PLANS OF LOCAL SHOOTERS.

Meeting Last Evening of the Pendleton Sportsmen's Association.

A meeting of the Pendleton Sportsmen's association was held at the hotel rooms last evening. It was decided to offer a prize of a \$15 fishing rod to the member of the club catching the largest trout during the season. The terms of the contest will be arranged later, regarding measurement of the fish and proof of catching, etc. Since the trip of the shooters to Portland and the subject of holding a big tournament in Pendleton has been discussed in its various phases, but at the meeting last evening the tournament was postponed indefinitely. This action was largely due to the fact that the seventeenth annual tournament of the Sportsmen's association of the Northwest will be held at Walla Walla on June 25, 26 and 27, at bluebirds, and June 28 and 29, at live pigeons. The Pendleton association did not wish to do anything that would interfere with that tournament in the slightest degree. Consequently, the Pendleton live pigeon tournament will not be held until next fall.

The Sportsmen's association of the Northwest is composed of 15 or 20 cities from Oregon, Idaho, Montana, British Columbia and Washington, and it is expected that not less than 100 shooters will be in attendance at the Walla Walla tournament. Three courses, Millionaire, Brownie, of Spokane, and an elegant trophy that went with first prize, valued at \$500. That was won by a Spokane man. He will put up another trophy for this year's shoot. In addition there will be \$2500 worth of trophies and \$1000 in cash.

On June 28 and 29 the live bird contest will take place, 25 birds, \$25 entrance. Pendleton will send over about 12 men to help in making the tournament a success and incidentally to bring back with them all the plunder they can win and carry.

WOOL GROWERS GO HOME.

CONVENTION CLOSING WITH THURSDAY EVENING'S LECTURE.

Sheep Owners Satisfied With the Three Days' Session. Largest Attendance in Its History.

Nearly all the delegates and officers of the Woolgrowers' Association have left Pendleton, going out in all directions. General satisfaction was expressed by the delegates, Pendleton's entertainment and the convention's proceedings having been up to the standard.

A verbal resolution was offered by J. N. Williamson, of Prineville, during Thursday, thanking the O. R. & N. Co. for its interest in the development of the country, and appreciation for the company's extensive experiments in grazing arid lands. The convention adopted the resolution unanimously.

PROF. PERNOT'S LECTURE.

He Spoke on Structure of Wool, Assisted by Dr. Withycombe.

Assisted by Dr. Withycombe, Prof. E. F. Pernot, bacteriologist at the state agricultural college, Corvallis, Oregon, delivered a lecture Thursday evening on "Wool and Livestock," illustrating the address by the use of a stereopticon. Prof. Pernot has pursued investigations during several years past, at the college, with a view to demonstrating that, by the microscope, one may tell by the structure of a particular wool fibre from its conformation. He sent to various parts of the United States and collected samples of all classes and grades of wools, grown on every breed and cross-breed of sheep owned by wool-growers of America. Hundreds of samples were secured, and by a systematic method, he passed them beneath the microscope, making slides in many instances, sufficient to demonstrate his theory—that every breed and cross-breed of sheep produces a wool fibre different in structure from all other wools grown on other breeds or cross-breeds.

These slides were placed in the stereopticon and thrown upon a canvas screen, the speaker using them to explain his remarks on the subject in hand. The demonstration of the theory was remarkably complete and conclusive. The remarks of the professor and the pictures on the screen enabling the man of no scientific training to understand as clearly as an expert how the experiments were conducted.

Its Practical Bearing.

The practical bearing on the business of sheep and wool growing, as set forth by Prof. Pernot, is that the wool grower, of course, to handle sheep producing the most valuable wool fibre, that is, when they are engaged primarily in raising wool producers in distinction from mutton producers. The difficulty met by the grower is to find some way of securing wool of the character of wool they are raising may be determined. It is apparent, from Prof. Pernot's showing, that this is easy of accomplishment; for, by sending samples of the wool to a competent microscopist in any institution of learning, will have a reasonable knowledge of wool structure, with much perfect accuracy, a return may be made, which will enable the sheep man to determine whether or not he is raising the class of wool best suited to the use of the manufacturer.

"Frequently," said Prof. Pernot, "as wool growers in the West, in vegetation, select certain breeds of sheep for propagation and set himself up in business, with the idea that he has exercised the very best judgment, and has insured the producing of the best result attainable under the circumstances. He goes on, throughout the year, continuing to raise that same breed of sheep, ignorant of the fact that he is selling every year a clip of wool inferior in quality to what he could have sold, were he to cross the breed of his flocks with some other sheep strain, at no greater cost, but with immeasurably better returns on his investment."

Results Will Vary.
"It is frequently the case, that a given breed of sheep will produce in one county a superior article of wool, whereas, in the county adjoining, in which soil, precipitation of moisture and climatic conditions are apparently the same, a wool of less value is produced. The reason for this is that the manufacturer will be produced by the same breed of sheep. Only by the microscopic examination of the wool can these things be determined. It is possible, in the light of the experimental work which has been carried on in this direction, to raise wool of a value, to the manufacturer, far in excess of what is now being produced. I believe that, in future years, the examination of wools under the microscope will be as much a necessity to the woolgrower, as a knowledge of the market conditions and acquaintance with the habits and needs of sheep, as regards their healthy growth and propagation."

"Chancing to observe the unusual brilliancy of Indian robes and blankets made of wools raised on certain breeds of sheep, I was led into a course of special inquiry, while pursuing the experimental work on wool fibres, with a view to determining, if possible, the reason for this brilliancy of coloring. Side by side with the notes made during the examination of the wool samples, I also made record of that which, in its completeness, conclusively proved to me why some wools take the dyes in the mill so as to produce a color more brilliant than those of any made from other wools, and the reason is simply this: These wools contain less of pigment, coloring matter which is a part of all hair or wool, thus the artificial coloring of the dyes to stand out with greater distinctness, not neutralized by an excess of pigment in the natural structure of the wool."

OF INTEREST TO WOODMEN.

A. D. Stillman Tells of the Meeting of the Head Managers.

The board of head managers convened on the 28th of February at the head offices in Denver, and proceeded to review all the financial transactions of the last six months in the Pacific jurisdiction. A. D. Stillman, chairman of the board, who returned from Denver yesterday, reports that everything was found to be in a very satisfactory condition. On the first of March there was a balance of about \$35,000 in the benefit fund and ten or twelve thousand dollars in the general fund. These sums are available for current expenses.

One of the most responsible duties the board at this session had to perform was to invest some \$40,000 that

had accumulated in the equalization fund. This sum was made up of about \$30,000 collected in February from that fund, some New Mexican bonds redeemed and interest. The board purchased city of Denver improvement bonds of the par value of \$47,000. Three thousand dollars that had accumulated in the last beneficiary fund was likewise invested in a first-class school bond.

Affairs at the head offices are moving along very smoothly and comfortably. Head Consul Falkenberg is now in California, giving personal attention to the campaign in that state.

Head Clerk Book was called on Monday to the death bed of his father in Iowa and is temporarily absent.

The Smallpox Patients Near Weston Are Rapidly Recovering.

The East Oregonian is indebted to the Western Leader for the following items:

G. W. Maybee temporarily closed his school in the O'Hara district last Monday. Fear of smallpox kept the pupils away until only three reported for school.

The number of people vaccinated at the offices of Western physicians since the local "smallpox scare" began, is estimated at between four and five hundred. There will be but few victims unprepared should the epidemic become general.

Ilex Winn, who has been sick with smallpox at the Winn home near town is getting better. His brother, Bert Winn, is now having a severe tussle with the disease, and his present appearance is described as the reverse of handsome. So far the epidemic has been confined to the Winn residence, but it is probable that other cases will appear in this neighborhood.
