REQUEST FOR SCALP LAW.

WOOL CONVENTION ADOPTED STRONG RESOLUTIONS.

Ask Washington Legislature to Do as Have Bordering States, in Extinction of Coyotes.
The resolution drawn up by the committee, under instruction by the wool convention, anent the scalp bounty law in Washington, is as follows:
Be it resolved, by the Pacific Northwest Woolgrowers' association now in session in the fourth annual convention, at Pendleton, Oregon, that the secretary of the association be instructed to communicate by letter to the chief clerk of the house and senate of the legislature of the state of Washington, now in session at Olympia, Washington, that, inasmuch as all the states bordering on the state of Washington have enacted laws providing for payment of bounties for scalps of predatory animals, we respectfully suggest on the part of this association that your honorable body take similar action.

The resolution was sent by Secretary Bailey, as ordered. The subject occasioned considerable discussion. The members of the convention appeared to be a unit as to the desirability of scalp bounty laws, while advocating different means of accomplishing the desired end.

Williamson on Coyotes
"So far as the coyote is concerned, in Oregon he is doomed. Two years more of the slaughter will so thin his ranks as to make the expense of continuing the bounty to a relatively small amount. There remains but one cloud upon the horizon; one difficulty continually looms up before us:

"Were it not for the fact that a still broader movement is essential to complete success the farmers and stock raisers of Oregon might confidently look forward to the time when the destruction of property from this source would be reduced to a minimum."

"Gentlemen, having been absent from my affairs during the winter, I assure you that nothing would have induced me to appear before you upon this occasion except the desire I had to urge upon you the necessity of concurrent action on the part of the states concerned in this particular."

TUESDAY NIGHT'S SESSION
Spillman on "Grasses" and Patrick on "Lincoln Sheep." Tuesday evening Prof. W. J. Spillman, of the experimental station at the Pullman agricultural college, addressed the convention on "Grasses," giving the results of experiments made at his college. Prof. Spillman outlined certain plans for the demonstration of the utility of several varieties of grasses, and then gave a detailed account of this discovery at the station and his observations in different parts of the country. The experiments have been and will be carried on in connection with the United States department of agriculture at Washington. He said in part:

"When it comes to forage plants for the wheat growing sections, we have something more than plans. I have no hesitation in saying that grasses may be made a part of the regular rotation of crops with profit to the land and its owner. The seeding habits of a grass are of more importance than any other characteristic."
"Timothy is one of the least nutritious of grasses; it will not stand pasturing, it is good for only three or four years at most; it is not much relished by any kind of stock, except horses. Yet, it is the king of the hay grasses in the east, for no good reason except that it produces a great abundance of seeds that are easily saved, and, being very small, a small quantity will seed a large area."
"I could name a half dozen grasses that would be better in every way, if they had the seeding habits of timothy. If orchard grass, Italian ryegrass, reed canary grass, or meadow fescue had the seed habits of timothy, I would recommend them first."
"The three principal elements in the food of plants are the nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash. Our soils are abundantly supplied with these, except nitrogen. This element is not natural to the soil, but is found only in the decaying organic matter in the soil. Where the stock of organic matter begins to run low, as it always does after a while, if measures are not taken to replenish it, the soil begins to become poor in nitrogen. Now, it happens that there is one family of plants, the legumes, that draws nitrogen from the air, and their tissues are very rich in nitrogen. This family includes peas, beans, alfalfa, the clovers, vetches, etc. When these are grown on the land, their roots and stubble leave more nitrogen in the soil than the crops remove. It is, therefore, a matter of prime importance that some leguminous crops should be introduced into every system of cropping."
"For those sections where the rainfall is 20 inches or more, and for lands where it is less, I would recommend timothy and reed clover for grass to be sown for hay in rotation. Where it is too dry for timothy, orchard grass and tall fescue are the best substitutes."
"Just what the abundance of sheep

on the ranges will have on the future of sheep industry husbandry on farms in this country cannot be stated. It is certain that sheep will always be a leading factor in utilizing the grasses on lands too dry or too rough for farming. I believe, however, that the range sheep will not furnish all the wool and mutton required in the Pacific Northwest in the future. There will be room for sheep on every farm. When the time comes that the present wheat areas are devoted to growing feed for livestock, and that time is not far distant, I believe the system of farming will not differ much from the following: Wheat, following by peas and oats for hay; then two or three years of timothy and clover; followed by potatoes, and corn for ensilage, with fall-sown wheat again."

Eugene Patrick's Speech.
Eugene Patrick, of Shoshone, Idaho, spoke of "Lincoln Sheep," of which he is a noted breeder. Mr. Patrick opened with some general observations on the question of what breed sheep men should select, and then traced the history of the of Lincoln sheep from the beginning in England in the eleventh century, although it was not until the 18th century that the Lincoln, Cotswold and Leicester breeds were known as being separate and distinct, the one from the other. The Lincoln is, he claimed, the largest of all breeds. In the earlier days, the Lincoln rams reached the enormous size of 600 pounds, with coarse mutton wool. Systematic breeding has improved the type as to quality, without materially reducing the weight. The Lincolns were imported into America in 1804, by a New York breeder, being later taken to Iderton, Canada, where they have been successfully raised, and from where they have been sold to go to various parts of the country.

THE MORNING ADDRESS.

State Veterinarian on Diseases—Full Discussion by Many Delegates
Dr. McLean, state veterinarian, was heard this morning on "The Diseases of Sheep." He gave a scientific treatment of the character of the maladies that afflict sheep, especially scab, which may be given to horses by sheep, that being probably the manner in which the horses of Eastern Oregon became infected.

Robert Hynd, at the conclusion of Dr. McLean's address, raised the question of the eradication of scab, saying that the duties of the stock inspectors of the counties are not, as a rule, done thoroughly. Mr. Hynd took up the question, and, in a sensible, intelligent talk, set forth the facts in the case. He urged that the convention give the matter full discussion.

Geo. Young, of The Dalles, put in a plea for the stock inspectors, on the ground that the inspectors are not well enough paid, and cannot be expected to do all that is required of them. Mr. Young then talked about the various scab cures in use, saying that Black Leaf dip had been of use to him. President Gooding urged careful consideration of the subject, calling on Col. Malone, of Montana, the state from which the scab has been practically eradicated. Col. Malone gave an idea of the laws of Montana, which is the only state that has a complete and most successful system of laws on the subject. Col. Malone stated that the federal government takes from the hands of the local inspector the handling of sheep in transit, and that this plan is to be followed in all other states.

H. B. Carroll, superintendent of the south St. Paul stockyards, being called on, gave his experience in dipping. At his yards, the regular dip provided by the government is used, scabena, to which solution ready for use, he adds 10 pounds of sulphur to 100 pounds of the solution, the dip being at the temperature of 110 degrees, at least, for three minutes.

John McMillan, of Boise, gave his experience in dipping the second time, after shearing, losing quite a number of sheep. Black Leaf dip had found to be very valuable. Idaho's plan of inspecting stock is to have a state inspector, with deputies in the several counties, who receive \$5 a day and are under bonds.

At the noon adjournment, the scab question was still under discussion. President Gooding announced that Dr. Hixcox, the government inspector of livestock, was in the city, and would speak at the afternoon session.

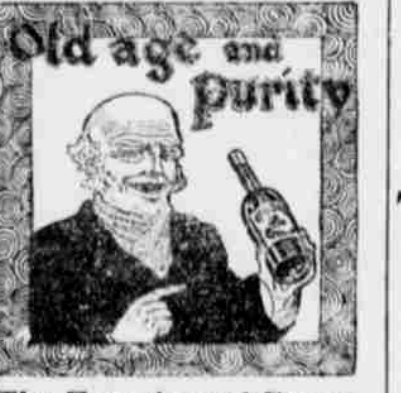

Pendleton Schools Visited by the State's Chief Executive.
Governor T. T. Geor on Tuesday afternoon visited the schools of Pendleton, upon invitation from Principal E. B. Conklin, of the public schools, and President F. L. Forbes, of the Pendleton academy. He was accompanied by Prof. Spillman and Richard Scott. Addresses were delivered by the governor in the high school room and the academy.
After returning to his hotel, he expressed himself as highly pleased with the Pendleton schools, being indeed, considerably surprised at the apparent efficiency which is here maintained.
