Joseph has been an intelligent observer of his paleface neighbors and it seems well calculated to excite his small degree. Once at the head of the Nez Percés and Cayuses tribes, he might induce the Unalaktilas to federate with them and thereby establish a small power by suffrage, of their own. To be at the head of such an organization would take no leaves from Joseph's laurels.

JEALOUS OF STEPMOTHER.

A Young Man Shoots His Father's Second Wife.
William G. Taylor of Washington, shot and killed his stepmother, Mrs. Marion Taylor, in a lodging house in Baltimore a few days ago. The husband of the woman is Charles Taylor of Washington. During the winter Taylor was a member of the Fifth regular artillery. According to the story of Charles Taylor he and his wife came to Baltimore to visit Mrs. Taylor's son, Thomas Scott. Just as the family were seated at dinner, Glenn Taylor arrived from Washington. After dinner he and Scott went out and they had several drinks. Mr. Taylor, the elder, went after a vehicle to take his wife for a drive, when Glenn Taylor entered his stepmother's room and fired two shots at her, both entering her head. She fell to the floor and expired immediately. Jealousy of his stepmother because of her influence over his father and dissatisfaction about money matters is thought to have caused the killing.

MORGAN'S PROFITS IN THE DEAL.

He Made \$186,325 a Day for Forty Days.
J. Pierpont Morgan has made at the rate of \$186,325 per day for forty days in engineering the big steel deal. This is far ahead of John D. Rockefeller's daily income, which is \$57,000. Mr. Morgan will get \$12,500,000 in the stock of the new steel company for his services. This stock, at the quotations on the curb is worth \$7,455,125. As Mr. Morgan has been at work forty days on the deal his pay has been at the rate of \$186,325 per day.
It is said Wall street that Schwab's big salary of \$80,000 was fixed by himself in return for his personal influence in securing Carnegie's consent to arrange a deal. After the first offer Carnegie, it is said, raised his price \$15,000,000, and this was conceded at once for fear he would ask for more.
Trading on the curb in the new securities of the United States Steel corporation, "when issued," was the feature of Wall street one day last week. The dealings amounted to nearly 200,000 shares.
The transactions ranged from \$7 in the preferred to \$2 1/2 at the close. The common closed at 37 bid, 37 1/2 asked, a decline of 2 per cent. Rights to participate in the new syndicate closed at 105 bid, 110 asked, also a decline of 2 per cent.

NEW BASEBALL RULES.

Action Taken by National League Managers of Interest Locally.
At a meeting of the National League baseball magnates at New York on Wednesday of last week, a rule was adopted which does away with the intentional "foul-off" of pitched balls by a batsman. The first and second foul balls hit by the batsman, unless two strikes have already been called against him, shall henceforth be counted as strikes.
Rule No. 3, defining the position of the catcher's times, was altered so that the catcher will have to stand within 10 feet instead of 30 feet of the plate. This places the catcher "up behind the bat" throughout the game.
A rule making the pitcher deliver the ball to the batsman as soon as the latter takes his position at the plate was adopted. Should the pitcher deliver the ball to any other player than the catcher, a ball will be called for each delivery. A rule was passed which penalized one ball against the pitcher if he failed to deliver the ball to the batsman within 20 seconds after the latter has taken his position. A batsman may not henceforth take his base if hit by a pitched ball, but the ball will count as a ball against the pitcher.

T. H. JESSUP IS DEAD.

He Was a Well Known Citizen of Walla Walla.
Walla Walla, March 8. T. H. Jessup, aged 52 years, for many years a resident of this city and Walla Walla died yesterday afternoon of a complication of diseases. The funeral will take place in Walla Walla Sunday, Rev. L. O. Herrold, officiating.
The deceased was born in Indiana, July 29, 1848, and was married in that state in 1867. He crossed the continent 23 years ago and settled at Walla Walla. He was postmaster at that place for a number of years and held the position of deputy assessor of Walla Walla county for a period of two years.
Mr. Jessup resided in this city for a number of years and at the time of his death, was engaged in the real estate business.
He was the father of seven children, three of whom survive him.
