MARKETS OF THE WORLD.

Barley—Stationary. White demand for barley has increased. Pendleton, March 14.—Wheat prices the same as those quoted a week ago. The per bushel delivered at the mill for No. 1 club and redchaff, 100 lbs. is being paid at outside prices, with a half cent more per bushel being paid occasionally for the local supply of barley for feed since been consumed. The price has increased during the past week. In consequence, it has become necessary to import some barley from the Columbia county, Wash. The price has advanced to 70 cents per 100 lbs.

Local Market.

Pendleton dealers are paying the following prices for ranch and farm produce: Butter, 40 to 50c per roll. Eggs—10c per doz. Potatoes—50c per sack. Apples—42 to 45c per bushel. Peaches—70c per 100 pounds. Turkeys—Alive, 12c per pound. Beans—\$12 per bushel. Chickens—During the past week prices have been ranging 20 cent higher than a week ago. Eggs are quoted at 35 to 45c.

Wool in Boston.

Boston, March 14.—The wool market is simply weak. The bulk of transactions in territory grades. Good wool in territory grades are showing slight change in price. Fine medium grades, good fair staple, scoured, is being sold at 40 to 45c, while the strictly staple called for 45 to 46c. Some wools are slow.
