. The tax heretofore made collectible under other acts.

CHANGED THE BRAND.

A Cattle Thief Comes to Grief in Baker County.
For ten days or two weeks there have been rumors of "shady" transactions in connection with a certain cattle deal, and murmurs among stockmen that "something would drop" one of these days have been many. The matter finally culminated in the arrest in Union county and his examination last Saturday at Union of Wayne Fisher on the charge of the larceny of a cow. He was bound over in the sum of \$200 to the next term of court. It seems Tommy Mack, the Granite butcher, purchased a band of cattle in the panhandle section to be used as

beef in his Granite shop, says the Baker City Democrat. As he drove the cattle through Baker City a certain fat cow was recognized as belonging to a prominent stockman of the valley. Tommy Mack corralled the stock above town until the matter could be investigated. The stockman was sent for, who recognized the cow as his property. The cow had passed through Wayne Fisher's hands before coming into possession of Mr. Mack. Fisher compromised the matter with the stockman by paying him \$40, claiming that if the animal was not his a mistake had been made.

The alert officers of the stock association heard of the matter and upon a thorough investigation came to the conclusion that the stockman's brand had been deliberately changed from JJ to WF connected by the application of an iron joining the two, hence the arrest. It is rumored that more than one animal has been carrying that brand.
